RECEPTION IS CONSUL PLAN FOR CITIZENS

Parley Delegates To Be Entertained By Morikazu Ida

The official mansion of the Japanese Consul General will be the scene of a gala affair, when a number of Japanese citizens will be entertained at a reception Saturday afternoon from one o'clock, it was indicated yesterday by Minoru Iino, secretary at the consulate.

The party is being given in honor of the delegates to the Pacific Coast convention of Japanese American Citizen's Federation, convening in San Francisco Friday and Saturday, at the local Community House on Post street.

Besides the visiting delegates and members of the local citizens' body, there will be members of both the local Golden Echo Club of the Japanese Y. W. C. A. and the Young Women's Buddhist Association at this affair.

ENTERTAINMENT

The party will open with an address of welcome by Toyoyi Kaneko, vice-consul, followed by a series of entertainments by the talented young people of this city. They include a violin solo by Nobuhito Kodama, a vocal solo by Yoshio Iwawata, a trumpet solo by Hisashi Moriyama, and a series of songs by a chorus composed of the Misses Dorothy Fujita, Sophie Abe, Kaoru Saito, Saku Baba, and Setsu Sasaki. They will sing the "Trees," "Indian Love Call," and "Song of Hawaii."

SUPPER AND DANCE

Refreshments will be served later, and the rest of the afternoon until three o'clock will be devoted to informal conversations and fellowship.

Following the reception at the consul general's mansion, there will be a general assembly of citizens at the Community House. In the evening there will be an informal supper for the visiting delegates, followed by a ball, to be given by the Triple O and J. U. C. societies, of the East Bay and to which the delegates are invited.

Translation of Japanese Classic

By Waley Lauded

Again the Western reader is indebted to Arthur Waley as translator of the gems of ancient Oriental literature. This time it is for "The Pillow Book" of Sei Shonagon, a lady of the Japanese court at the close of the tenth century. It is in the form of a diary and judging from some of the entries she did well to keep it under her pillow.

Raymond Weaver in his brilliant book "The Pillow Book" among the "authentic saints," but however, authentic as a chronicler, at least not as measured by modern standards. A quaint woman in a quaint little world, Sei Shonagon regales us with its peculiar contrasts and seeming contradictions. It was literary but not intellectual and was as little concerned with the future as with the remote past.

Sufficient for the day was the poem thereof and everybody of importance was expected to write a poem. Penmanship was even more important than poetry, especially in a woman. Many a love affair began in a chance view of a woman's handwriting.

It was a period of what was then modernism and freedom. Religious ceremonies were viewed as pageantry, but though one might act as one pleased it was deemed disgraceful to misunderstand a literary allusion.

LOVE CAUSE OF SUICIDE

Body of L. A. Man And Fresno Woman Are Found in L. A.

LOS ANGELES, April 3—(Special)—Man's failure in business and a woman's love for her brother-in-law is attributed by the police today as the cause of the double suicide of a Japanese man and woman found late yesterday beneath the Sepulveda boulevard bridge near Van Nuys, 20 miles northeast of Los Angeles.

Police identified the woman as Kae Miyamoto, 24, wife of Sukeichi Miyamoto, a restaurant proprietor in Reedley, near Fresno. The man was found to be her brother-in-law, Tomokichi Hanabata, a middle-man for farm products in Los Angeles. The two were shot in the head. Three guns were found near the corpses. Two of the guns each had one discharged cartridge. A bottle of liquor, together with their last testament, were also found near the bodies.

BODY FOUND BY MEXICANS

The remains of the couple were found by Mexicans who passed there on their way to a strawberry ranch. The dead, attired in bright clothes, seemed to indicate that they had gone through the solemn rites of death past following the ancient custom of Japan. The "sake" was used in this grim death ceremony, it is believed by the authorities.

Hanabata has contracted a business debt of \$981.14 and personal obligations of \$2400. In his will he specified that the debts are to be paid by the refund from the insurance policies of the Western States and the Sun Life Assurance of Canada. His will reveals that he was despondent because of his failure in business and the circulating rumor that he was in love with his sister-in-law.

"HAPPY TO DIE WITH HIM"

The woman's will charges her husband, Sukeichi Miyamoto with cruelty. While there was no sentimental attachment between herself and Hanabata at first, the persistent rumors had caused her to love him, she will further disclosed. "I am happy to die with him," she will said.

The corpse of the two are at the Van Nuys undertakers following the coroner's investigation. FRESNO, April 3—(Special)—Mrs. Kae Miyamoto, whose body was found today under a bridge in Van Nuys a victim of a double suicide, was missing since the Reedley picnic held on Sunday, March 17.

BOTH MRS. MIYAMOTO AND HANABATA

are from Wakayama prefecture, and they are related through the marriage of Hanabata's mother to the father-in-law of Mrs. Kae Miyamoto.

Movie Drama of Japan Knight To Feature Local Benefit

The life of a chivalrous knight of Old Nippon, Nakayama Yasubei, one of the famous "Forty Seven Ronin" of the Genroku Era, will be screened Sunday night in the benefit show to be given by the Kyowa Gakuen, down town Japanese language school, at the local Kinmon Gakuen auditorium on Bush street.

The central character of the movie drama, "Nakayama Yasubei," who is more popularly known by the name of his adopted family, Horibe Yasubei, is one of the best known figures in the tale of the Forty Seven Ronin. This chivalrous Samurai gains the favor of the most beautiful ladies of the time and wins the admiration of his future father by his swordsmanship. The hero's prowess is recognized when he combats singlehanded with dozen touted men of the time at an inn at Takada.

The other picture on the program is "Guzukame Gozen," a Japanese slap stick comedy.

COLOR PRINTS OF NIPPON

Masanobu Okumura and Some Representative Painters of Genre Pictures

By the middle of the Tokugawa period ukiyoe painting had a great school. One famous artist of genres at that time was Itcho Hanabusa. But he was not a mere ukiyoe painter. His real name was Shinko Taga, Itcho Hanabusa being his nom de plume. His father, Hokian Taga, practiced medicine. In the 6th year of Kanbun (1666) Itcho coming up to Yedo from his native place, studied painting under Yasunobu Kano.

He was skilled in genre painting. At first he signed his works with the name of Shinko or Ushimaro, but later, shaving the head, he called himself Choko. His designs and style were excellent, and he invented his own style. This departure from his teacher's manner so much offended the teacher that he was expelled. He was many sided and wrote a good hand. He learned haiku under Basho, and was friendly with Kikaku and Ransetsu. He also had a taste for music.

FOREMOST PAINTER

He was involved in a certain affair, and in December in the 11th year of Genroku (1689) he was banished to a remote island. He lived in exile for twelve years, after which he was pardoned in September in the 6th year of Hoyer (1709). From then, he called himself Itcho Hanabusa. He died at the age of 73 in the 9th year of Kyoho (1724).

About this time prints made marked progress. The period of their infancy had passed long since, and they had evolved from simple black color printing to tan-ye (red coloring), then to urushi-ye (lacquer) and finally into beni-ye (crimson printing). It took about six years to go through these stages.

THEATRICAL POSTER

The Torii family painted exclusively theatrical posters as their hereditary work, but subsequently, they additionally made prints of likenesses of famous actors as required by theatre-goers. This gave a sound footing to prints. They were published every time new plays went on the boards and were demanded more and more among the public. Consequently they came to have men who specially painted them, and there were not a few publishers of them, of whom the most noted was Okumura, a painter, carried on the Genroku, in which name Masanobu publishing business.

FOREMOST UAINTER

Masanobu Okumura was known by the nom de plume of Hogetsudo, Tanchosai, Bunkaku, Shimnyo or Baio. He made numerous prints in the periods of urushi-ye and beni-ye, contributing much towards the development of prints. As a painter, he stands foremost among his contemporaries in the Kyoho era (1716-1734). He was also a good composer of haiku. He died at the age of 79 in the 5th year of Meiwa (1768). Among his contemporaries, Shigetsuna Nishimura and Toyonobu Ishikawa were famous, each having a style of his own. The men of the Torii school rendered good service in the development of prints, and Kiyomatsu Torii coming after Kiyonobu the Second and Kiyomatsu

China Will Dispatch Order To Stop Anti-Nippon Boycott

NANKING, China, April 3—(Special)—In order to show China's good faith following the conclusion of the Sino-Japanese accord, the Central Executive Council of the Nationalist government today decided to issue orders for prohibition of all anti-Japanese movement within China.

Marshal Chiang Kai-shek, supreme commander of the Nationalist military and President of China, left Kiu Kiang today for the war front up the Yangtze River toward the rebel headquarters in Wu-chang.

The Wuhan rebel army is being withdrawn from Hankow to Wu-chang across the Yangtze River, where it is determined to make a stand against the combined forces of Marshal Chiang and General Feng. The latter is advancing his troops from Honan province to aid the cause of the Nationalists.

The foreign settlement in Hankow is being protected with a barred wire barricade to prevent the recurrence of another international tragedy of a year ago.

The Wuhan rebel army is being withdrawn from Hankow to Wu-chang across the Yangtze River, where it is determined to make a stand against the combined forces of Marshal Chiang and General Feng. The latter is advancing his troops from Honan province to aid the cause of the Nationalists.

The foreign settlement in Hankow is being protected with a barred wire barricade to prevent the recurrence of another international tragedy of a year ago.
