ARTIST ITO TO DELIVER DANCE TALK

To Address International Club; Wins Writer's Prize

Michio Ito, internationally famous master of ballet, who has lately given recitals here and in Seattle, will deliver a talk Saturday evening on his philosophy of art at the International Institute, 1860 Washington street.

The originator of the Ito mode of ballet, the distinguished Japanese artist has been accorded high praise by leading critics of the country. The talk Saturday night, which begins at 8:15 o'clock, is open to the Japanese public. It is being sponsored by the International Club, which contains Japanese members.

Ruth Pickering, writing in The Nation, pens the following appreciation of Ito's art: The distinction between dancing as a fine art and dancing as entertainment should be clear. It is sometimes difficult for the audience to make the distinction, but the purpose of his performance should at all times be unclouded in the mind of the dancer.

According to Mr. Ito, the ballet dance began as entertainment, not as we are accustomed to believe in the courts of Italy and France, but six thousand years ago in Tibet. As it has come down through the ages it has inevitably been modified by the civilizations of which it has been a part, and has at intervals been elevated to a fine art.

ENVOY DEBUCHI STRESSES U. S. - NIPPON FRIENDSHIP An impressive picture of the new Japan that has arisen since the World War and of the friendly relationships existing between the Japanese and American people is given by his Excellency, Katsujii Debuchi, in the March number of The Union Pacific Magazine, published by the Union Pacific railroad system at Omaha, Nebraska, U. S. A.

GRADUAL TRADE INCREASE "The rapid development of modern Japan appears to be an enigma to many observers on this (the American) side of the Pacific," the Ambassador points out. "To some she is a country of romantic beauty, while to others she is a land of militant autocracy. Attracted by the differences in the history, language, customs and manners of the two peoples, they have often failed to realize that underneath these apparent dissimilarities there lies a solid framework of common thought and interest, which sustains the grand edifice of human civilization. "It is a matter of mutual congratulation," he continues, "that the greatest volume of trade that crosses the Pacific today is between us. Japan is the largest purchaser of American goods on the other side of the ocean, while the United States, in turn, is her best customer. Ten years ago, America accounted for about one-third of our foreign trade. Her share has gradually increased until the year before last it amounted to nearly half."

But beyond the binding influences of trade, we are coming to realize the value of a disinterested and sympathetic understanding and mutual assistance as the force binding the nations of the world together."

SINO-NIPPON PACT DRAFT IS FINISHED

Negotiators Expected To Submit Treaty For Approval

SHANGHAI, Mar. 7.—(Special)—A draft of a compromise treaty between Japan and China for the settlement of the Tsinan and other outstanding problems was concluded today between Chou Lun-kuang and an unnamed Japanese representative. These negotiators are expected to report their accomplishments immediately, and, if ratified, the new treaty will be signed by Minister Yoshiyama in Nanking.

In commenting upon this latest development, officials of the Foreign Office in Tokyo declared that they have so far not received this treaty draft. It is understood that a cabinet meeting on March 5, the Japanese government had decided to concede the point championed by China for the formation of an impartial joint investigation committee to fix the responsibility for the Tsinan disturbance and the resulting loss in life and property.

The stranded vessel, from latest reports received at San Francisco marine agencies, left Melbourne the latter part of January for the Philippine Islands.


She is a steel vessel of 3,752 net tons and is owned by the Taihoku Kisen Kaishiki Kaisha and is registered from Dairen.

JAPAN LABOR GROUPS IRED BY KILLING

Proletarian Parties Hit Mochizuki for Yamamoto's Death

TOKYO, Mar. 7.—(Special)—New developments followed in quick succession today on the heel of the assassination yesterday of Senji Yamamoto, noted proletarian leader and member of the House of Deputies from Kyoto.

The prompting head of a powerful gang leader, Kiyoshi Kimura by name, is seen in the murder of the deputy by the political fanatic, Hokkai Kuroda, 37. Kimura is the inviolable czar of the Hichisei Gidan, an intensely nationalistic society, which boasts of about 1000 stevedores and free laborers, all pledged to crush all persons that threaten "the peace of the society and the nation."

Kuroda, the self-confessed assassin, is not only a member of this society but he is the editor of the "People's Voice," its official publication. It is believed that Kuroda, henchman of this gang leader Kimura, committed the crime in compliance with the direction of his master.

ISSUE STATEMENTS Meanwhile, all proletarian parties issued individual statements today denouncing the assassination and putting the responsibility on the shoulders of the reactionary Tanaka government.

The Minseito or the chief opposition party in the Diet launched bitter invectives against the responsibility of the present regime and is expected to introduce shortly bills of impeachment against Home Minister Mochizuki and Chief Miyata of the Metropolitan Police Board.

Under the joint signature of Ikuo Oyama and Kanemitsu Hososeko, former leaders of the disbanded Labor-Farmer party, a statement was issued containing the following passage: "That Yamamoto was murdered on the day that the infamous Peace Preservation Bill was passed in the Diet is a significant fact. The bill punts us proletarians with an iron hand that is stained in the blood of Yamamoto."

HOLDS MASS MEETING The Japanese Proletarian party "The League of Yamamoto is the biggest incident since the class war was started in Japan." At its mass meeting, this party passed a resolution declaring that the murder was not an accident but the direct outcome of the reactionary policies of the present cabinet. The resolution also demanded the resignation of Home Minister Mochizuki and the chief of the Metropolitan Bureau.

The Social Democratic Party, headed by Isohoo Abe, issued a statement similar in tone with those of the other two parties.

University authorities dispersed a student Communist demonstration outside the medical laboratory of Tokyo Imperial University, where physicians were examining the body of Senji Yamamoto.

The demonstrators were students of the Imperial University and numbered approximately 100.
