700 HOUSES CRUSHED IN JAPAN STORM Five Motorships Sunk As Gale Sweeps Amami Oshima

Special to The Japanese American News TOKYO, Oct. 1.—A terrific storm, still raging along the coast of Amami Oshima of Kagoshima prefecture since last Saturday, caused the total destruction of 700 houses. Thirteen hundred other houses were partially destroyed.

Five motorships plying in inter-coastal trade went down, but no word is received whether the crew and passengers were saved or lost. Eight bodies of the Kotashiro Maru, which sank off Tokyo Bay yesterday, were recovered today.

TOKYO, Sept. 30.—Struck by a storm, the Hitojishi Maru, a steamer of the Tokyo Bay S. S. Company, sank this morning at 8 o'clock off Miyake Island near the shoreline of Ikiya. Ten passengers and two crew were saved. Fourteen others were drowned.

5-DAY STAY WON BY WIFE OF MAGNATE Mrs. Pantages Faints In Court Waiting For Verdict

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 30.—Her face ghastly pale and accentuated by a somber black dress, Mrs. Alexander Pantages was brought into court in a wheel chair today and fainted as her sentence for manslaughter was delayed until Saturday.

As she was revived and sent home in an ambulance, her husband, millionaire theatrical man, appeared in another court and was denied a change of venue and a 30 days delay of his trial for an alleged criminal attack on Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old dancer.

His trial will begin tomorrow. Motion for a new trial stayed. Judgment for Mrs. Pantages, who was convicted last week by a jury of killing Juro Rokamoto, a Japanese gardener, in a Hollywood automobile crash.

Attorneys will argue the motion Saturday at 9 a. m. Just as on previous occasions, Mrs. Pantages' appearance in court today attracted a throng of curious men, women and girls.

It was the first time she had left her bed since being stricken last Wednesday when a jury convicted her of manslaughter. She has been suffering from a nervous collapse and a touch of bronchitis.

NIPPON ART BOOK IS OUT Summary of Exhibits And Fine Illustrations Featured

The Year Book of Japanese Art, 1928. National Committee on Intellectual Co-operation of the League of Nations Associations of Japan. 171 pages, 114 illustrations.

The second Year Book of Japanese Art is in several ways an improvement on the first. The illustrations are better printed and it is scarcely necessary to say that they form the most interesting part of the book.

As life of the Year Book lengthens it is likely that they will form an increasing part of it. The past year, being that of the enlightenment, was marked by an unusual number of loan exhibitions and a considerable part of the letterpress is occupied with a description of the pictures and art objects shown, in many cases of great value and rarity.

One of these exhibitions has formed the text for an interesting dissertation on Chinese painting, while another has enabled the compilers of the year book to bring together some valuable notes on Japanese artists abroad. In general, however, the volume shows that its natural line of development will be in furnishing Western students and others with illustrations of the work being done in Japan by Japanese artists. One may look forward to a day when it will consist mainly of pictures, to which a critical note might usefully be appended.

TOKYO NEWSPAPERS' FIGHT FOR SURVIVAL IS DESCRIBED

By SUYEO NAKANO The leading newspapers in Tokyo are independent and not affiliated with any political party. The Chuo Shimbun claims to be a Seiyukai organ, but nobody, even Seiyukai members, pays any particular attention to it.

The Tokyo is owned by a member of the Seiyukai party, but it is not necessarily a Seiyukai organ. The Niroku usually supports the Seiyukai. Mr. Takeji Kawamura, formerly governor of the South Manchuria Railway and subsequent Governor-General of Taiwan, is said to have been trying to purchase the Niroku.

Even if they combined against the present Minseito Cabinet, the Chuo and Niroku cannot meet the strength of the leading paper in Tokyo. Independent newspapers in Tokyo are not necessarily inclined to support the Hamaguchi Cabinet, they usually concede that members of the present Government are more serious and sober than those of the preceding Seiyukai Ministry, who often resorted to drums and trumpets in propagating the so-called positive policies.

THE "BIG FIVE" The "big five" of the Tokyo Press are the Nichi Nichi, Asahi, Hoshi, Jiji and Kokumin. Selling Blood is Newest Profession In Japan Capital

TOKYO, Oct. 1.—Selling one's blood has been found as a harmless way of picking up extra change in Japan and is rapidly creating a new profession. Aichi Medical University recently advertised for healthy young men and women willing to supply blood for anemia cases, expecting a dozen or so applicants. Several hundred applied.

Blood transfusion has not been practiced very long to any extent in Japan due to several deaths when it was first attempted because of lack of proper tests to determine whether the blood of the person needing more was of the same type as the person giving it. Suitable tests were conducted here long ago but the apprehension the earlier results had aroused was slow to die.

Recently, however, it has come into wide usage, two of the most recent cases being transfusions to Baron Takeko Kijio and Commander Kazemasa Fukuyama.

Good, fresh, healthy blood is worth \$10 per hundred grams and the average individual of a strong constitution can spare as much as 500 grams a month without affecting his health in the least, according to Dr. Naoki Sugita of Aichi Prefecture. He also declares that as much as 300 grams can be taken from a person at one time without endangering his health.

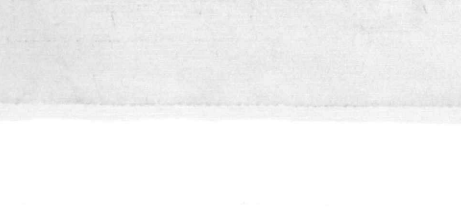
DINUBA BODY HOLDS MEET Hanada Elected Head Of Epworth League Friday Night
