Buddhist Rites Will Unite Terakawa And Miss Yoshioka

OAKLAND, Apr. 27—The wedding of Miss Hanako Flora Yoshioka, prominent Buddhist leader of this city, and Reverend Tansai Terakawa of Stockton will take place on Tuesday evening, May 2, at the local Buddhist Temple, it is announced by Mr. and Mrs. Tadaichi Yoshioka, parents of the bride-to-be.

As the couple are both prominent in the Buddhist circles of Northern California, a large attendance is expected at this nuptial, which is to be held from six o'clock. The Buddhist Church is located at Jackson and Sixth streets.

Miss Hanako Yoshioka is president of the Young Women's Buddhist Association of Oakland, as well as second vice-president of the Bay District Y. W. B. A. League. She is a resident of Hayward and a graduate of a local high school.

Reverend Tansai Terakawa, more commonly known as Herbert Kiyoshi Terakawa, is a graduate of the Buddhist University of Tokyo. After his graduation he went to Hawaii for a study of Buddhist mission in the United States. While in Hawaii he was secretary of the Young Men's Buddhist Association there. He later arrived in California, where he matriculated at Stanford University and achieved his master's degree in psychology.

While attending the university he took active part in the Y. M. B. A. movement of Northern California. He was elected its first president, and later he was unanimously chosen its chief advisor. He has recently been engaged as the priest of the new Buddhist Temple of Stockton. Besides being a popular lecturer on Buddhism, he also is an accomplished writer, and his philosophical essays have appeared successively in 1928 and 1929 New Year editions of the English section of The Japanese American News.

The first New American Citizens Convention, with delegates all the way from Seattle in the north to Brawley in the south in attendance, was held in San Francisco recently.

A. U. Women's Swimming Championships at Honolulu at the War Memorial pool at Waikiki on the evenings of August 7, 8, 9 and 10, have been announced.

Japan Stands 5th Among Richest Nations of World

TOKYO, April 27—Japan stands fifth among the nations of the world in point of wealth, according to statistics compiled by and released for publication by the cabinet. The figures show Japan is, in terms of yen and sen, worth 123,430,000,000 yen.

Six years ago, Japan's wealth was estimated at 102,300,000,000 yen, showing that during this short time the country's assets increased by about 21,000,000,000 yen.

Choei Kondo, vice president of the society, delivered a talk on "The East and the West—Their Differences." Very instructive was the talk by Dr. Sekiyama on the "History of Japanese Medicine." Vice Consul Takasaki contributed to the success of the evening with words of greetings.

The Japanese Medical Association is a branch of the International Medical Association of Los Angeles, which includes members of different nationalities and which holds regular monthly meetings to discuss problems of importance to their professional duties and to further the friendship of the different national groups.

Aliens Illegally Entered In U. S. To Be Hit Heavily

HONOLULU, April 27—Any alien who attempts to re-enter the United States illegally after he has been deported from the country is guilty of felony under the new law of the United States and is punishable by imprisonment up to two years and a fine of \$1000, according to Alfred E. Burnett, district immigration director at Honolulu.

TOKYO, April 27—To augment the increasing export of green tea to Europe and America, the directors of the Japanese Tea Growers Association today decided to prepare the Ceylon and crushed variety of tea as a new venture to bid for more extensive market.

Five-Day Conclave In Hollywood Will Encourage Goodwill

LOS ANGELES, April 27—Many and diverse nationalities will be represented when delegates from the Western states assemble here for the conference of the Pacific Coast Good will Association, to convene at the Hollywood Congregational Church for five days, May 2 to 6. Japan will be represented at this parley by Dr. Roy Akagi, general secretary of the Japanese Student Christian Association of America, and Ken Nakazawa, professor of a university here and well known contributor to the Atlantic Monthly. They will both speak on the future outlook of Japan's relations with the United States.

There will also be very prominent American leaders in the educational, political, economic, and religious circles. The purpose of the parley is to extend the spirit of international cooperation and help to dispel martial spirit with idea of peace and good will among the nations as well as among the people.

Japanese Student At Oregon U Works For Pacific Agency

EUGENE, Oregon, April 27—Here for the dual purpose of promoting friendly relations between the United States and Japan and to gain a knowledge of sociology and social conditions in this country, Yoshi Otsuka, of Tokyo, graduate of Waseda University, has enrolled in the graduate school of the University of Oregon.

Although he has only been here a few weeks Otsuka is already active in promoting friendly international relations, and he believes that in such a project contacts between individuals will do most for a better understanding. Acting upon his theory, he has obtained the names of all students of the University of Oregon and has sent them to Waseda University students. These students will then send small gifts to their fellow students here, and an exchange of correspondence is expected to follow.

Otsuka was encouraged to come to Oregon by a book written by Dr. P. A. Parsons, head of the school of sociology here. He is studying on the campus this year, will spend next year in the school of applied sociology of the University of Portland. From there he will go to Columbia University, and following a trip to Europe, will return to Japan. He has offered free instruction in Japanese to students of the Oregon University.

U. S. Follower Of Buddha Will Study Religion In Japan

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS TOKYO, April 27—Myradu Saburo, 43, an ardent woman Buddhist devotee of Oakland, arrived here yesterday from San Francisco aboard the N. Y. K. liner Siberia Maru for an extended research of the Zen sect of Buddhism.

She is planning upon a trip to the Daikoku Temple of Kyoto, where she intends to submerge herself completely in prayer and meditation to achieve the state of Nirvana. After this intense period of devotion, she will leave this country for India, where she will make a thorough study of Buddhism from original sources. She expects to make a pilgrimage to the birthplace of Buddha and study the ancient documents locked in the safe of the temples there.

JAPAN PLANS BIG HIGHWAY

80,000,000 Yen To Be Used In Road From Osaka To Tokyo

TOKYO, Japan—A project to link Tokyo with Osaka by a paved highway, exclusively for omnibuses, is being planned by a syndicate of 25 financiers, capitalized at ¥80,000,000, headed by Mr. Daishiro Fukuzawa, of Osaka, near Tokyo. Applications for permits have been filed with the Prefectural Governors of Tokyo, Kanagawa, Yamanashi, Shizuoka, Aichi, Gifu, Mie, Shiga, Kyoto and Osaka, which districts the proposed highway is expected to penetrate.

The plan calls for the building of a concrete road, with asphalt surface, 36 feet wide. The total distance surveyed is 360 miles 64 chains, with the eastern terminus at Osaka, adjoining Shinagawa, Tokyo, and the western terminus somewhere in Higashinari-ku, Osaka.

50 BUSES TO BE OPERATED If the plan materializes, the promoters intend to run a fleet of 50 buses at the outset and then gradually increase the number of cars. The tariff to be charged generally will be on the basis of 3 sen a mile for passengers, while 30 sen per ton-mile will be charged for freight.

OSAKA BEAUTY SPOT AND HISTORIC TEMPLES LAUDED

Kiyomizu Temple: The origin of this temple dates from before the removal of the capital to Kyoto. Its buildings were repeatedly burnt to the ground in those days of sanguinary warfare, and the present structure represents the construction effected by Iemitsu, the third Tokugawa Shogun in 1633. The divinity enshrined in this temple is the eleven-faced and one-thousand-handed Kannon. The pictures of trading ships of Suwayoshi and Sumikura are of great historical interest. The main temple, the West Gate, the three-storied pagoda, and the bellry are valuable structures under the special protection of the Government. The interior of this temple is lavishly decorated with elaborate carvings by master artists. The bellry contains a bell which is one of the three famous temple bells in Japan.

ARASHIYAMA Arashiyama: This is a continuation of the mountain range extending from the south of Yamabe province. It abounds in cherry trees which were originally transplanted from Mount Yoshino by the retired Emperor Kameyama. The place is regarded as the foremost of spots in and about Kyoto, the season's attractions being the pink floral clouds in spring, green foliage in summer, crimson tints of maple leaves in autumn, and silvery snow mantles in winter.

The Oi River flowing along the foot of the hill is a clear stream, and floating on it are seen pleasure boats laden with holiday makers. A bridge named Togetsu-kyo spans the river, and walking over it in the southerly direction one comes to Nakajima Park. On the elevation beyond stands the temple of Kokuno. Going along the foot of Arashiyama by the stream, one passes the pretty fall of Tonase and the emerald pool of Chidori and in a few minutes reaches the Daikoku.

Arashiyama Park consists of the Enryakuji Temple. Stands on Mount Hiei. The mountain is on the border of the provinces of Yamashiro and Omi, towering to a height of 2,700 feet above sea-level. The highest peak is called Shimo-gatake. Toward the west, Mount Hiei commands a bird's-eye view of Kyoto, and towards the east the fantastic scenery of Lake Biwa.

The Enryakuji on the mountain was founded in 1448 by Denkyo Daishi. It stood as a guardian of the Mikado's Palace and at the height of its glory, it had three thousand priests' residences. Structure of Rare Beauty Costing Twenty Five Million Yen To Be Built To House the Bank of Nippon in Tokyo

TOKYO, April 27—The bank of Japan, which corresponds the Federal Reserve Bank in the United States, will spend 25,000,000 yen for a magnificent new structure to be constructed on the ground next to the present building.

Japan's eminent architects and designers will be employed in the building of the edifice, which is expected to surpass The National Bank of England, the Reich Bank of Germany and the Federal Reserve Bank of New York in the beauty of design. It will be four or five stories high with a basement of three stories.

The present project has been necessitated by the great expansion of business in recent years. Extensions have been conducted to the present building, but this system proved inadequate in keeping pace with the growth of business. The new structure will give an impressive picture to the district already noted for large structures such as the Yokohama Specie Bank and the Mitsukoshi Department store.

DEMOCRATS SHOW POWER

90 Per Cent of Labor Votes Won By Democrats In Nippon

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS TOKYO, April 27—Remarkable strength of the Social Democratic party in the field of proletarian votes in the city and county elections held throughout the country was indicated today in the face of incomplete results tabulated here.

The Social Democratic party, which is a conservative faction of the proletarian group, has elected ninety percent of the successful labor candidates for the various city and county assemblies. It was indicated here. As to what percentage the successful labor candidates constitute in the field of all other candidates, it was not ascertained.

The popularity of the Social Democratic party is due to its concrete and practical platform as against the too radical and visionary policies of the other labor parties. It is believed by political observers. The Social Democrats are headed by Itoh Abe, veteran labor leader and former Waseda professor, who is now on his way to the United States to visit his daughter and grandchildren in Los Angeles.

300 MEN WILL LOSE JOBS

Here the sanitary associations and the citizens at large are up against a tough proposition, for the sawdust, scrap wood and bark are not charred to ashes, but are directly burned half way into charcoal, which in turn is shipped out to briquet factories.

Inasmuch as 300 men are earning their livelihood by this, the elimination of this, would throw them out of work. Even were it not so, the stinging of hard times is creating enough unemployment, let alone make additional men jobless.

On the other hand, the Tsurumachi district has hitherto been considered the only healthy spot on the Osaka waterfront. In fact, there are scores of dwellings owned and operated by the City, whereas the development of lumber trade and the subsequent burning are endangering the health and sanitation of the inhabitants.

WHAT OFFICIALS SAY

Concerning this, one of the officials of the sanitary associations remarked: "Of course much depends on the direction from which the wind blows, but on an average the smoke and soot become absolutely unbearable every fifth day. When it is worst, you cannot see 60 feet off. If it were not for the certainty that the elimination would throw 300 men out of jobs, the matter might yet be adjusted easily. As it is, we do not know what to do.

"The worst of it is that the particular vacant lot in which they burn the sawdust and scrap wood is in the center of all the districts affected, and consequently no matter which way the wind blows, some people are always affected. At any rate, something must be done, and done quickly."

SOOT HARMS OSAKA CITY

Employment Problem Causes Deadlock In Factory Ban

OSAKA, Japan—The Osaka waterfront is facing a problem—or rather is placed in a dilemma where they must choose between throwing 300 labourers out of their jobs or withstand the smoke and soot ejected from burning sawdust, scrap wood and bark of innumerable lumber mills, flanking Tsurumachi, Kobayashi-cho and Minami-Oka-Okamajima-cho.

So tremendous is the volume of smoke and soot coming from that source that even in a clear day, the Osaka waterfront is covered with a haze, too thick to clearly see 10 yards off, while at night, this smoky haze, fanned by the vapour from the bay, finds its way into most of the 3,500 dwellings in the neighborhood.

Approximately 50,000 persons live in these districts, and despite the painstaking efforts by the sanitary associations, no one has yet found any remedial measures, excepting the possible stoppage of the burning of the said sawdust, scrap wood and bark on the adjoining hill.
