JAPAN VOICES OBJECTION TO 5-5-3 RATIO

Gibson's Proposal Is Commended In Principle By Expert

By HUGH BYAS TOKYO, April 25—Vice Admiral Baron Sakamoto, naval member of the House of Peers, whose speeches on naval questions are a feature of every session, discussed the Gibson proposal with your correspondent today. Though his opinions are not official, they are probably a fairly good reflection of Japanese naval opinion generally. He welcomed the American move with genuine warmth, saying: "It is a most timely move. It changes the whole outlook for disarmament from gloom to sunshine."

At the same time he frankly indicated that Japan would not be willing to accept the 5-5-3 ratio for all classes naval vessels. Baron Sakamoto emphasized the importance of the United States having made the move to break the deadlock, and added: "SHIPS TO BE LISTED"

"The details are all-worked out. Until they have been worked out it will be premature to express any definite opinion, but the spirit of conciliation and compromise is the first essential, and America has introduced it."

Baron Sakamoto agreed that all ships, including subsidized lines, which were liable to be commandeered in wartime, ought to be listed, but he would except submarines of less than 600 tons, which being weak weapons and not able to operate at a distance, might be left without restrictions.

"Would it be possible for Japan to meet her cruiser needs within the global 5-5-3 ratio under the Gibson plan for the transfer of tonnage?" the baron was asked. "That question can only be answered after a full technical examination," he replied. "Could Japan accept the 5-5-3 ratio in cruisers?"

"No, there is nothing sacred about the 5-5-3 ratio. It was not rationally arrived at, nor is it a scientific formula. It is merely an expression of the relative positions which happened to be satisfactory as regards battleships. There is no reason why it should be applied to all classes. You have but to look at the geographical positions to see how different the needs of the various countries are."

The final words of Baron Sakamoto were that this question must be settled by statesmen on broad grounds of national policy and not left to the naval experts.

Nishi Nihei, in an editorial, declares that the plan is acceptable in principle and that Japan should agree to it if the details prove reasonable.

The journal rejects the 5-5-3 ratio for the cruisers and admits the plan provides scope for variation, according to national requirements. But it thinks selection will be difficult owing to tactical reasons. The paper regards the suggestion that age and speed must be reckoned as very important and says it must be thoroughly explored.

JAPAN BANS GEN. CHANG

Chinese Rebel Leader Seeking Refuge In Port Arthur

TOKYO, May 2—Press dispatches from Bairen, Liaotung (Japanese territory) said that Marshal Chang Tsung Chang, former Shantung war lord, appeared off port Arthur in a native junk this morning and was prevented from landing by Japanese police. He was in disguise.

The Japanese authorities of the Kwantung leased territory denied the defeated war lord refuge, charging he had abused his former status there with his abortive coup in Shantung.

Since Chang Hsueh-Liang has ordered Chang arrested if he enters Manchuria he is now in the position where if he lands anywhere along the Chinese littoral he faces almost certain execution.

Hence it was thought he would turn to Japan proper where it was believed the authorities would permit him to reside under surveillance.

Origin of Japan Race Is Central Asia Says Savant

TOKYO—As a result of study of Oriental music and musical instruments, Hisao Tanabe, well known authority on the music of Asia, traces the origin of the Japanese race to Central Asia. A new desert territory east of the Caspian Sea and north of Tibet is believed by Mr. Tanabe to be the cradle of the Yamato race. The tribe of the region are believed to have scattered in many directions, and one of the off-shoots migrated directly eastward across the continent to Japan, while another band moved by water via India to the islands of the South Seas.

Mr. Tanabe does not make a positive statement as he has not yet made exhaustive studies on the subject, but he pointed out strong proofs in the similarity of the musical instrument, the Yamato Koto, to the ancient six stringed Hebrew instrument. No ancient Asiatic people used a six stringed instrument except the Hebrews and the Japanese. The manner it was played in ancient times is the same in the two peoples, according to descriptions given in history. Mr. Tanabe has also noted that an Assyrian harp is treasured in Shosho-in temple at Nara, which though made in Korea, is of Assyrian design. A similarity in musical scale between the ancient Hebrew music and old Japanese Court songs has been also noted. Mr. Tanabe has been studying Oriental music for 30 years and has travelled extensively in China, Si-

10,000 GRADS DESIRE WORK

Jobs Needed For Vast Army of Japan College Graduates

Only 10 per cent of the entire number of primary school graduates in Japan go to higher schools, but even at that rate about 10,000 graduates of colleges and universities are turned out annually to face the world in the last few years.

This was disclosed by Mr. Usa, government employment expert, in a round table conference held in Tokyo among the government officials and Japan large employers recently.

Mr. Usa further pointed out that engineers of different fields fare best, while the graduates of more academic courses are suffering from lack of employment. Mr. Kubo, head of the Central Employment Bureau, which specializes in the handling of the workers of the educated classes, reported that his field of work was the hardest since the requirements of the employers were more exacting than in the cases of securing unskilled labor.

Many suggestions from the point of view of the employers were given from the audience. Comparing the three kinds of employees obtained by the three methods of personal introduction, agency of the bureau and newspaper advertisement, one employer stated that the first kind was steady but slow worker, the second steady and quick in his work and the third was not up to the standards of the others. However, the fact that the workers obtained through the agencies were apt to be dissatisfied with the same work for long periods seemed to be the chief objection. Methods to induce their stability, such as bonus from the employment agencies in co-operation with the employers and the bureau's support of their applicants' personal bonds of security were discussed.

Baku Ishii, Noted Japanese Dancer Loses Left Sight

MATSUJ, Japan, May 2—Baku Ishii, noted Japanese interpretive dancer and the founder of the European school of ballet in Japan, today lost the sight of his right eye at a local hospital here where he was treated for eye trouble resulting from extreme fatigue.

The famous ballet artist had been conducting a dancing tour of the southwestern part of the country with his sister, Madame Konami. In this city he complained of pain in the right eye, while his left eye was also suffering from severe strain. The physicians believe they can save the left eye from blindness although complete recovery is problematical. Baku Ishii has had wide experience and arduous struggle as a dancer of the classical school. He toured most of the countries of Europe and studied for some time in New York, where he was a close friend of Michio Ito, the celebrated Metropolitan dancer. Ishii is an exponent of the Norwegian spirit in his dances and has lately achieved considerable fame here and abroad.

PERSONALITY OF DR. ABE, JAPAN LEADER, DESCRIBED

The Distinguished Labor Leader Is One Of the Most Remarkable Men Of Nippon

By L. G. MASUI (Continued from yesterday) Professor Abe is one of the old-time Socialists. He is one of the founders of the first Social Democratic Party which was established in 1903. It is interesting to note that already at that time he favored total disarmament. This is remarkable when the fact is remembered that it was on the eve of the Russo-Japanese War and Japanese Nationalism was at its zenith. Another remarkable thing about the first proletarian party is its advocacy of universal manhood suffrage and the abolition of the House of Peers.

The Social Democratic Party was dissolved on the very day of its birth by the Ito Cabinet, its newspaper was suppressed, and its publishers were fined. A few months later, the Ito Cabinet resigned and the Katsura Ministry was established. The founders of the dissolved party established another party called Japan Common People's Party, but it was also dissolved by the new Ministry.

FELLOW SOCIALISTS Two noted socialists worked with Abe. They were Shunsui Kotoku (who later became an Anarchist and was hanged) and Sen Katayama, who, as every one is aware, is now in Soviet Russia where he is honored as a national guest by the Soviet Authorities. Both Kotoku and Katayama used to speak very highly of Abe. Kosen Sakai is another old colleague of Abe. He was recently elected a member of the Tokyo Municipal Council but he is regarded as a veteran Socialist of the reform type; whereas Abe is opposed to any revolutionary measures.

HIS FEATURE Professor Abe is of short stature and by no means a handsome man. One of his eyes is almost closed but the good one is good enough to watch over the conduct of his colleagues in the Diet. One day one of the younger proletarian members was much angered by an uncomplimentary remark of a Seiyukai member in the floor of the House and rushed towards the latter with clenched fists and flashed eyes. Just then he caught the stern glances of Abe and almost instinctively drew back, much to the surprise and amusement of the members around him.

One Seiyukai member afterwards said: "Well, Abe-Sensei's single eye is sufficient to make his men behave in the House." EGOIST I am inclined to believe that Protestant Christianity has the best possible representative in the country in the person of Professor Abe. Mr. Toyohiko Kagawa, no doubt, is inspiring. He seems to possess the fire and enthusiasm of the Fathers of primitive Christianity. But he is not respected and loved as much as Ioh Abe is. Why? I only mention two possible reasons. The first sin Mr. Kagawa has committed is the fact that he is young—too young for doing what he actually does. Of course he is not responsible for this being young, though he is responsible for what he has done; and what he has done is charity to others. Our society is astonished at what a young man of 40 has done and cannot but feel a sort of jealousy.

And this jealousy is intensified by the self-publicity on the part of Mr. Kagawa. In his novel "Across the Death Line," Mr. Kagawa describes himself too objectively for the general reader; the latter thinks he is describing himself subjectively instead of objectively.

What he says seems to come from the bottom of his heart. He is unassuming as he is homely in personal appearance. He practices what he preaches just as in the case of Mr. Kagawa, but the former never causes public jealousy by his utterances or actions. Professor Abe is also the head of a happy family. He was extremely kind to his wife even 20 or 25 years ago when kind treatment of one's wife in public was regarded as a laughing stock. And what he has been practicing during the past 30 years has been followed by the rising generation. Just as he is the Father of baseball in Japan, he may be said to be the Father of devoted husbands in Japan.

ALIENS HIT BY NEW LAW

Oriental Prohibited From Hunting, Possessing Firearms

SACRAMENTO, May 1—Legislation prohibiting aliens ineligible to citizenship and unaturalized foreign born residents from hunting wild game in California or possessing firearms, except for defense of person or property, was passed today by the Assembly.

The bill, by Assemblyman Jerrold L. Seawell, specifies however, that an unaturalized foreigner may be granted a hunting license in the event he has declared his intention to take out citizenship papers. The same measure fixes a fishing license fee of \$25 for aliens ineligible for citizenship. Foreign visitors would be allowed hunting and fishing permits good for 90 days only.

In the course of two years' study in the school she successfully passed the examination and obtained the license.

Success Seen By Judge in Working Of Night Court

The Japanese government, experimenting with a new judicial procedure, instituted a night court for the first time recently in Kure, a city in Hiroshima prefecture.

Judge Ejima, who conducted the first night court trial, sees a bright future for these special courts. "It seems that defendants do not make false statements at night, judging from my experience in the past," he declared.

It has long been a question among judicial men in Japan, whether a night court should be opened, expressly on behalf of those working classes of men who cannot afford to attend trial during the day. The Osaka Lawyers' Society recently drafted a plan of holding a night court for trials in which only relatively small amount of money is involved and proposed it to the Justice Office. This Osaka night court will be opened as soon as the budget is found. But in Kure, night court has already become a reality.

"I attended the trial after I had dinner at home, and somehow I felt more sympathetic mood, and I noted that the entire court was quite at ease. It seemed that troublesome problems could be settled easily," went on Judge Ejima. He added, however, that he could not boast very much of the good results of the new court, as it had just started. 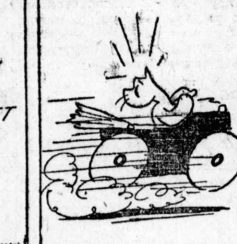
