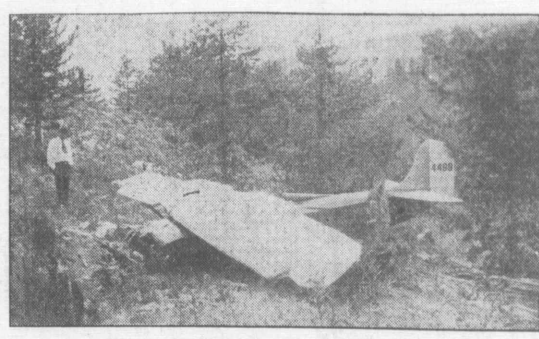

Three Injured When Nippon Destroyers Crash in Maneuvers

TOKYO, July 10—Three men, including an officer, were seriously injured and several sailors slightly hurt in the collision of two Japanese destroyers during maneuvers last night in Bungo straits, between the islands of Kyushu and Shikoku. The navy office announced that both vessels, the Mochizuki and Murakumo, were only slightly damaged.

SINO-SOVIET BRAWL SEEN

Harbin Governor Arrests 174 Russian R. R. Officials

TOKYO, July 11—The long standing feud between northeastern China and Soviet Russia over control of the Manchurian unit of the trans-Siberian railway system has broken forth anew with what is regarded here as a definite Chinese move against the Russians.

Rengo News Agency dispatches from Harbin, Manchuria, said that General Chang Ching Hui, governor of the Harbin district, yesterday arrested 174 Soviet officials and employees of the Chinese Eastern Railway. Thirty-seven of the prisoners were started under guard for the Siberian border for deportation.

The dispatches interpreted the coup as having made a virtually unhealable breach between China and the Soviet. Chinese directors were appointed to replace the arrested Russians, the Chinese seizing every opening to undermine the Russian influence.

Among those arrested were the Russian vice director of railways and the director of the trading commission. All Russian banking and trading operations in Harbin were closed. Managing Director Emsanov and other highest officials among the Russians still were free but threatened with arrest.

YOSHIO SHIJO HURT AS CAR STRIKES HIM

X-Ray Reveals Broken Bone In Left Leg Of Auto Victim

Sustaining bruises and fractured bones in his left leg, Yoshio Shijo, a popular Raphael Weill School student, is today recovering from injuries received when he was struck by an automobile Wednesday evening at Webster and Post streets while he was assisting his chum to carry a bundle of papers.

Immediately following the accident, the boy was taken to Dr. Kitagawa's office on Post street by the driver. Although the wound was not of serious nature, the boy's recovery will take some time, according to the physician. An X-ray taken Thursday revealed fracture of bones in his left leg.

Yoshio Shijo, it will be remembered, was given high praises from Mayor James Rolph Jr. and Chief of Police William J. Quinn recently for his efficiency as the captain of the traffic squad of Raphael Weill School. This school won first honor in the recent traffic efficiency contest conducted by the schools of San Francisco.

JAPAN STOPS PUBLIC WORK

Drastic Retrenchment Feared Will Cause Unemployment

TOKYO, July 11—As a first step toward the realization of drastic retrenchment programs of the new Liberal Cabinet under Yuko Hamaguchi, the Department of Home Affairs today ordered the abandonment of all new public works not yet actually started the slashing of the remainder of 20 per cent.

In addition, the Reconstruction Bureau of Tokyo, which was formed after the great earthquake to resurrect the wasted city, was ordered dissolved by April of next year. This will mean that in that bureau alone 2,000 government employees will be thrown out of work.

Cessation of public works will mean considerable aggravation of the present unemployment problem, which is staring into the face of the government like some forbidding ghost. The attention of the entire nation therefore, is focused on what legislation the Liberal administration will formulate to alleviate this economic tension.

A mass meeting of the Liberal party was held in Tokyo Kaikan today to discuss the next step in the new government's momentous program of economic retrenchment. The view prevailed that Hamaguchi, the new Premier, should summon a special Diet in order to obtain its approval of the new program. If the Diet proves hostile, it should be dissolved at once and a general election should be called for the purpose of placing the decision upon the shoulders of the people, according to the Liberal leaders.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 11—The tangled wreck of the "Ryofo," the 20-foot biplane found Wednesday with the dead body of Masashi Goto, its Japanese pilot, cannot be moved from the lonely stretch in Provo Canyon near Park City, Utah, where it had crashed, until official investigations have been completed, it was learned today.

Meanwhile, by piecing bits of information from various sources it was learned that searches had been instituted for the intrepid Japanese aviator since his sudden disappearance on July 6, when he left this city for Cheyenne via Rock Spring on his ambitious round-the-world trip. An inquiry at the Thompson Air Service here revealed that Goto had landed here at seventy miles an hour speed, whereas landing at this high altitude is made at fifty. Before he left on his tragic flight, he had repaired a loosened cylinder and released an unusually high oil pressure.

SEARCH CONDUCTED
When it became certain that Goto was missing, Pilot Thompson of Boeing Air Line and an army flier volunteered a search last Friday without avail. On Saturday the Department of Commerce radio service made inquiries at Rock Springs and Cheyenne stations with requests to inquire at emergency fields. On the same day came reports that no one registered at these emergency fields.

Field Manager Rich of Salt Lake Airport is understood to have wired to Crawford Airplane Company of Venice, California, of Goto's disappearance on Saturday. On the following day he sent another wire asking if they wanted him to make a search for the lost aviator, but no answer was received.

Mr. Johnson of the radio service here declared today that there is no one having authority to order official search. Customarily searches are conducted by volunteers, he said.

BACKERS BLAMED
If there is anyone to be blamed for the negligence it seems to be the plane owner or Goto's backers, who should be on constant lookout, he further affirmed.

"Ordinarily transient fliers make it their practice to follow the mail line in a strange country in which they are not accustomed," continued Johnson. "Goto did not do this. This made the search of his lost plane extremely difficult."

A party including R. H. Warner, friend of the dead pilot; Frank Watanabe, owner of the plane; and the secretary of the local Japanese Association, and K. Shirasawa, Salt Lake Branch Manager of The Japanese American News, will leave Friday for the scene of the tragic air crash. They will also bring back the body of the pilot from Heber City to Salt Lake City.
