Terakawa, Prominent Cleric, is Married In Oakland

Special to The Japanese American News OAKLAND, May 3—A most impressive Buddhist ritual, conducted by Bishop K. Uchida, former superintendent of the Buddhist Mission in America, marked the wedding of Miss Hanako Flora Yoshida, prominent Hayward Buddhist leader, and Mr. Tansai Terakawa, newly appointed priest of the Stockton Buddhist temple, at the local temple last night.

Attended by some 500 guests, including prominent leaders in the Japanese circles of the Bay region, the wedding was one of the most brilliant affairs in many seasons among the younger set of Northern California. It was held in the main chapel of the temple at Sixth and Jackson streets.

The bride, who was a picture of loveliness in snow-white georgette with stary rhinestones sprinkled over it, wore a very elaborate and long-trailing train of veil. She also wore a coronet of orange blossoms, while in her hand she held a bouquet of roses and lilies of the valley.

The bride was attended by the matron of honor, the Mrs. H. Tanaka. The bridesmaids, who wore dresses of white, cream, and green colors, walked in pairs to the tune of Wagner's Liebesmorgen wedding march, which was played by Miss Ruth Haven, school mate of the bride and student of Hayward high school.

The marriage ritual was read by the Reverend K. Uchida, bishop of the Nishi Hongwanji temple. The Reverend Mr. M. Washio, priest of the Oakland Buddhist Temple, was the chairman.

THE BRIDE The bride was given in marriage by her father, Mr. Y. Yoshida, prominent nurseryman of Hayward. She is a native of Hayward, where she graduated from the Hayward High School this year. Besides being the president of the Oakland Y. W. B. A., she holds the position of vice president of the Bay district league of Young Women's Buddhist Association.

THE GROOM The groom is one of the founders of the Y. M. B. A. Federation of North America. After graduating from the Buddhist University in Kyoto, he sailed to Hawaii, where he served as priest of a temple there as well as secretary of the Y. M. B. A. of Honolulu. He later arrived in California. He is a graduate of the College of Pacific, and later he matriculated at Stanford and received his master's degree there in psychology.

Mr. Terakawa achieved notable work for the religious welfare of the second generation Japanese in California as first chief director of the Y. M. B. A. Federation. He was later chosen its chief adviser.

Following the wedding last night, a huge banquet was held in the main auditorium of the temple. Rev. Washio presided. A score of representatives from the various organizations of the district delivered congratulatory addresses.

The couple will make their home in Stockton.

Prince Henry Bestows Order of Royal Purple Garter Upon Japanese Emperor; Rites Staged In Main Hall of Palace

TOKYO, May 3—Prince Henry of England, third son of King George, knelt at the feet of Emperor Hirohito of Japan today and clasped to his left leg a royal purple garter, insignia of England's highest order of knighthood.

The Emperor Hirohito journeyed across the city to Kasumigaseki Palace, the prince's temporary home, to bestow personally upon him the grand order of the Chrysanthemum, Japan's highest decoration.

The two ceremonies were the climax of a trip half way around the world for the young prince, or, as he is more widely known, the Duke of Gloucester, who was welcomed here from his native land yesterday.

The ceremonial of the garter bestowal took place in the throne room of the Imperial palace.

When the Emperor had expressed his thanks for King George's courtesy in sending the order by the hand of his son, Prince Henry mounted the steps of the throne and knelt with one knee on a cushion at the Emperor's feet.

He then adjusted the royal purple band, with its gold inscribed words, "Honi Soit qui mal y pense" (may he be ashamed who evil thinks), around the left leg of the Emperor.

Arising, he presented the other parts of the insignia, consisting of a collar and pendant decoration, stepping back then and bowing deeply.

This for the third time in history a Japanese Emperor was numbered among the wearers of the garter.

He then adjusted the royal purple band, with its gold inscribed words, "Honi Soit qui mal y pense" (may he be ashamed who evil thinks), around the left leg of the Emperor.

At a complimentary luncheon given for the retiring president, Wallace M. Alexander, declared: "The institute, under his leadership, has never avoided the most inflammable and dangerous subjects." He termed Wilbur "the Abraham Lincoln of the Pacific."

Since Wilbur has accepted an official position and can no longer aid in making unofficial recommendations in Pacific affairs, he has been succeeded as president by Jerome Greene, international banker, of New York.

Forty American delegates will attend the conference of the institute in Kyoto, Japan, in October, it was announced. Representatives of other nations will bring the total to 140.

Among those attending the luncheon were: Philip J. Fay, president of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce; Arthur Bent, former president of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, and C. B. Dodds, Washington representative of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce.

ANNA MAY WONG TELLS OF HER TRIALS AS AN ACTRESS

LONDON.—Anna May Wong, the Chinese actress who had the chief part in "Piccadilly" film and is to appear at the New Theater in "The Circle of Chalk," has an great ambition; that is to visit China. She was born in Los Angeles, and although her brother is studying in the land of their ancestors Miss Wong has never been there.

"My parents are very anxious that I shall not forget my Chinese," she told The Observer Theatre Correspondent last week. "As a child I had to work twice as hard at school as the other girls. From 9 to 3 I attended the American school, and from 3 to 7 the Chinese. But that is nothing," she exclaimed. "The Chinese student works from 5 in the morning until 9 at night."

The interview took place at Miss Wong's hotel. In her own rooms she wears Chinese dress, which sets off her Oriental beauty. She is tall and slim, with intense black hair and very expressive eyes. It was while these Japanese guards were patrolling the Japanese quarters that the two soldiers were shot unaware.

Japan Stirred By Parolling of Man Who Killed Leader

TOKYO, May 3—A nation-wide consternation is being felt over the action of municipal judge in releasing under parole Hokuji Kuroda, self-confessed assassin of Senji Yamamoto, noted Japanese proletarian leader, following a preliminary examination of the case here.

The surprise over this unusual procedure is being felt even in the office of the district attorney. The judge, however, declared that he paroled the prisoner as he felt no fear of attempt to escape.

Prisoner Kuroda murdered the noted labor leader while the latter was dining at a hotel in this city last Feb. The assassin is a member of a Nationalist society and made the assault with knife for the purpose of ridding the country of an exponent of dangerous thought and principles opposed to the fundamental concept of the Japanese Empire, according to the confession.

NEW YORK, April 29—Thomas A. Edison, grown gray in achievement and fame, today started out to find an American boy to whom he may pass on some day the torch of his genius.

He started a search for the brightest boy in America. When he finds him he is going to send him to college first of all.

A scholarship, taking care of all tuition fees for four years at whatever technical school the winner wishes to enter, will be awarded the high school or preparatory school boy who most intelligently answers a questionnaire to be made up by Edison.

The winner will be one of forty-nine to be picked, one from each state and one from the District of Columbia. Edison will pay the expenses of all forty-nine boys from their homes to his laboratory at Orange, N. J., about August 1.

The Governor of each state and the Commissioners of the District of Columbia have been asked to designate boards to select, from among high school and preparatory school pupils the finest type of American boy who has shown the highest ability in scientific subjects during the school year 1928-1929. The names of the forty-nine must be filed with Edison by July 1.

Hachiro Maru Rushes As Distressed Ship Signals SOS

VESEL IS TOTAL LOSS RESCUE STOPPED AS NIGHT APPROACHES, 58 SAVED ON SECOND DAY

Special to The Japanese American News TOKYO, May 3—A thrilling tale of rescue of more than 400 persons from the storm-lashed Japanese steamer Goyo Maru was told in brief radio messages from the steamer Hachiro Maru today. The Goyo Maru, under Russian charter for fishing off the Kamchatka banks, ran into a violent storm Wednesday night in the Kronotski gulf and was forced aground.

The Hachiro was summoned by radio and reached the scene at 4 p. m. yesterday, taking off 350 fishermen before rising seas and darkness compelled cessation of their efforts. Throughout the wild night it stood by and today took off the remainder of the vessel, 20 fishermen and 38 of the crew.

The ship itself, the radio messages said apparently was a total loss. It had a register of 2948 tons. Of the others were Chinese, Koreans and Russians, including twenty seven Russian women.
