

Foot of Mt. Diablo Scene of Kumamoto Kyokai Outing

OAKLAND, April 8.—(Special)—A spacious green pasture by a murmuring brook, surrounded by beautiful hills on three sides, and the famous "Camel's Back" protruding in the background of spotless azure sky, offered an ideal place for the picnic of the Oakland Kumamoto Kaigai Kyokai held Sunday afternoon at the foot of Mt. Diablo near Concord.

Four hundred people enjoyed the outing. All kinds of novel races for children, elder people, and girls, besides special track events, were conducted most successfully on a regular oval shaped turf track, under the capable direction of Mr. Akahoshi, chairman of the athletic events.

Shows Dipsea team, otherwise a bunch of distance runners of San Francisco, appeared in four exhibition meets against the best track athletes of the region to win all of the first and second places.

Party To Leave This Port June 5 For 50-Day Trip

Encouraged by the success of the last year's Hands-Across-the-Pacific tour to Japan, the San Francisco Y. M. C. A. is sponsoring this year another student party to visit the Island Empire and study her culture that a greater friendship and understanding may be fostered between the two countries.

The sailing date has been set at June 5, and the trip will consume fifty days.

Kobe Indians In Row Over Welcome To British Duke

KOBE, Japan, April 7.—(Special)—Whether Indians in this city should participate in the welcome for H. R. H. the Duke of Gloucester when he arrives here some time in the near future was the topic of heated discussion at a special meeting of the Indian Community held in the Indian Club Assembly.

A. N. Flutechally presided over the meeting, which was attended by about 65 Indian residents. The British Duke is arriving to Japan to present the Order of the Garter to the Japanese Emperor.

After a very heated discussion, the meeting passed a resolution by a narrow majority of four (32 against) which they considered neutral) in favour of having a representative on the proposed to be formed by representatives of the local British community.

When the meeting proceeded to elect the Indian representative on the committee, the opposition bloc walked out in a body, expressing their opinion that they could not very well support the purpose of a gathering which they considered was working against the interests of their country. The opposition further argued that it was not a matter of pride for the Indians to be able to distinguish themselves as British subjects. After their walking out, the remaining members elected Mr. S. C. Das to serve on the British reception committee for H. R. H. the Duke of Gloucester, as a representative of the local Indian community.

Ninety Per Cent Of Tsinan Japanese To Leave For Home

TOKYO, Apr. 8.—(Special)—Fearing recurrence of serious disturbances that may result in loss of many lives, ninety per cent of the Japanese residents of Tsinan have decided to leave that city when the Japanese troops evacuate in the near future.

The Japanese troops will not be withdrawn from the Shantung province, in which Tsinan is located, in accordance with the terms of the recently concluded Sino-Japanese treaty.

WOMAN, 35, DROWNS SELF

Dependancy Cause Of Courtland Suicide, Body Recovered

COURTLAND, Calif., April 8.—(Special)—Investigations were conducted today by the local authorities on the death of Mrs. Chiyoye Jimbo, 35, whose body was found in the Sacramento river Sunday morning.

Dependancy over her lack of vigilance when her two-year-old child, who drank poisonous nicotine from the pear spray, was attributed as the cause of her strange disappearance and subsequent suicide in the Sacramento river. The child, who swallowed the spray water did not suffer serious consequences.

The mother was the wife of Shintaro Jimbo, farmer, whose residence is located about a mile from this city. He is from Wakayama prefecture, Japan.

A few years ago the couple lost two children through a fire that consumed their home. Brooding over the death of these two children and her lack of care over the little child who drank the nicotine solution probably led her to take her life. It is believed by the neighbors that she had been extremely congenial with one another, it was noted.

Honest Peddler of Tokyo Overjoyed As He Receives Reward

TOKYO, April 3.—(Special)—He was just an old wobby "issen amey" or penny peddler, named Katsuhiko Takabe. His back was bent with age, and he thought the world a gloomy place in which to live.

Then one day he found a purse wrapped in a silk handkerchief containing \$5,000 in 50 ¥100 bills. He brought the purse to the office of Musashikoyama Station on the Meguro-Kamata electric line.

Soon afterwards the owner of the lost purse made his appearance at the office. He was Dr. Banju Sekiguchi, Professor of the Medical Department of the Tohoku Imperial University.

The professor accompanied by the candy peddler proceeded to the Osaka Police station to report the case and at the station in the presence of the officers the "issen amey" was given ¥600 for turning the purse over to its owner.

Receiving the large sum of money as a reward Takabe was overcome with unexpected joy. He returned home on a taxi guarded by an officer despatched by the police.

He no longer thought the world a dark place.


