CHERRY IN NIPPON WILL BLOOM SOON

Japan Railway Gets Ready for Blossom Time Pilgrimage

TOKYO, March 14—(Special)—Due to the unusually balmy weather in Japan this year, the world-famous Japanese cherry blossoms will bloom a week earlier than usual to gladden the hearts of the people with its incomparable beauty.

The first cherry blossoms will bloom at the end of this month, and the annual pilgrimage of beauty lovers are expected to begin about that time to the Arakawa Park, the Koganei Riverside, and the famous Ueno and Asukayama Parks. These spots are all situated in or near Tokyo.

The Department of Communication held a conference of all its department chiefs to map out traffic plans to take care of the multitude that will go on cherry pilgrimages by rail and boat from early next month.

A world-wide movement of travelers is passing through San Francisco to the Cherry Blossom festivals to be held in Japan in April and May, according to officials of the Dollar Steamship Line.

Beautiful blossoming trees, quaint ceremonies and processions of picturesque attired Japanese are drawing more tourists across the Pacific this spring than ever before, says Hugh Mackenzie, passenger traffic manager of the steamship company.

On board one ship sailing Friday, the Dollar trans-Pacific liner President Cleveland, there will be 30 passengers who are going to the Cherry Blossom festivals.

Mackenzie says there will be many more on board the round-the-world liner President Wilson, sailing the following week. These travelers are going individually and also as members of organized tour parties from all parts of the country.

Blossom time is a gala event in such centers as Tokyo, Kamakura and Kyoto. In Kamakura is the world-famous giant Daibutsu, the bronze image 46 feet high, which was built several hundred years ago and is one of the greatest monuments ever constructed.

At Kamakura during cherry blossom time there are miles on miles of beautiful cherry trees in bloom, not on the boulevards, but in the unpaved centers of the roads. These trees produce no fruit, but are cultivated only for the blossoms.

"Kyoto is another center growing in favor since the coronation ceremonies were held there. It is the most typical city of Japan. Tourists are also drawn to Kyoto because of the good hotels, the ancient temples and wonderful shops and bazaars there," asserts Mackenzie.

The Dollar Line has helped to popularize the Cherry Blossom festivals all over the world by preparing special literature about them every year.

Thorny Path Ahead of Japan's Motor Growth As Prejudice Hits Automobile As Luxurious and Harmful For Youths

The question of how and when the number of motor vehicles in use in Japan is to be expanded to such an extent as to be more in proportion to her population and its requirements for both business and pleasure, and to her standing as a first class world power, is a fascinating one.

It is of intense interest alike to manufacturers, dealers, shipping and other transportation agencies, and all sorts of organizations and labor allied to the motor industry, as well as to the motor vehicle users, both actual and potential, themselves.

The United States, with her 20,000,000 odd motor cars streaming in every direction over the network of highways covering her vast expanse of territory, stands alone.

But other important countries, such as Great Britain, Germany, France, or Italy, have in use tremendous numbers of both automobiles and motorcycles, commensurate with their standing and needs.

JAPAN FAR BEHIND
Japan, however, despite the fact that she exceeds some of these countries in the actual influence she exerts in the world, is still far behind them in the automotive facilities at her command.

There are numerous reasons for this state of affairs, which, in combination, constitute a formidable obstacle to the expansion that might be expected and is to be desired in order to keep up with progress as it is understood today.

REASONS GIVEN
Some of these reasons are as follows:
1. Lack of general knowledge of, and interest in, motor mechanism as a thing in itself.

2. Conservative ideas still prevalent.
3. High customs duty.
4. High taxes.
5. High prices and upkeep.
6. Restricted buying power of the people in general.

7. Antiquated police regulations.
8. Poor traffic control.
9. Inadequate roads.
10. Lack of private garaging and other facilities.

11. Inefficient domestic fuel supply
PUBLIC UTILITIES
The use of motor vehicles for public transportation, such as taxis, city and country busses, and trucks, is, in the big cities anyway, making a good deal of headway nowadays; but as to the owner-driver class, the surface of that field can hardly be said to have been scratched, so far. Yet it is the outlet that has largely accounted for the enormous expansion seen in the United States and other countries today.

Therefore the impediments that I have enumerated may be considered especially in their relation to owner-drivers, a class of motorists that not only own their motor vehicles, but know how to drive and care for them as well, and take an interest in doing so, besides benefiting from the economic point of view.

1. LACK OF KNOWLEDGE
Probably it will not be disputed that the intelligent interest of the people of Japan generally, in the mechanism and structure of a motor car, or a motorcycle, as an object in itself, its possibilities, and comparative merits and values, has developed to but a very scant extent, so far.

2. CONSERVATISM
While it is disappearing to some extent in Tokyo and the other big cities, the idea that a motor vehicle is a luxury still prevails, especially in the country districts, whose importance is such that the Seyukai, the political party in the ascendancy today, depends on them for its support.

In the provincial regions, there is great deal of wealth among the land-owning farmer classes, but they are still far from being disposed to personally use motor vehicles, though they are easily able to do so, as far as buying power is concerned.

American agriculturists, for example, use low-priced motor cars in their daily life, to visit the towns to make their purchase and to sell their produce, which is later transported by motor trucks, as well as to go to the theatre, or to pay calls on their neighboring friends.

Motor power is also widely used in farming operations. Such ideas

JAPAN NAVAL CADETS WILL VISIT HERE

Training Squadron To Be Headed by Adm. K. Nomura

San Francisco will be host this summer to two hundred Japanese cadets and Vice-Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura, who are undertaking a world cruise of 28,700 miles on the training squadron composed of two veteran warships.

The cadets, aboard H. M. S. the Asama and Iwate, will leave the Yokosuka naval base on July 1 and reach Honolulu on July 18. After staying in Seattle on August 3, the squadron will proceed to this city, reaching here on August 12.

Extensive plans are under way to extend welcome to these visiting cadets, who will be entertained by both the Japanese and American people of the city.

The present cruise of the squadron will take 143 days to complete.

20 YEN COST OF ONE VOTE

Wholesale Bribery Is Rampant In Tokyo City Election

TOKYO, March 14—(Special)—Bribery is rampant today on the eve of this city's municipal election, which is set for March 16, and the prevailing market price of each vote is quoted around twenty dollars.

The office of the district attorney is flooded with anonymous letters accusing politicians with bribery in the present campaign. One hundred such letters were received by the government in one day today.

Due to the fact that the present election is being held on the heels of an unprecedented political scandal, the citizenry of the Japanese capital is unusually indifferent to the present campaign, and prospects are that there will be many non-voters.

The present special election is being held for the purpose of electing a new municipal assembly to take place in the one dissolved for its participation in a notorious scandal in which over thirty assemblymen were jailed.

After the performance in Leningrad, the majority of us left for home and I with my wife and several others made a brief tour of other countries of Europe, first visiting Germany. When we were examined at a Polish customs house, an interesting thing happened. Our party carried a can of the pea-perch called "denbu". The customs officials suspected it to be gunpowder, and upon being told it was a delicious Japanese food, they placed a bit of it on their finger tips and tasted them, and we were allowed to pass unharmed. Another surprising thing happened as a German customs house. Upon being asked if we were Japanese, we answered "Yes," and none of the officials bothered himself with our luggage.

After spending a day there we reached England one fine morning. TOKYO BANS LABOR RIOT

Disturbance At Funeral of Yamamoto Prohibited

TOKYO, Mar. 14—(Special)—The metropolitan Police Board today issued a manifesto of nine articles for the benefit of all proletarian parties to warn them that labor demonstration will not be tolerated at the funeral to be held today at the Aoyama Cemetery Auditorium for the late Senji Yamamoto, noted proletarian leader, who was assassinated last week at the hands of a Nationalist fanatic.

Any demonstration that threaten to disturb peace will be promptly quelled, it was made known by the manifesto, which further declares that the funeral, scheduled for tomorrow, will be called off in the event of any disturbance occurring on that day.

To prevent any serious disturbance by the proletarians at this funeral, the police have begun a systematic round-up of all radical suspects with the view of holding them in custody of the city on the day of the funeral.

BRILLIANT BANQUET, BALL AWAIT CITIZEN DELEGATES TO COAST CONCLAVE HERE

Mosuke Kawahara Elected Speaker Of Japanese Diet

TOKYO, Mar. 14—(Special)—Mosuke Kawahara, the Seiyukai candidate for the position of speaker, was elected over Matajiro Koizumi, his Minseitō opponent, by the count of 238 votes to 159, in the Lower House of the Imperial Diet today.

The new speaker is a comparatively obscure personage, and considerable dissatisfaction is expressed among the political circles over his election. Hajime Motoda, the former speaker, resigned because of the untidy tactics employed by the opposition party in obstructing the passage of the election precinct bill now before the Parliament.

The general budget bill, one of the major measures put up by the Tanaka Cabinet, will in all probability pass the House of Peers at tomorrow's session. It has already been approved by the Lower House.
