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TWO BRITISH SHIPS HONOR JAPAN NAVY

Seattle Young People To Entertain Midshipmen Tuesday

SEATTLE, Aug. 5.—Two British cruisers, Vancouver and Colombo, steamed into Elliott Bay here today and anchored alongside the Japanese warships Iwate and Asama.

Vice Admiral K. Nomura of the Japanese ship will be host on two occasions Tuesday. At noon he will give a luncheon aboard the Iwate to a group of naval men later he will transfer his flag to the Asama, where he will give a reception before weighing anchor for Vancouver.

With British and Japanese warships were 31 ships of the Pacific fleet anchored in Elliott Bay.

SEATTLE, Aug. 5.—The local Japanese community, in its joyous holiday mood, turned out en masse yesterday for the huge welcome field day held at Jefferson Park in honor of the officers and midshipmen of the Imperial Japanese squadron which steamed into this port Saturday on their 30,000-mile cruise of the Pacific and Atlantic oceans.

The squadron, here for four days on a good will visit, had left the Yokosuka naval base on July 1, reaching Honolulu on July 18. From there the two cruisers proceeded to Victoria, B. C., arriving in that port on August 2. They will leave Seattle Wednesday for San Francisco.

In this city the welcome reception started Saturday when the leading local residents formed the delegation to greet the midshipmen. In the evening Consul Suenaga Okamoto tendered them banquet at the Olympic Hotel.

CLIMAX OF HUGE WELCOME

The climax of the welcome program will occur Tuesday when the second generation young people of this city sponsor a huge reception in which over 150 midshipmen from the cruisers Asama and Iwate will be entertained at the New Washington Hotel.

This will probably be the first social entertainment of this nature ever to be held by the young people of this community and vicinity, especially on the large scale it is outlined. According to present indications more than 700 young people and midshipmen will gather at the New Washington Hotel to rub shoulders with the future admirals of the Japanese navy.

This event is being looked upon by the community as the fore-runner of more such affairs of a large and important nature, in the future and much interest is being attached to the occasion.

August 5. Officers from the two ships to be taken on sight seeing tour of Mount Rainier. Other officers will be taken on sight seeing tour of city of an vicinity including Snoqualmie Falls, Granite Falls and Auburn districts. August 6. Morning, sailors to be taken on shopping tour. From 2 to 5 p.m. "at home" on the ships to which 700 Seattle Japanese and American residents will be invited. Evening officers will be dined by the Thursday Club. 7:30 p.m. Second generation to welcome middies at New Washington Hotel. 8 p.m. Mass Meeting at the Nippon kan hall.

Manila Backers Will Sponsor Flight to Asia Mainland

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 5.—(UP)—A non-stop airplane flight from China to the Philippine Islands will be undertaken soon by the Amoy Civil Aviation school.

Fei Hsich Shen, Fang Shin Liu and Chang Kwong Yang, three Chinese aviators, are in Manila seeking to enlist the aid of members of the local Chinese community in the non-stop China-to-Manila flight. Also they are seeking aid for the Amoy Civil Aviation school.

"China is aware of the numerous advantages, commercial and political, that will result from establishment of an airline across the China sea," Shen told local newspaper correspondents. "Only lack of adequate finances is postponing operation of a regular air service between China and the Philippines."
