CONQUERS NEPTUNE

Before the task was done, he was borne with the sinking ship into the water. The strings at last got untied, and Ikari came up to the surface with the treasure. From the mainmast of the battleship Mikasa with Commander Togo on board were floating the admiral's flag and the fighting flag. The 36th hit of the enemy's cannon ball cut the mainmast in two and sent the upper part into the sea together with the two flags it bore. The engagement was yet in its inception and the augury was a chilling one to the brave hearts on board, as might easily be imagined. Unless this psychological blow was obviated and the spirits cheered up, good fighting was not to be expected of the men. This was what Admiral Togo feared. (To be continued.)

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DEPTH OF ATTACHMENT

The following little dramatic scene from the Russo-Japanese War illustrates the depth of attachment felt towards the national flag. One day in early summer of the year 1904, the steamer Nikko Maru, temporarily equipped as a gunboat, was returning to her base after a day's important work laying mines outside the harbor of Port Arthur, when she struck a mine unfortunately going down. Boats were lowered to take men ashore. Bontawatani, the last person to leave the ship, he was swimming to one of the boats, and when he turned his head to have the last look of his dear old ship, he caught sight of the sun flag appearing above the almost submerged deck.

SINCERE LOYALTY SHOWN

A British officer soon appeared on the scene and, hastily producing a Union Jack and fastening it to a stick planted the staff in the midst of the throng of exultant soldiers. Shiraishi did not like to be thus unjustly outshined. He felt that the glory had been snatched away from where it was due. He called to his men for a sun flag, but none was to be available. He rushed towards a British soldier cheerfully waving the flag of his country and knocked him down. He rapidly took out a handkerchief from his pocket, bit the ring finger of his left hand, and dyed a red ball with the blood flowing out from the wound! Piercing this improvised sun flag with the point of his sword, he held it as high as his hand could reach and shouted "Banzai!" as shrilly as his throat would burst. All his men responded in tears. Officers and troops of the foreign contingents of the allied army watched the development in silence and with curiosity mingled with admiration. And

JAPAN MOURNS AS FATHER OF EMPRESS DIES AT HIS PRIVATE VILLA AT ATAMI

Empress Rushes From Hayama Palace to Bedside of Father; Prince Kuni Passes Away In Presence of Family... TOKYO, Jan. 28.—(Special to The Japanese American News)—The people of Japan is in a state of profound mourning today following the death yesterday of His Imperial Highness Prince Kunihiko Kuni, father of the Japanese Empress, at his private villa at Atami, a seaside resort situated about 120 miles southwest of Tokyo.

PRIVATE FUNERAL FOR LATE PRINCE IS REQUEST

THE IMPERIAL DIET, in a joint session today, passed a resolution of condolence to the family of the late Prince, and the message was borne in person by Prince Tokugawa, president of the House of Peers, to the house of Kuni at Shibusya. For the rest of the day the Diet went on a recess out of respect to late Prince.

HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 28.—(UP)

The Emperor of Japan will have opportunity to go canoeing in an outrigger canoe typical of the Hawaiian Islands if he so desires when he is presented shortly with a canoe from Japanese of Hawaii. The canoe was built on the island of Hawaii of Koa wood. One huge piece was used in making the canoe, 24 feet long. It is equipped with four paddles of oak wood, and the outriggers are made of hau. The canoe has just been delivered to the Japanese consulate for shipment to Japan. Hawaiian Japanese are sending the gift to Emperor Hirohito to commemorate his coronation. Japanese of the islands are sending other gifts as well, including a two-reel motion picture depicting the activities of Hawaii's volcanoes.
