ORIENTAL ART EXPERT HOLDS PRINT EXHIBIT

Back in San Francisco after years in Japan and China, Mrs. Bertha Lum, most famous of the Occidental experts of the ancient Oriental art of woodblock printing, will hold here the first exhibition of her more recent work, both original paintings and block prints in the ancient Chinese manner.

Mrs. Lum arrived a few days ago from the Orient with the special purpose of having 100 reproductions made of her latest work, the Madonna, painted to hang above the altar in the private chapel of Peiking Palace of His Excellency Archbishop Constantine, Apostolic Delegate to China.

THE MADONNA
The Madonna, with several other originals and a choice collection of manners will be exhibited in Gump's galleries beginning this week.

The painting of a Madonna, carrying with it the spirit of the Christian tradition, and yet understandable to the Oriental mind, presented some of the hardest problems ever encountered by Mrs. Lum in her long and successful career as a painter, whose work has received international notice and commendation.

Mrs. Lum, long a member of the San Francisco art colony, has had an exceptionally interesting career. Her art studies began at the Chicago Art Institute, but her special bent for block printing and painting in the Oriental manner did not manifest itself until she went to Japan on her honeymoon trip in 1908.

BLOCK PRINTING
Then the interest she had felt in Oriental art led her to study Japanese methods of block printing, to acquire tools and experiment with considerable success. Several years later she returned to Japan, served an apprenticeship of months under

At present, Dr. Lynn estimates, the Manchus in Peiping number about 350,000, a full third of the population.

When the Manchus conquered China in 1644, and set up their emperors on the Dragon Throne, Dr. Lynn declares, the Manchus became an arrogant race, treating the humble Chinese with undue severity.

The Manchus banner men, or soldiers, were so undisciplined in their attitude toward the Chinese that the Manchus emperors tried to divert their attention by persuading them to train birds and roll walnuts in their hands, diversions still common among the Manchus.

The Manchus are a very ancient race, Dr. Lynn points out. They first appear in Chinese chronicles as early as 2330 B. C., when they sent tribute to the Chinese Emperor. They were vassals, but always very independent, becoming stronger as the Chinese weakened, until they conquered Peking in 1644.

4 NORTH NET ACES REACH L.A. FOR MEET

Annual Classic To Be Staged At Tomio Court Sunday

LOS ANGELES, March 30.—(Special)—With the arrival of the four Japanese Tennis aces from San Francisco early this morning, the interest of the community is being centered on the annual North versus South Net Classic to take place at the Tomio Court on Sunday.

The Northern California team consists of Capt. Y. Kitsuada, the Shimura brothers, and G. Komiya-ma. They were selected after a series of eliminations conducted in the Round Robin system. Southern California's representatives are Captain S. Yoshikawa, K. Endo, and Maeno in the singles, with Yoshikawa - Saito and Maeno - Sasaki combinations upholding the southern team in the doubles.

The Annual California Japanese state singles and doubles championship tourney will be held on Monday at the Y. M. C. A. Courts. The members of the Northern delegation will in all probability compete in this event.

ILLITERACY HITS JAPAN

800,000 Cannot Read Or Write In Nippon Figures Show

TOKYO, March 30.—Japan's fame as one of the most enlightened nations on earth is greatly contradicted by the Education Office's recent astounding discovery that Japan today has 800,000 illiterates.

The Education Office has been astonished by this revelation, and will hereafter do its bit to educate as much as possible those "blind" who can see.

The office has been continuing the investigation since 1925, taking advantage of the nationwide conscription examinations held each year. The number of those who do not enter the primary schools or who quit the schools half way is decreasing, it was distinctly observed. But still, at the conscription examinations for 1926, it was discovered that 54,000 out of 514,364, or more than one percent of the total were found illiterate.

In 1927, 53,780 out of 573, 012 were found as such, and last year, the illiterates numbered over 50,000.

MANY WOMEN ILLITERATES
These are only the numbers for men, and if women are taken into consideration, the figures will be doubled. And further, taking the younger population into account, the probable number of ignorant people in Japan will run up to the amazing figure of 800,000.

The Education authorities made a thoroughgoing investigation as to how those ignorant people had failed to receive any sort of education. The reasons are classified as the following:
REASONS
1. Because of extreme poverty.
2. Because of some bodily defects or incurable illness, and other causes.

Those who could not receive education "because of extreme poverty" form by far the greatest number among all the men and women who cannot read or write, it has been found.

Professor Seishiro Aoki, of Tokyo Imperial University, an authority on criminology, studied the subject from the viewpoint of his own speciality, and discovered that 90 percent of the criminals are utterly uneducated.

The Education Office is now working on a plan of how to give equal chances to the poor children as well as those the better class youths are entitled to.

JAPAN TOLD U. S. PROTEST

Move Urged To Retaliate With Levy On Japan Silk, Tea

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Complaints of United States lumber interests against the proposed increase by Japan in the tariff on American lumber have been informally called to the attention of Japan by the State Department.

The Japanese tariff situation is being closely watched here and serious consideration is given at the capitol to suggestions for a retaliatory tariff on raw silk and tea imports to this country if the new Japanese tariff act is put into effect.

The lumber tariff, which puts a levy of 91 sen per koku (ten cubic feet) for uncut lumber, while a tax of 1.74 yen is levied on cut lumber. The present tariff is declared to be a hostile move on the part of the government against the United States lumber trade in favor of the Siberian trade.

WOMEN IN TOKIO VOTE

Fair Voters Are Conscientious In Trade Body Election

TOKYO.—Loyal Japanese women subjects, hundreds of them, came to the polls recently and voted conscientiously at the first general election of membership on the Tokyo Chamber of Commerce and Industry in accordance with the new trading law.

With the new rules stipulating that any enterprise paying over fifty yen business tax is entitled to a vote women owners of restaurants, "machiai", and inns, came in for a strong percentage as voters.

The lists showed that 944 votes could be cast by women out of a total of 13,888.

And evidently proud of this newly acquired right, duly came there women. No bobbed hair, or pert toggle hats, but stately matrons in classical Japanese headress.

Ranking for the first time as equal of men, they took an attitude befitting the occasion, even to one with her baby on her back, who emphatically refused to part with her

charge and finally overcame the objections of the Chamber of Commerce attendants.

PROUD MANCHU RACE WILL SOON VANISH SAYS SAVANT

PEKIN, March 30.—(UP)—The proud race of the Manchus, who ruled the Chinese Empire for more than two centuries, is vanishing, and likely to disappear almost altogether within the next two or three decades, in the opinion of Dr. Jernyn Lynn, Chinese professor of law at Chaooyang University of the Manchus for years.

The Manchus are like the famous Jewish colony in Honan province, Dr. Lynn believes, which managed to maintain a distinct existence for 400 years, but eventually was overwhelmed, being absorbed by the Chinese.

HOSEI PLANS HAWAII TRIP

Tokyo Varsity To Invade Island In May Of This Year

HONOLULU, March 30.—The Hosei University ball team of Japan will be at its best strength when it arrives in May for a series of games at the Honolulu Stadium with local teams.

First of all the team will be leaving Yokohama just about the time the annual spring baseball season of the five leading universities will have been over. Keio, last fall champions, Waseda, Meiji, Hosei and Rikkyo made up this loop, the major league of Japan, which will start going the first week in April.

Inability of the Hosei team to clinch the championship thus far lay to the lack of a good pitching staff but this weakness is felt to be eliminated during the coming season.

"BOZO" WAKABAYASHI
There is "Bozo" Wakabayashi, former star pitcher with the local Asahi team, heading the list of flingers. He is still in his prime and should give the local batters plenty of trouble.

The team will be bolstered up considerably by Suzuki and Yoshida, the two star pitchers that carried up the lowly Hosei team 2 years ago to second place almost solely with their work on the mound, return to school from the army, as it is hoped at the Hosei university.

Right now, the team has a good southpaw in Suzuki, not the Suzuki referred to in the foregoing paragraph.

TWO BEST PITCHERS
According to latest dispatches from Japan, two of the best high school pitchers throughout Japan in Matsuki of the Imabura high school and Yano of the Matsuyama commercial school have become members of the Hosei university. In all probability, they will make the jaunt to Hawaii.

The personnel of the team will be greatly decided upon the showing of the players in the spring baseball league. The mound work of three more candidates, Muraki from the Hokkaido high school, Noguchi, Marugami high school, and Yanagihara, Shiketsu Shogyo, will be watched with interest. It will be interesting to note that Muraki comes from one of the schools in the extreme north of Japan, Hokkaido or the land of the Ainus.

In the past few years the Los Angeles Sumo Association has been inviting professional and college wrestlers of Japan, but in the recent years this policy has been abandoned in order to create more interest in amateur wrestling.

LOS ANGELES, March 30.—(Special)—Following the announcement that Japan's middle school wrestling champs are invading this city for a tournament in the near future, the gallant amateur "dohyo" contestants of Southern California are getting into shape for the grand athletic event.

Among cities which will contribute strong delegations to this classic are Los Angeles, Burbank, Glendale, San Pedro, San Diego, and Torrance. The affair is being sponsored by the North American Sumo Association.

PACT FACES OPPOSITION

Privy Council Known To Be Hostile To Peace Treaty

TOKYO, March 30.—(Special)—Alarmed by the persistent gestures of hostility to the Kellogg anti-war pact manifested among the members of the Privy Council, the Tanaka government forces today resolved to hold a series of private conferences to persuade the councilors of the advisability of ratifying the pact at this time.

The Privy Council, chief advisory board of the Emperor, expects a powerful influence in the ratification of all treaties.
