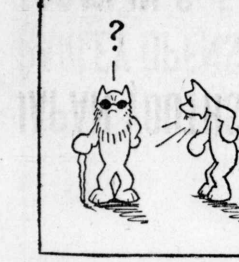
FRESNO SET FOR BATTLE

Marxism Losing Hold Among Rising Generation Avers Noted Tokyo Sociologist

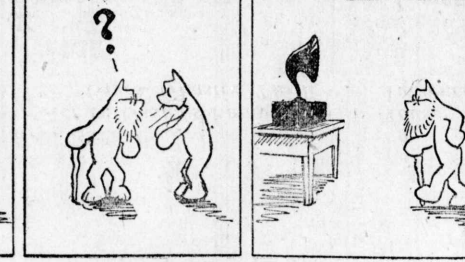
By DR. EIJIRO KAWAI (Continued from yesterday) They have read Marxian literature very extensively. Another ten per cent are not exactly Marxists, but their ideas and attitude are Marxian in nature. They are sympathetic towards Marxism and would lend their aid to it whenever possible.

OTHER CHARACTERISTICS The second characteristic of present-day students is found in their strong craving for some controlling principle. They are not satisfied with expediencies. They want to apply the same principle in all divergent cases without inconsistencies.

PREVALENCE EXPLAINED Now, let us see what caused the prevalence of Marxism in this country. In the first place, present-day students are different from those of, say, 15 years ago. When I was a college student some 15 years ago, the majority of the students were nationalists. They were concerned with Japan's expansion and development.

So Says Premier Before Lower House of Parliament

TOKYO, Feb. 21.—(Special)—General Giichi Tanaka, Japanese Premier, yesterday announced in the Lower House of the Imperial Diet that Japan has no intention of sponsoring a naval arms limitation parley under the present circumstances.

The announcement is looked upon as a fatal blow to the Minseito Party's proposal to launch a resolution in the House calling upon the government to propose a naval conference shortly.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—(Special)—Simultaneous with the announcement that Japan will not undertake calling a naval parley, Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain told the House of Commons yesterday that Great Britain holds no plan for taking a sponsor's role in an arms conference.

Considerable expectations had been held in Washington last week when Ambassador Howard hinted that Britain is considering initiating a naval parley. Chamberlain's declaration yesterday is taken as the official denial of that rumor.
