Prince Sumi Will Enter Army After Finishing School

TOKYO, Oct. 27—Prince Sumi, youngest brother of the Emperor, will enter the army, it has been decided.

For some time there has been a great deal of speculation as to what the Prince would decide to do. His joining was thought likely, but because of the fact that Prince Chichibu is in the army and Prince Takamatsu, his younger brother, is in the navy, there seemed no special precedents to follow.

It is understood that several conferences on the subject were held by the imperial household officials and that the Prince's grandmother, the empress dowager, had something to say in the matter. Prince Sumi, however, was asked to express his own wishes before it was settled and decided that he preferred a military career.

Sessue Hayakawa Forming Cinema Organization in Osaka to Produce Films to Supply Western Markets

OSAKA, Oct. 28—Plans for establishing the Sessue Cinema Production at Takarazuka, with a view to furnishing genuine Japanese films to the world's market, have reached a point where the corporation will first start the light in November, according to an announcement made by Kin Takasu, agent of Sessue.

Mr. Takasu, who for years was the chief secretary of the Japanese Association in London, after making arrangements with Sessue in America returned to Japan last February, with Sessue's power-of-attorney, and after persistent efforts succeeded in obtaining the support of several influential men in Tokyo and Kansai districts.

Sessue, who has been living in his stately mansion of Long Island Sound, near New York, during the last several years with his wife, Teuru Aoki, will leave for home early in November, with a company of 20 actors, actresses, scenario writers and cameramen of proven calibre.

BIG MEN BEHIND PROJECT
Behind the project are such men as Baron Yoshiro Sakatani, Baron Yoshio Fujimura, Hidejiro Nagata and Yusuke Tsurumi, all of whom will act as promoters, while President Ichizo Kobayashi, of the Hanryu Interurban and a noted theatrical man is said to have consented to be the advisor of the corporation. These men will meet in Tokyo late in November and organize the concern, capitalized at \$1,000,000.

Mr. Takasu is said to have acquired a 15,000-tsubo tract near Takarazuka from Kaemon Hirasaka, a millionaire landowner in that district upon which the studios will be erected. According to Takasu Takarazuka comes closer to being an ideal location for producing films for international consumption, when geographical and climatic conditions are taken into consideration.

STUDIO AT TAKARAZUKA
"Japan will produce cinema films that are suited for overseas consumption ere long," said Mr. Takasu, "since returning to Japan in February, I have been at it, and after heeling many hard rows, have seen my way clear to establishing our studios at Takarazuka."

"The present schedule calls for turning out four large pictures in which Sessue will star, in addition to several 'kengaki' films, which seem to appeal to foreigners. The idea is to present what Japan is to the eyes of the world. The scenarios are being taken care of by leading American women writers."

Sessue, who in private life is Kin-taro Hayakawa, is an actor of first magnitude, having won enviable fame in America and Europe. Born in Tokyo in 1889, he went to America in 1907, where after two years of persistent efforts, won recognition from such productions as Thomas Ince, Famous-Players-Lasky, Haw-

MISS HITOMI RAISES MARK

Japan's Girl Athlete Batters Own Record In Broad Jump

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 28—Miss Kinuye Hitomi, Japanese Olympic athlete, beat her own world's record for the running broad jump for women today, clearing 20 feet, 2 1/4 inches.

Miss Hitomi's latest performance exceeds by three and three-quarters inches her record-breaking leap of five days ago. It is the latest in a remarkable series of recent feats which have enabled the Japanese marvel to lower the world's records for her sex in the 100-meter and 60-meter sprints as well as the running broad jump.

HANKOW, Oct. 28—President Chiang Kai-shek, commander in chief of the Nationalist forces, today issued general orders for attack upon the revolting armies on all battle fronts.

As Hamaguchi's official motor sedan came out of the gateway at 1:20 p. m., a young man dashed upon the running board and broke through the window with a dagger in hand, only to find that the car was empty save for the chauffeur.

The assailant was immediately apprehended, and an investigation revealed that he was a carpenter at Fukagawa district. His name is Yoshida, a man of 24 years of age, who made the attack because of his resentment against the Premier's retrenchment policy.

230 Houses Destroyed In One Million Yen Fire of Sanbongi

Other speakers were Japanese Vice Consul T. Kaneko, T. Yamamoto, N. Y. K. manager here, and Philip J. Fay, former president of the chamber.

"Business in Japan is inseparably associated with San Francisco," Shimidzu said. "Our political and commercial history are bound to it by the traditions and the ties of business and of friendship. When we came into your harbor yesterday on the Asama Maru there as I am sure could not be given by any other city in the world."

"It is but a little more than three years since the N. Y. K. came into San Francisco. Since then, thanks to your spirit of friendliness, it has become one of the factors of the life of the port."

Dr. Nitobe Delivers Welcome At Asahi Auditorium

KYOTO, Japan, Oct. 28—What is anticipated as an epoch-making informal move for fostering better understanding and friendlier atmosphere in the Pacific was launched here today with the convening of the third biennial session of the Institute of Pacific Relations.

The opening ceremony, conducted this morning at 9:30 o'clock at Hino-ode Auditorium, was presided by Dr. Inazo Nitobe, chairman of the conference. He is a former deputy secretary-general of the League of Nations at Geneva as well as former president of the Tohoku Imperial University.

Following Dr. Nitobe's address of welcome in behalf of the Japanese people, Lord Hailsham, a British statesman, responded in behalf of the visiting delegates.

OVER 300 DELEGATES
More than three hundred official delegates from eight countries bordering the Pacific attended the opening session. They are from Japan, Britain, the United States, China, Canada, Australia, the Philippines and New Zealand.

The city of Kyoto, ancient capital of Japan, is today in a gay holiday attire with banners and streamers floating in the glorious mid-autumn day. The maples are turned gorgeous scarlet in the neighboring hillsides, and the some 800 foreign visitors who constitute the families of the delegates are seen strolling the streets and enjoying the scenery.

Cables of congratulations from Premier Hamaguchi of Japan, and President Hoover of the United States, and other notable statesmen and leaders from the four corners of the world were received here and read to the opening session by Dr. Nitobe.

The conference will remain in session for 13 days. Under the direction of Program Chairman Charles Loomis, eight committees are chosen to discuss various timely problems facing the nations around the Pacific basin. They are the committees on culture, industry, communications, Chinese problems, food and population, Manchuria, Pacific relations, and the Institute's business headquarters.

The Institute of Pacific Relations is an unofficial organization. It votes no resolutions and makes no direct representations to governments, but its discussions are believed to have a strong indirect effect on the Pacific policies of more than one chancellor. The United States has forty-three delegates.
