## KAWASAKI TO LECTURE TO CITIZEN BODY

'Old and New Japan'  
Topic Of Talk In  
Stockton

Special to The Japanese American News  
STOCKTON, July 8.—The local  
Japanese American Citizens' League  
will sponsor a lecture by Torao Ka-  
wasaki, noted student on Far Eastern  
affairs at the local Buddhist audit-  
orium. He will speak in English on  
"Old and New Japan."

As this is the first activity spon-  
sored by the Citizen's body since  
its reorganization recently under a  
new set of officers, the American-  
born group here is attaching much  
interest to it. A large attendance is  
expected. Frank Mirkitani, head  
of the league, will preside.

Mr. Kawasaki will speak, return-  
ed from Japan, where as a govern-  
ment official he enjoyed an exten-  
sive tour of the country and its  
possessions on the Asiatic main-  
land. He is a member of the San  
Francisco Japanese consulate.

Mr. Kawasaki will give several  
other lectures while in this city.  
On July 15, at 11 a.m., he will talk on  
"The Pacific Consciousness and  
American Japanese Relations" at a  
general assembly of the College of  
Pacific. At 11 a.m. he will address the  
sociology class of the same institution on  
"The Changing and Unchanging  
Japan." In the morning of July 15  
at 9 o'clock he is scheduled to lec-  
ture on "Japan in World Politics"  
before the history class.

Besides these foregoing lectures, he  
will give an address before the  
Kiwanis Club at a luncheon to be  
given in Lincoln Hotel on July 16.  
He will probably speak at the first  
Christian Church and a few other  
places before his return to San  
Francisco on July 17.

Number of Guards  
For Premier And  
Cabinet Reduced

are friends of the people, has no  
fear of anguinary assault.

## DIPLOMAT TO MAP POLICY

Declaraion on China  
To Be Issued Soon

TOKYO, July 8.—Baron Kijuro  
Shidemura, new minister of foreign  
affairs, who is now studying the  
whole foreign situation, is expected  
to issue a statement in the future on  
his policy toward China.

A former ambassador to the United  
States as well as former foreign  
minister during the Wakatsuki Cab-  
inet of several years ago, Shidemura  
is regarded as one of Japan's outstand-  
ing diplomats. His liberal policies in  
China are expected to increase Japan's trade there. The Nanking Government has already  
shown its elation over this shift from  
the "positive" policy of conservative  
Tanaka to what is expected to be  
a friendlier attitude of Shidemura.

## 'POISON PEN' ARTIST WILL GET HEARING

Seattle Man Charged  
With Blackmailing  
Pres. Hoover

SEATTLE (Wash.) July 8.—U.  
Uchiyama, elderly Japanese chemist  
and alleged "poison pen" artist, will  
face charges of threatening the life  
of President Hoover on July 12, in  
a hearing before the United States  
Commissioner A. C. Bowman.

Uchiyama is held under \$10,000 bail.

Uchiyama, who speaks fluent Eng-  
lish, was arrested on July 4 follow-  
ing an investigation which had  
been conducted for fifteen years. He  
is believed to have written threat-  
ening letters to ex-President Cal-  
vin Coolidge, the Emperor of Ja-  
pan, ex-Gov. Harley, mayor of Se-  
attle, and many other notables. He  
is 75 years old.

He was specifically charged with  
threatening a President of the Unit-  
ed States.
