















LEADERS OF YPC MEET TO MAP PARLEY

Central Body Starts Drive to Attract 500 Delegates

Special to The Japanese American News BERKELEY, Sept. 17—Like the echo of breakers as they dash against the rocks at night, the echo of the fifth annual Y. P. C. Conference of Northern California to be held at Berkeley on Oct. 11, 12, and 13, resounds louder and louder as the day of the conference approaches.

For the past four weeks, the cabinet members and various committee chairmen have been working diligently devoting their time, effort, and energy to pave the way for the "biggest" Big conference in the history of the Northern California.

Last Sunday afternoon at Stiles Hall, Berkeley, the executive officials and chairmen of various committees together with representatives from each of the Bay organizations convened for the third time this year to continue their preparations.

"LIKE THE MASTER" Realizing that the young people of today are aiming only for the material standard of living, the program committee, headed by Shigeyasu Saito, chairman, with the aid of cabinet members decided to limit this year's conference especially for the purpose of urging and inspiring the hundreds of young Christian delegates to strive for higher aims above the ordinary and mediocre.

The greatest drive to attract more than five hundred delegates to the annual conference has been launched already by the registration committee under the supervision of its chairman, Heishiro Takao. In order to encourage a record attendance five pennants are being offered to the winners of this pre-registration contest.

HIGH SCHOOL AGE OR OVER Although a contest is being staged to register hundreds of Christian delegates in order to surpass all previous attendance records, the members of the executive board realized the seriousness of the coming conference and recently rendered a decision in which they preferred to have delegates of at least high school age.

BRAWL STIRS SEIYU PARTY

TOKYO, Sept. 17—A rumble of discord and signs of internal dissension are perceptible within the Seiyu-Kai conservative party, which recently went to defeat from governmental power when its leader Tanaka gave way to the Liberal administration of Premier Hamaguchi.

Insurgents within the Conservative ranks have started a movement to shake off Tanaka from leadership and boost their favorites to succeed him. They believe that Tanaka no longer possesses that influence necessary to bring back Conservative majority in the next general election.
