SAVANT REVEALS FAULTS
IN FILIPINO IMMIGRATION

LOS ANGELES, July 26.—(UP)—A
serious inter-racial problem is facing
the Pacific Coast because of the fact
that most of the Filipinos entering
this country are men, according to
Social Research magazine by Dr.
Emory S. Bogardus, chairman of the
sociology department of the
University of California.

Dr. Bogardus' article points out
that there are practically no young
Filipino women in the United
States and that the Filipino men
are without social connections
among people of their own nation-
ality.

The inter-marriage situation is
unique," he says. "In several
states of the union, including Ari-

zona, California, Idaho, Nevada, and
Oregon Filipinos may not marry
whites. Classed as Mongolians, they
come under the marriage laws pro-
hibiting inter-marriage of Mongo-
lians and Caucasians. Although
Malayan or partly Spanish, the
Filipino is not Mongolian but may be
classed as such.

"He is in a peculiar position—
not an alien, neither is he a citizen,
neither can he become a citizen."

Dr. Bogardus said that unless re-
strictions are soon placed on the
migration of Filipinos to this
country that a movement should be
started to have a large percentage
of Filipino women among the immi-

grants.

CHINA LINDY TO TRY HOP

To Fly from Pacific
Coast To Shanghai
In Non-stop Dash

SEATTLE, July 29—Huang Tien-
lai, called the "Lindbergh of China,"

announced here today that he plans
a nonstop refueling flight from the
Pacific Coast to Shanghai next sum-
mer. He said that a group of Chi-
nese in the United States are back-
ing the venture.

Constitutionally he cannot be
evicted by the Cabinet. He must
be forced to resign through an Im-
perial order, and this can be gotten
only through specific charges.
Meanwhile Yamanashi is expected
to do some housecleaning when he
gets back to Korea.

TO "HUSH" UP MATTER

The Korean administration having
been involved in a scandal, Ya-
manashi is expected to make a cur-
sory investigation, discharge minor
officials, and "hush" up the matter
as deftly as he might.

But the new Liberal Cabinet, de-
sirous of gaining political advan-
tages out of this Korea fiasco, is de-
termined to make a through-going
investigation. This may result in
putting considerable embarrassment
upon the shoulders of the doughty
general himself. Therefore Yama-
nashi is loathe to give up the post
before he has "settled" the matter
himself.

With his characteristic audacity,
Yamanashi today paid calls upon
Genji Matsuda, new Minister of the
colonies, and Junnosuke Inouye, new
finance minister, for the purpose of
getting the views of the new Liberal
Government.

Cabinet on matters pertaining to

immediately called upon Premier
Hamaguchi.


FLORIN, July 31—Twenty-two
