400 ATTEND PICNIC HELD BY OAKLAND

Foot of Mt. Diablo
Scene of Kumamoto
Kyokai Outing

OAKLAND, April 8—(Special)—A spacious green pasture by a murmuring brook, surrounded by beautiful hills on three sides, and the famous "Camel's Back" protruding in the background of spangles aqua-sky, offered an ideal place for the picnic of the Oakland Kumamoto Kyokai held Sunday afternoon at the foot of Mt. Diablo near Concord.

Four hundred people enjoyed the outing.

All kinds of novel races for children, elder people, and girls, besides special track events, were conducted most successfully on a regular oval shaped turf track, under the capable direction of Mr. Akahoshi, chairman of the athletic events.

SHOW EXHIBITION

Showa Dipsea team, otherwise a bunch of distance runners from San Francisco, appeared in four exhibition meets against the best track athletes of the region to win all of the first and second places.

The final mile run was an exciting event. All of the spectators gathered to witness the race, while several American neighbors entered in the contest. Good team work on the part of Nobu Tabata and others enabled the Showa boys to lap the other contestants and finish in wonderful condition, capping the first four places.

YMCA PLANS 2ND ANNUAL JAPAN TOUR

Party To Leave This
Port June 5 For
50-Day Trip

Encouraged by the success of the last year's "Hands-Across-the-Pacific" tour to Pismo, the San Francisco Y. M. C. A. is sponsoring this year another student party to visit the Island Empire and study her culture that a greater friendship and understanding may be fostered between the two countries.

The sailing date has been set at June 5, and the trip will consume fifty days.

The party will consist of Y. M. C. A. members from all over Northern California between the ages of 16 and 18 who are either senior students of high school or freshmen in some institution of higher learning.

The group will be lead by a university professor. A Y. M. C. A. director who will be responsible for the conduct of the boys.

These students will leave the port on June 6 aboard the S.S. Shinnyo Maru and arrive in Japan in time to attend the International Y. M. C. A. Conference, which will convene in July.

The trip itinerary includes Korea, China, and the major portion of Japan. The students will return to San Francisco in fifty days with the S. S. Shinnyo Maru.

Japanese students are welcome to join the party, and the expenses will be less than 500 dollars. Those wishing to make the trip are requested to get in touch with K. Tomizawa, executive secretary of the Japanese Y. M. C. A.
