

## 2 TOTS HURT IN CAR CRASH ON POST ST.

### Daniel Ota, Shigeko Shimizu Hit at Crossing

Two victims of a speeding automobile, Daniel Ota, age 4, and Shigeko Shimizu, 5, who were hit and run over at Post and Laguna streets late Monday afternoon, are rapidly recovering from the effects of the accident, according to the attending surgeons.

The mishaps happened at 5 o'clock on Monday evening when the tot tried to cross Post street from the north side over to the bakery store. The car, driven by D. Johnson of this city, was speeding down Post street hill toward Fillmore. Although he stepped on the breaks when he noticed the children, the car skidded over twenty feet before it came to a full stop.

Daniel was hit and thrown down, his head knocking severely against the pavement. Shigeko was run over on the thigh. She also received severe injuries around the lips and forehead.

They were carried to the Central Emergency Hospital where they were treated by Dr. Rhodes and Dr. Leggo. Daniel was sent home after the injuries were treated, while Shigeko was transferred to St. Francis Hospital, where she is now on her way to recovery.

The girl came out of the anaesthetic Tuesday morning. An x-ray photograph will be taken as soon as she gains enough strength. No damage is done to the bones, the attending doctors said.

Daniel Ota is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Mitsutaro Ota, and Shigeko Shimizu is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Inosuke Shimizu, all of 1538 Post street.

## U. C. Man Off for Orient To Study Farm Market There

BERKELEY, Aug. 6.—To investigate the market possibilities of the Orient for the California agricultural products, Prof. B. H. Crocker, director of agricultural extension in the University of California, sailed Friday on the Dollar steamship liner President Pierce for the Far East. He is accompanied by W. J. Norton, specialist in illustrative materials in the agricultural extension service, as assistant; and Paul Windrem of Madera, senior student in political science at the university, as secretary.

Touching first at Yokohama, their itinerary will lead them through every important city in the Orient, from Manehuria to India, including the Philippine Islands. They expect to return by way of the Suez Canal and across the Atlantic, reaching Berkeley about the first of April.

Professor Crocker hopes to determine, first of all, whether there are possibilities of marketing California fruits in the Far East. If there are, he will endeavor to find what kinds of fruits are desired, and in what form they are wanted, whether fresh, canned or dried. He wants to learn what trade promotion will be necessary and will make a study of the food habits of the peoples in the countries to be visited. If he finds there are no possibilities for marketing California crops there, the movement will be dropped and other outlets will be sought.

## Baseball Becoming Popular Among the Students of Japan

TOKYO, Aug. 2.—(UP)—Of all the games that from the Meiji era have been imported into Japan from foreign countries, baseball stands out prominently as the one that Japanese youth, particularly of the student class, has adopted with the greatest enthusiasm.

Baseball is peculiarly suited to the Japanese physique and temperament and competent judges believe that the leading teams of the big universities show an excellence of fielding that could hardly be exceeded in any other country.

## 10-10-7 RATIO NIPPON AIM

### Tokyo Solons Outline Naval Policy Before Parley

Special to The Japanese American News. TOKYO, Aug. 6.—Minister of Marine Takarabe yesterday told a conference of prefectural governors that Japan would insist on a ratio for auxiliary naval vessels and would endeavor to obtain agreement of the powers at a future disarmament conference. The admiral failed to specify what ratio would be demanded, but his speech was regarded as confirmation of the intention of Japan to urge a 10-10-7 ratio for auxiliaries.

## TOKYO, Aug. 6.—Japan's hearty support of the principle of reduction of naval armaments was voiced today by Baron Kijuro Shidehara, now Liberal Foreign Minister, in an address before the prefectural governors in conference here.

With the prospect bright for an early agreement between the United States and Great Britain on basis of reduction, naval curtailment may be realized sooner than is generally expected, according to Shidehara. He further declared that the new Liberal Cabinet is supporting this movement for arms reduction in order to ameliorate the enormous burdens of taxation from the shoulders of the Japanese people and also to help maintain world peace.

## FRIENDLY RELATION

On the subject of Sino-Japanese relations, Shidehara declared that since the tariff conference held at Peking five years ago during the Kato Ministry Japan has upheld the policy of sympathy for the reconstruction of New China. With the end of anti-Japanese boycotts, true Japanese sentiment seemed to be more generally understood in China, and this seems a happy circumstance for a renewed effort to realize friendly understanding between the two nations, he added.

## URGES SPIRIT OF POLICY

Both Premier Hamaguchi and Finance Minister Inouye stressed this governmental economy in their addresses and urged the governors to strictly adhere to the spirit of this new policy.

Commenting upon the Liberal's retrenchment program, former Finance Minister Mitsuichi today declared that drastic curtailment of governmental work will cause an aggravation of the existing unemployment problem. He further declared that industry will stagnate from governmental parsimony, and Japan will face a difficult situation when it attempts to pay up her international debts.

## NOTED JAPAN ARTIST WILL EXHIBIT HERE

### Impressionist Paintings on Display at Buddhist Hall

Bringing with him a collection of his own paintings which are known throughout the Orient for their exquisite technique and wealth of imaginative vitality, Seizan Kishinami, foremost Japanese artist, is today a visitor of San Francisco.

A leader of the Nan-ga school of impressionists, Mr. Kishinami is en route to Paris, where he is to exhibit his work at an exhibition arranged by the French government. He is sent by the Japanese government.

## COURT PAINTER

An exhibit of his work will be held for four days, Aug. 7, 8, 9, and 10, in the local Buddhist gallery, 1881 Pine Street. It is open to the public during the period from 11 a. m. to 10 p. m. daily.

Mr. Kishinami is not only a member of the Imperial Fine Arts Academy, which is the highest art honor in Japan, but he has also distinguished himself as a court painter. His work, executed in a style that is the antithesis of the Western mode, is essentially interpretative, not a reproduction, of nature. His exhibit here covers a selection of fifty water color paintings, which are the characteristic of an Oriental.

## "NANGA" PAINTINGS

Nan-ga type of Japanese art, originated in China in the sixth century, and was first introduced to Japan by Buddhists and scholars some 900 years ago. Nan-ga paintings have since become widely popular, not only with those who are students of the fine arts, but also with those less interested in things artistic. It may be said that Nan-ga art is truly a pictorialization of everything that appeals to the artist.

## 52 BODIES RECOVERED

### 24 Others Still Missing in Hokkaido Mine Blast

Special to The Japanese American News. TOKYO, Aug. 6.—Fifty-two bodies have been taken from the Sumitomo Bantan Coal Mine, and it was believed twenty-four other miners who are missing were dead. Of the thirteen who escaped five were injured. Rescue squads, who worked their way into the diggings following the explosion yesterday, were handicapped by the extreme depth of the mines. The explosion occurred 36,000 feet, almost seven miles, below ground.

## Students' Lack of Will Deplored by Japan Statesman

Special to The Japanese American News. TOKYO, July 31.—"When we were young, we dreamed of Tokio, Napoleon, Bismarck, Gladstone, and others. The young folks of today think of what position they should get after their schooling, what sort of wife they should marry and what sort of house they should live in."

The foregoing is a part of the philippic delivered by Mr. Ichita Kobashi, Education Minister, in a press interview with a representative of this paper while traveling by train from Tokyo to Utsunomiya for a visit to the Grand Shrine of Ise.

Mr. Kobashi said that a similar condition prevails today in America, according to what he heard on July 12 from the chaperone of American students visiting in Japan, and that may be a general tendency throughout the world.

### Oakland Young People Feted By Head of M. E. Mission

BERKELEY, Aug. 6.—Dr. and Mrs. Frank Herron Smith were host and hostess at an informal party given in their home at 2816 Hillegras Saturday evening in honor of the young people of the Oakland Japanese M. E. Church.

A series of captivating games, which required mental alertness and skill, proved a source of much enjoyment for the guests. Dr. Smith entertained them by singing several selections, including the favorite "Blacksmith Song." Refreshments were later served.

## China's Finance Minister Affirms His Resignation

SHANGHAI, Aug. 6.—T. V. Soong, minister of finance in the Nanking national government, today resigned that portfolio because of his inability to supply the government needed funds.

Soong confirmed his resignation but refused to explain it. It has not yet been accepted. If Soong retires, it was said in financial circles, a serious blow will have been administered to the government.

## FAMOUS LOVE NOVELS OF NIPPON GIVEN ANALYSIS

About twenty years ago every Japanese young man and woman loved to read the late Roka Tokutomi's novel called "Fog" which in the English-speaking communities is known by its heroine's name, "Namiko." It was a story of a young couple, Takeo, a naval officer, and his wife, Namiko. The story commences with their honeymoon and its climax is reached when the young naval officer departs for foreign waters, leaving behind him his beautiful but sickly wife, who, upon his return, is found to have passed away. The young wife is maltreated by her mother-in-law, as was the case with nearly all families at that time. The novel on its social aspect had the mission of revealing to the Japanese public the evil habit of a mother-in-law maltreating her daughter-in-law, thereby appealing for the people's consideration for the welfare of young women.

Many of those young men and young women who eagerly read that novel are fathers and mothers whose sons or daughters are now married. They have come to pity the position of their daughters-in-law, and this explains the increasing absence of family tragedies arising from the disharmony of mother-in-law and daughter-in-law. We may say that "Namiko" has had greater psychological effects on the public psychology of modern Japan regarding the domestic affairs than the school education, missionary activities and social movements.

## PETERS REMOVED

The novel also may be regarded as having emancipated our people from the fetters which had been placed upon their love-making. Up to that time, the people looked upon love-making with prejudiced eyes. It had been regarded as either unbecoming or it was a social action in which no ambitious young man should indulge. It was not regarded as a necessary prelude to marriage but a something entirely

## WORK TO GET APPLE CITY TOKIO POST? HOLDS MEET

### Republican Chairman May Be Next Envoy Says Mainichi

TOKYO, Aug. 6.—The Osaka Mainichi reports in a telegram from Washington that Dr. Hubert Work, national chairman of the Republican Party, has been offered the post of the ambassador to Tokyo for the third time, and the paper adds that Dr. Work is disposed to accept the post. When he was offered the post for the first time Dr. Work declined it and the next time he put the offer aside.

Dr. Hubert Work is 69 years old. In 1923 he was the Secretary of the Interior under President Coolidge, but in the presidential election last year he quit his office and was the national chairman of the Republican Party. He was largely responsible for the victory of President Hoover in the election.

## JAPAN BANS NIGHT WORK

### Factory Law Does Not Affect Group of Less Than 10

TOKYO, Aug. 5.—Night work for women and young persons has at last been prohibited after a delay of 18 years from the time of the promulgation in 1911 of the original Factory Act laying down the principle of this prohibition.

In Great Britain night work for children was prohibited in 1833, and for women in 1844, and therefore prohibition in Japan which came on July 1, has come 95 years or 95 years later than in Great Britain.

## Nippon Colleges Endow Chairs for Science of Flying

Now that the air mail and passenger services have been started and traveling by air is perfectly comparable with that on the ground in comfort and safety, enthusiastic study of the technique is being followed in some quarters. In universities and colleges in Tokyo, in particular, this subject is being studied by some students, as well as their professors, with fervent zeal.

In many universities, there are budding aviators. In Tokyo Imperial University, for instance, a chair of aeronautics has already been inaugurated, with Professor Masatoshi Yokota as the lecturer. The university by this means wishes to train theoretical experts on aviation for the future flying world of Japan.

A batch of Kelo University students are learning how to fly at the flying field of the Mikuni Aviation Research Institute, Tachikawa, taking advantage of the summer vacation.

Some Waseda University men have started their training at Shimoshizu Army Flying Field. The army has furnished two Salmon planes for this purpose.

HOSEI HAS AVIATOR. Hosei University will probably be the only school which has a licensed aviator as a student. Mr. Iwas Masu-eda was granted a second-class aviator's license some time ago. Some of his friends started to learn how to fly, by using a plane owned by him, out of curiosity, at first. This motive has created general opinion in the university that the establishment of an aviation research society was advisable. Thus, the society has duly been inaugurated, and Professor Uchida has been appointed to head it. The vacation has commenced, however, and the society will start its actual business from September.

The university further plans to select some suitable flying field somewhere near Tokyo, for the actual training of the members of the society.

In this connection, Hosei University held a lecture meeting last Saturday, when Lieutenant-General Gaishi Nagaoka, and Lieutenant-Colonel Adachi of the Imperial Aero Society of Japan spoke on aviation.

## Son of Japanese Salvation Army Chief Arrested
