## Emperor Thanks School Children For Crown Gifts

TOKYO, Jan. 22.—The 2,312 articles of handicrafts as well as scholastic records submitted to the emperor by primary school children throughout Japan and also in Hawaii last November, in commemoration of the coronation, received imperial appreciation today.

The exhibition of the handicraft was held last November in Ueno Park under the auspices of the Kokumin Shimbuin. More than 100,000 articles were submitted by primary school children. Of this number, 2,312 were selected and submitted to the Emperor.

## FIRE STRIKES NIPPON TOWN

### City Assembly Calls Special session As 55 Houses Burn

TOKYO, Feb. 4.—(Special)—A fire which started from the Watanabe Cotton Mill in the city of Yono, in the Saitama prefecture near here, burned down a total of fifty-five houses, causing great concern among the citizens of the town. The mill was entirely demolished by the fire, as well as a wide area of houses surrounding it.

A special session of the Municipal assembly was convoked in order to take emergency measures to take care of the homeless.

## BRIGHT FUTURE OBSERVED FOR JAPANESE IN BRAZIL

### 85,000 Nipponese Immigrants Enjoy Equal Treatment With Citizens; 400 Take Advantage of Naturalization Rights

The results of Japanese emigration to Brazil have been quite satisfactory. It is often pointed out that, whereas Italians and Germans have amassed big fortunes, no Japanese immigrant has made such a success, and hinted that Brazil is not an ideal place for Japanese emigration. But one must note that, whereas Germany commenced emigration to Brazil some 100 years ago and Italy about 68 years ago, the history of our enterprise is only 20 years old. We cannot therefore place the three on the same level. Recent statistics reveal that there are in Brazil about 1,578,000 Italians and 1,270,000 Germans. As many Germans have already naturalized, there must be 600,000 or 700,000 people of the German nationality.

There are 85,200 Japanese immigrants in Brazil according to statistics compiled in June last. The number of new emigrants to that country is steadily growing. Every steamer of the Osaka Shosen Kaisha plying between Brazil and Japan usually takes from 700 to 800 emigrants each to that country. The Kaigai Kogyo Kaisha alone has sent 8,496 emigrants through its hands. The Japanese immigrants to Brazil have made good impressions upon the people of that country as they are industrious, thrifty and faithful in executing their duties.

The majority of the Japanese immigrants are working in the coffee plantations of Sao Paulo Province. Some of them have purchased lands with the money they had saved in that country and are now engaged in their own independent enterprises. There are some 3,500 such families, their land totalling 150,000 chobu or about one half of the area of the Tokyo Municipality. The mi-

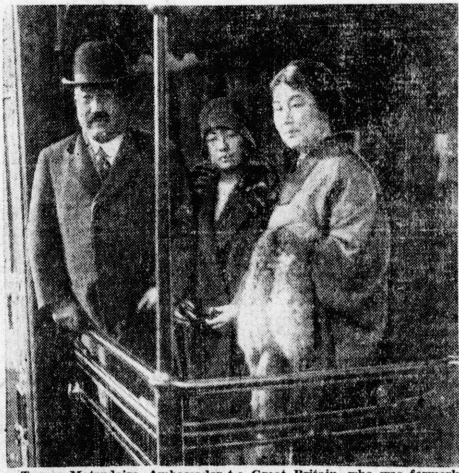
The Los Angeles branch of the Institute is composed of active boys and girls of high school age, and according to popular voice of the city, a large crowd is expected to attend.

## 3 ARE FETED AT L. A. BALL

### Grads Are Guests At Party Given At Y Club House

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—(Special)—Three Japanese graduates from the University of Southern California were guests of honor at a dance Saturday night, at the University Y. M. C. A. club house. The affair was held in conjunction with the "Japan Night" in which many dance and music artists took part.

## JAPAN POLICE GIVEN PISTOLS

TOKYO, Feb. 2.—Tokyo police, who heretofore have been armed only with short swords, have been given revolvers, as a drastic measure to curb the crime wave. Special night patrols of armed officers, working in groups of three or four, will patrol the city from 10 o'clock at night until dawn, and reserve forces will be put on extra night duty in the suburbs.

According to police annals, there has been an alarming increase in the number of cases of murder and armed burglary in Tokyo during the last seven months, and special precautions were deemed necessary. Crimes of all kinds committed in Tokyo totaled 8,343 from the beginning of the year to the end of November, an increase of ninety-two cases over the same period last year. Forty-nine murders were included in the number.

The increase in crime is attributed largely to the desperate condition of the unemployed classes during the winter months.

### Late Father of Japan Empress Buried at Toshimaga Oka

TOKYO, Feb. 4.—In a series of Sinto rites lasting six hours, the funeral of Prince Kuni, father of Empress Naeko, was solemnized today with burial in the Imperial family cemetery just outside Tokyo.

TOKYO, Feb. 2.—Heikichi Ogawa, Minister of Railways, has ordered removal of the English signs "sleeping car" and "dining car" from the government railways' carriages of these classes. ## SAC TO SONG BIRD TO SING HERE FEB. 12

### Miss Miyakawa To Appear In City In 1st Concert

Preliminary to her sailing for Europe to finish her vocal education, Miss Agnes Miyakawa, popular young Japanese soprano of Sacramento, is conducting a series of farewell concerts in this state, the first of which will be held in this city at the Scottish Rite Auditorium Saturday evening, February 16.

Heralded as one of the most promising Japanese artists of the day and given ovation wherever she appears in recital, Miss Miyakawa is receiving the hearty support of many music critics. As her appearance in this city will be her first one in a recital, a large and enthusiastic audience is expected to hear her sing.

The University of California Japanese Alumni Association, which is sponsoring the affair, is giving the concert party as a farewell event for the distinguished diva and also as a benefit for the Japanese Student Club at Berkeley.

Miss Miyakawa is planning an extensive tour of Europe, staying in Paris, Milan, Florence, Rome, and other leading music and art centers of the Old World to master her technique under celebrated instructors. She will be accompanied on her trip by her mother.

## Japanese Admiral Awarded Post In High War Council

TOKYO, Feb. 2.—Admiral Kanji Kato, Japan's chief naval adviser at the Washington conference of 1921-22, has been named to membership in the Supreme War Council, composed of the highest military and naval officers sitting as advisers to the Emperor on imperial defense matters.

Admiral Kato, whose promotion has been unusually rapid, is one of the youngest men to be thus honored, as he is only 47.

On his elevation to the council he was relieved of command of the first fleet, which carries with it command of the combined fleets whenever the navy is operating as a unit, and in that post is succeeded by Admiral Shoshin Taniguchi, a veteran who formerly commanded the Kure naval base.

## OSAKA BIGGEST CITY IN NIPPON SAYS ESTIMATE

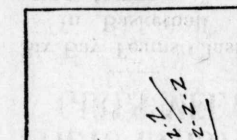
OSAKA, Japan, Feb. 2.—Osaka the industrial center of the Empire, has retained its place as Japan's largest city.

The latest government estimates show the Western metropolis holding the lead it took from Tokyo when the capital was wrecked by the 1923 earthquake.

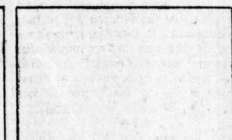
The figures are: Osaka, 2,333,800, and Tokyo 2,218,400.

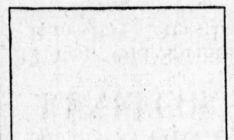
