Imperial Museum at Nara Plans Replicas for Old Collections

TOKYO, Oct. 2.—The authorities of the Imperial Museum of Nara are going to make replicas of many rare things contained in the museum which cannot be preserved for eternity.

The Nara Museum contains a big collection of valuable things used by Sovereigns of the Nara period when culture was highly developed, in which the essence of the civilization of the period is reflected.

Many of the costumes and wares of the period cannot be preserved forever because of natural decay, and in order to prevent their extinction Dr. Oshima, Director of the Imperial Museum of Tokyo, has instructed the director of the Nara Museum to make some replicas of important things which cannot be long preserved.

Messrs. Shosai Yoshida, Hoshun Yoshida and Kyusai Kitamura, artists in Nara, are now making replicas of mirrors, trays and other things of the Tempyo period according to the order of the Nara Museum.

Purpose, Scope of Experimental College of Wisconsin University Told By Secretary Malcome Sharp

(Continued from yesterday) Moreover, a period of the sophomore year in the college is devoted to the study of the place of science in the modern world. During this period, members of the physics department supervise reading and laboratory work in physics.

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The third question makes it necessary to explain the purpose of the course of study. The faculty call the course a study of civilizations and not a study of history. The difference is important. We are interested not so much in studying cross section of human activities. In the first year the students do not concentrate attention on the revelation of events in time, in ancient Greece. Instead, they try to see how the extraordinary intelligent men of fifth century Athens worked at problems. The Athenians, besides achieving famous triumphs in literature, the arts, and philosophy, invented western science and began for the west the systematic study of human affairs.

Similarly in the second year the sophomores and their advisers are not primarily concerned with the study of American history. Instead, they spend some time examining modern science—the picture of the universe which it presents, the exact methods which it uses. They study the intricacies of its modern large-scale organization of industry and government. They consider whether men today are producing great books, philosophies, pictures or buildings.

The problem of understanding civilization is the problem of understanding the various activities of man, and their relation to each other. Each adviser takes charge of the work of the freshman or sophomore class and its advisers during the period in which the class is studying his subject. Economists, for example, direct the work of each class during the period in which it is studying industry. Thus each class in the college, with its advisers, works through each civilization step by step.

Taking the place of class room work, the personal conference between adviser and student is the most important part of their schedule. There are regular assignments of reading and writing. At their weekly conferences the adviser questions the student about his reading, criticizes his writing, raises questions to be investigated, and keeps in touch with his student's progress.

The work of the college is thus carried on by means of a tutorial system not unlike the system used in England and two or three older Eastern universities of the United States.

The personal conference is supplemented by meetings of groups, of the freshman and sophomore classes as wholes, and of the entire college.

Each adviser keeps records of the progress of members of his group.

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JAPAN RELIC DISCOVERED

200-Year-Old Scroll In Possession Of Local Cleric

An ancient manuscript of great value, which for 200 years has been hidden in a secret shrine in Japan, is in the hands of Father William Stoecke, S. V. D., superior of the Fathers of the Divine Word here and head of the St. Francis Xavier Mission at 1715 Octavia-st.

The manuscript is a translation, penned in Japanese, of a Catholic catechism. It is believed to have been written by one of the early Spanish missionaries to Japan during the era of persecution in the flowery kingdom about two centuries ago.

It was found in the family shrine of the Terasawas in the prefect of Fukui. Discovery of it in the ancient days would have meant death to the family. Their custom was to visit the shrine once a year to view the Christian heritage. Father Stoecke, who spent half his life as a missionary to Japan, is making a careful copy to send to Rome.
