EVENTS FOR TRACK MEET IN S. F. TOLD

Two Stadiums Are Reserved for North- ern Turney

Two of the San Francisco's largest stadiums have been reserved for the Northern California Japanese Track and Field championship meet which will be held on June 9, under the auspices of the newly organized J. A. A. U. of San Francisco.

Due to unfavorable conditions of the Kezar Stadium field about that time, the shot put, discus, pole vault, and javelin events will be run in the order mentioned at the Golden Gate Park Stadium, it was announced by the committee. These events will commence from 11 o'clock.

The track events and the jumps will be held at the Kezar oval in the following order:

ORDER OF EVENTS

60 yard trial, 440 yard trial, 1 mile, 220 yard trial, girls' 100 yard trial, Junior 100 yard trial, low hurdle, broad jump, 100 yard trial, 880 yard, 220 final, girls' 100 yard final, Junior 100 yard final, 60 yard final, 440 yard final, 2 miles, 100 yard final, high jump, 880 yard relay, (relay final if no trial necessary), girls' relay (8 girls each running 55 yards), Junior 440 relay, 880 relay final (if trials were held), announcement of the score, Medley relay (440, 220, 880, and mile, run by four runners), awarding of prizes.

5 TEAM PRIZES

An athlete may enter any three events and relays. The points in junior, girls', and special relay events will not be counted in the score for the team trophies, which will be awarded to the first five teams scoring the most number of points on the basis of 5, 3, 2, 1 as announced before.

INDIVIDUAL PRIZES

Individual winners of each event will be awarded beautiful silver loving cups, while other prizes will be awarded to the second and third place winners. These prizes will be announced later.

INVITATION

Any Japanese athlete of a recognized Japanese organization is eligible to enter. No entrance fees are required, and no admission will be charged the spectators.

It is the wish of the sponsors that, while there are no outstanding track athletes in Northern California at present, the tourney will produce a team which will compare well with Southern California Japanese aggregations.

Feng Masses His
Troops To Shansi
For Contingency

NANKING, April 30—One more step toward the imminent Chiang-Feng outbreak was taken today when General Feng massed his troops under General Sun at the border of Honan and Shansi provinces.

The entire Feng faction in the Nationalist government of this city resigned today en masse, including Foreign Vice Minister Tan Yeh-liang and Army Minister Lu Chung-lin and others.

The Central Executive Committee held an extraordinary session last night and issued orders commanding the formal eviction of General Sun, Feng's military chieftain, as governor of Shantung district. General Sun had already tendered his resignation a few days ago.

It is believed that General Feng had massed his troops on the Shansi frontier to prepare for possible hostile action on the part of General Yen Shih-san, warlord of Shansi province, who is expected to side in with Marshal Chiang Kai-shek, nominal president of China.

MISS HITOMI TRIMS MARK

Japan Wonder Athlete Bettors World Re- cord At Meet

TOKYO, April 30—Miss Kinme Hitomi, Japan's woman wonder athlete, who was the sensation at the International Athletic Tournament in Stockholm in 1927, today established a new world record when she achieved a total of 216 points in the triathlon event in the All-Japan Women's Olympic tournament staged in the Jingū stadium through the sponsorship of the Japanese Women Sports Union.

Miss Hitomi made the 100 meters in 12 seconds, to achieve 87 points. She cleared the bar at 1.45 meter in the high jump for 70 points, and threw the javelin 33.13 meters for 59 points. Her high jump achievement sets a new Japanese record.

World Advance In Women Activities Noted By Scholar

KOBE, Japan—"The Widening of Women's Interests," was the topic of an address delivered here by Miss Isabelle MacCauley, American sociologist and lecturer, who recently returned from her 15-month trip in the United States in connection with the drive for the Kobe College fund.

She referred to the efforts of many distinguished women leaders of various countries to uphold the cause of various worthy social work, and to help better conditions in the world.

Among such women leaders of the world, whose activities were cited as examples of the widening scope of modern women's interests, were Madame Naidhu, the Indian Mayress, who was decorated by the King of England for her practical aid of the sufferers at the time of a terrible flood in Hyderabad; Miss Techeng, the prominent woman leader of China, and author and lawyer at the same time, who is Rector of Law in the University of Shanghai; the Danish Minister of education who is a woman and who was given her important portfolio for equal educational opportunities for all; Miss Take Fujita who made a most effective appeal for the welfare of children at the last Pan-Pacific Conference in Honolulu; the women members of the British Association for the Advancement of Science whose papers laid before its recent conference aroused considerable interest and favorable comments in the British press; Jane Adams, generally regarded as the most distinguished citizen of Chicago, who is interested in the children of immigrants and in justice for their mothers; Lady Astor, of England, and the late Madame Yamajima, of Japan, whose names are intimately associated with the pro-birth movement; Judge Florence Allen in the Domestic Courts of America and an increasing number of women in Japan who are all trying to reduce the number of children exposed to the disgrace of public trial; nine women mayors in America, and the increasing number of women parliamentary members in England and America.
