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## JAPAN CUEIST IS DOWNED BY CHICAGO MAN

### Matsuyama Gives Way to Foe 400 to 331 In Title Series

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Jake Schaefer, former champion from Chicago, blasted the title hopes of Kinryu Matsuyama and jumped in to a tie for first place with Welker Cochran, Hollywood, sharpshooter, by defeating the tiny Japanese sensation, 400 to 331, this afternoon in a final round match of the 182 ball game tournament. The match ended in the eighteenth inning.

Schaefer closed the match with a display as brilliant as his play has been mediocre in the opening innings. With Matsuyama leading in the tenth inning 246 to 54, and Schaefer in constant trouble, the Chicago star found himself and loosed a run of 182.

Cochran and Schaefer, who will play for the title tomorrow night, now are tied for first place with three victories and one defeat each. Matsuyama is tied for second place with Edward Horemans, the deposed champion.

LAW REPEAL IS UNLIKELY So Says S. F. Banker Now On Tour of Nippon

YOKOHAMA, Jan. 25 (By Mail)—Herbert Fleishacker, famous banker of San Francisco, who is among the Belgian world tourists with his family, in a press interview was skeptical over the prospects of revising the American immigration law in favor of the Japanese.

The protests came from the other sport with spending too much money on this tour while the other athletes are forced to curtail their expenses.

The Meiji nine will leave Yokohama on March 15 for Honolulu and from thence to the United States. While in this country the Japanese players will meet leading university and other amateur teams both on the Pacific Coast and the Eastern section.

## 'On to South America' Is Slogan of 12 Osaka Students Who Are Learning Spanish To Prepare for Their Trip to Argentina

OSAKA, Japan, Feb. 13.—(Special)—South America as the Promised Land, and Eldorado of their dream, has caught the imagination of the youths of this city, and twelve students of various middle schools have already set about to study Spanish language preparatory to sailing for Argentina.

"We have no hope as salary workers here," said one of the enthusiasts, "and we do not expect much from university education. But out in the pioneer countries of South America, a new life of hope is before us."

At the end of last year Kyochi Hattori, former chief of the administrative department of the Hokkaido Government gave a talk on emigration to South America at the Kora Middle School, Osaka, when many students of middle schools who heard the talk showed great enthusiasm and asked Hattori many questions. Such students numbered more than a hundred.

Hattori told them that any one who wants to emigrate to South America must have a strong will and strong constitution, that one must first obtain the consent of the parents and that one needs about \$500 as travelling expenses. He also told that a knowledge of the Spanish language will help one much in going to South America.

Accordingly twelve students of the various schools organized a Spanish class under Prof. Noda of the Foreign Language School and started in earnest to prepare themselves for the trip.

Miss Seiretsu Watari, junior student of the Kyoto Third Junior College, and Gichiro Takahashi of Tokyo Commercial College were both awarded the third prize of \$50.

## TRAGIC ENCROACHMENT OF MODERNISM SEEN IN KOBE

### Veteran Rikishaman Is a Pathetic Figure In the Midst of Sweeping Progress

(Continued from yesterday)  
The fares at these times were exceedingly high for rikisha rides, a charge of 60 sen being charged from the present Yanagiwara to Hyogo Station. This money, according to present exchange rates, must have amounted to about \$20.00. As the demand for them was very great, the early rikisha men must have made about \$200.00 a day in terms of our present monetary valuation.

Just as the motor cars are driving out the rikishamen, so these rikishamen are to be replaced by the "Kumonosuke" (kago bearers) very likely cursed the new rikisha men just as the rikishamen are now cursing the chauffeurs, or else they rapidly changed their professions from kago bearers to rikishamen. At any rates the rikisha became established, and by 1888 there were some 250 of them. With this tremendous increase the supply exceeded demand and inevitably reduced the fare. From an exorbitant rate of 60 sen it dropped rapidly to 3 sen. Now, instead of the passengers drawing lots to have the privilege of riding, the rikishamen did the drawing to decide who would be the lucky one to get the passenger.

These early rikishas were crude affairs, of course. They bore nothing of the comfort of the present day vehicles. But step by step improvements came in. First came the hood, next the arm rest; the wheels became braced with spokes instead of being a solid disc as they were. By 1902 rubber tires were added, and assumed the appearance they now have. And by 1908 they had reached the pinnacle of popularity.

1908 BEGINNING OF DECLINE  
From 1908 they began to diminish, slow, it is true, but steadily. This diminishing process went on

## PRINCE KUNI ON VISIT TO TOKIO SLUMS

### Secret Tour Arranged For Purpose of Study

TOKYO, Feb. 13.—(UP)—Prince Higashi Kuni played the part of an Harun A-Rashid several days ago by making a trip incognito through the slums of Tokyo. This was the first occasion in more than 60 years on which a Prince of the Blood visited the poorer quarters of the capital.

With the greatest secrecy the Prince left the Imperial Palace at daylight, accompanied only by five officials of the Ministry of Home Affairs. At 6 o'clock the party reached a municipal employment office in Hongu, one of the slum sections. From there they went to a co-operative apartment house, which actually is a tenement in which 156 families live, and closed the expedition by visiting the Tomura Nagaya, a group of barrack-like structures which house 1,600 of the city's most poverty-ridden families.

PRINCE TAKES INTEREST  
The Prince took a noticeable interest in each of the institutions he visited. At the employment agency he asked questions about its system of operation; in the tenements he would frequently stop to ask a raggedly-dressed householder about his work. If he happened to be employed or about the amount of his wages. Undoubtedly the slum dwellers to whom he spoke smiled to see a man of high station but none of them realized that their questioner was a Prince of the Blood.

No one outside the Palace except the men who accompanied him knew of Prince Kuni's intended expedition. But before the trip was completed someone, probably a policeman, recognized him and 60 plain clothesmen were rushed to the district to give the party special protection. The reason for the visit apparently was nothing more than a desire on the part of the Prince to see how the lower classes live. Educated in the Occident he has always been interested in the slums of the country.

FIRST VISIT BY A PRINCE  
In commenting on the tour, one of the officials who went along said: "Although Princes and Princesses of the Blood have visited social service institutions before, this is the first time that one of them actually has gone into the slums. In many places where we went there were only narrow passages through which we could walk, but the Prince did not hesitate and forged on ahead, saying 'Never mind. Come on.'"

## NISSEI DOWNS KYOWA SQUAD

### SAMURAI'S FORGE AHEAD IN SECOND HALF OF GAME

BERKELEY, Feb. 13.—(Special)—After a long period of athletic inactivity, the local Nissei Club cagers swung into action again, last Saturday night, against the Mountain View Kyowa Club quintet on the Oakland High School court.

The Berkeley boys were favored to win, but the Mountain Viewers almost "upset the dope" by playing a surprisingly strong game, trailing only 9 to 10 at the end of the first half.

In the second half, however, the Nissei about forgot the "dope" and came out on top, 24 to 18. Both teams used the "five-men" offense and defense with the result that every man starred in some period of play.

## Vast Sums Used for Memorial for Late Nationalist

PEIPING, Feb. 14.—(UP)—The business of making a Chinese saint of the late Dr. Sun Yat-sen is very costly, according to a petition just sent to Nanking by the Peiping Branch political council of the Kuomintang (Nationalist Party). The Party leaders ask that 500,000 silver dollars be sent to them as expenses for carrying Dr. Sun's body from the temple outside Peiping where it now lies to its new mausoleum in Nanking.

Meanwhile, millions of dollars have been spent on building Dr. Sun's tomb in Nanking and in constructing a road through the heart of the ancient city to the Nationalist patron saint's final resting place.

Thousands of Nanking residents have been bankrupted in the building of this road, as they were paid for confiscated property in government bonds, whose market value is very low.
