M. E. LEADER GIVES TALK AT SERVICE

100 Epworthians Hear Miss Kuwahara At Grace Church

Addressing a hundred American and Japanese Epworth League members at a joint meeting, Miss Yuki Kuwahara, young religious director of the Japanese M. E. Church, impressed her audience with a fine talk Sunday evening at Grace M. E. Church Twenty first and Capp sts. Miss Kuwahara's topic was: "How Can We as Epworthians, Help Bring Better Relations Between the Japanese and the Americans?" Her talk was well illustrated by verbal pictures of the Japanese people in California and their efforts towards the promotion of peace.

She cited such examples of good-will projects as educational tours across the Pacific and the mutual cooperation among the Epworth League members here among the different churches.

"Japanese appreciate usung heroes of today, and will remember the church leaders who are devoting themselves toward international friendship," she declared. She concluded with the declaration that the present Epworthians will be the heroes of tomorrow, not in war, but in peace.

Miss Lorraine Kozono played several violin solos. She was accompanied by Miss Blossom Fujita. Ryuzo Maeyama read the Scripture in Japanese, and Rev. Paulson, religious director of Grace M. E. Church, delivered a short talk.

Following this service, the whole party moved to the new skyscraper M. E. Temple on Leavenworth and McAllister for its dedication.

London Man Urges Britain To Exploit Trade in Manchuria

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS LONDON, Nov. 8.—G. L. Shaw, a British merchant of Antung, Manchuria, is conducting a vigorous campaign here to induce the British Government and British manufacturers to investigate trade opportunities in Manchuria.

"Japan's power has been used to advance Japan's industrial and commercial as well as political interests everywhere, always and at all times. But it is an error to think that Japan's position is unassailable," he writes in an article contributed to the Daily Telegraph.

Successful competition by British producers is possible provided they will supply exactly what is demanded. He urges that Mr. MacDonald send a trade commissioner to spy out this land of promise.

Loss of Charm of Old Tokyo Mourned By London Writer

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS LONDON, Nov. 8.—The reconstruction of the city of Tokyo as it has been achieved since the earthquake and fires of September 1, 1923, is elaborately described in a complimentary manner in the Times, together with regrets at the loss of the picturesque appearance of other days.

It quotes a visitor who knew Tokyo and Yokohama before the disaster. Today he walks down spacious highways flanked by trees between rows of vast white buildings of great height where modern business does its best to reproduce American department stores.

He is able to live in a house without a single sliding shutter, possessing the latest devices for trapping the sunbeams and excluding the dust. He can ride in a taxicab or in the tube instead of a ricksha.

Tokyo Opposes Plan To Launch Protest With Red Russia

TOKYO, Nov. 11.—The Department of Foreign Affairs today intimated that it is opposed to launching a formal diplomatic protest with Soviet Russia in connection with the recent nation-wide communist movement unheeded in Japan.

The opposition is based on the contention that no direct evidence has been found that points to Soviet government's involvement in the plot, although the Third International's complexity has been definitely traced. As the legal relation between the Third International and the Soviet government is not definite, a protest from Tokyo would lack legal standing, it is pointed out.

Tokyo Reds Caught In Roundup Staged By Japanese Police

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS TOKYO, Nov. 12.—Upon the suspicion that they were in conspiracy with the Third International of Moscow for illegal extension of communist doctrines in Japan, a group of members of the International Labor Defense society was arrested today in a roundup conducted by the Metropolitan Police Bureau.

Canada Fish Rights Won

Nipponese Fisherman Given Decision in Appeal Case

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS VANCOUVER, Nov. 9.—The Japanese fishery enterprises in British Columbia have won a signal victory late last month, when the appeal of the Canadian Government to the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada was dismissed by the Privy Council.

The decision of the Supreme Court of Canada referred to was rendered in May, 1928, which in effect recognized the fishery rights of the Japanese in British Columbia, naturalized as well as un-naturalized.

The victory was also for British Columbia against the Canadian Government, inasmuch as the latter's attempt to secure jurisdiction over the cannery industry conducted by the Japanese, in place of British Columbia, has failed.

UNDYING LOVE CAUSE OF DR. NOGCHI'S GREATNESS

TOKYO, Nov. 12.—The occasion of unveiling of monuments in honor of the late Dr. Hideo Noguchi, eminent Japanese scientist who fell as a victim of yellow fever while he was conducting research work into the disease in Africa in the summer of 1927 as a member of the Rockefeller Foundation, revealed a romance of his younger days when he was still a medical student.

The monuments were erected in front of the house in Fukushima Prefecture. The ceremony of unveiling, which was observed on September 29, and participated in by intimate friends and relatives of the late Noguchi was also attended by Dr. Yoneko Yamanouchi, a woman physician, whom the eminent scientist loved but never married.

The intimate friends of the late Dr. Noguchi are now planning to establish a Noguchi Memorial Hall to commemorate the life and work of the great scientist. John D. Rockefeller Jr., offered through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, to guarantee \$3,000 for the maintenance of such an institution when the plan is materialized.

JAPAN ENVOY OPENS ARMS NEGOTIATION

Cut-Down of Cruiser Tonnage Urged by Matsudaira

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS TOKYO, Nov. 12.—Following a special session of the Cabinet today, the Foreign Office dispatched a note to London instructing Ambassador Matsudaira to obtain a pre-conference understanding with Premier Ramsay MacDonald concerning Japan's demand for a 10-10-7 ratio in auxiliary ships.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Ambassador Tsuneo Matsudaira today visited Premier MacDonald at the Parliament building and opened negotiations for a pre-conference understanding relative to Japan's position on auxiliary craft limitation. Matsudaira demanded a cut-down in the provisional agreement made by MacDonald and Hoover on the cruiser tonnage.

Pointing out that setting of 310,000 cruiser tonnage for the United States and 330,000 tons for Great Britain will entail building of four or five additional cruisers for Japan if she would maintain a ratio of 10-10-7. This situation, Matsudaira pointed out, was not reduction but actual expansion.

TOKYO, Nov. 12.—The eldest sons of Japan's three great statesmen will attend the five-power London naval conference next year as unofficial observers, it was learned today. They include Yukaku Wakatsuki, eldest son of Reijiro Wakatsuki, Japan's chief delegate to the party and Shintaro Makino, son of Grand Chamberlain Count Makino. Commander Kiyoshi Yamamoto, son of Count Admiral Yamamoto, will also attend the conference.

UNDYING LOVE CAUSE OF DR. NOGCHI'S GREATNESS

TOKYO, Nov. 12.—The occasion of unveiling of monuments in honor of the late Dr. Hideo Noguchi, eminent Japanese scientist who fell as a victim of yellow fever while he was conducting research work into the disease in Africa in the summer of 1927 as a member of the Rockefeller Foundation, revealed a romance of his younger days when he was still a medical student.

The monuments were erected in front of the house in Fukushima Prefecture. The ceremony of unveiling, which was observed on September 29, and participated in by intimate friends and relatives of the late Noguchi was also attended by Dr. Yoneko Yamanouchi, a woman physician, whom the eminent scientist loved but never married.

The intimate friends of the late Dr. Noguchi are now planning to establish a Noguchi Memorial Hall to commemorate the life and work of the great scientist. John D. Rockefeller Jr., offered through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, to guarantee \$3,000 for the maintenance of such an institution when the plan is materialized.

MEMORIAL HALL Dr. T. Miyahara, an intimate friend of the late scientist, who recently returned from Fukushima Prefecture where he attended the

ceremony of unveiling the monuments, has organized a society with other friends of Dr. Noguchi to carry on various works commemorating the life and work of the late scientist.

NOT A LADIES BOY Dr. Miyahara maintains a large X-ray hospital in Atago-machi, Shiba. He and Dr. Noguchi had been close friends since their school days. While he was studying in New York he lived with Dr. Noguchi. As he was a confidential friend, Dr. Noguchi told him many of his secrets he did not dare tell to anyone else. According to Dr. Miyahara, Dr. Noguchi was never a "ladies' boy" throughout his life and it was this fact that drove him to concentrate all his energy on scientific research.

"Noguchi was never liked by girls," said Dr. Miyahara in an interview with the press, "because his family was very poor in his school days and he could not afford to wear decent clothes. No girl would sit by him. But while he was still in primary school in his home town he showed his intelligence. One day the principal of the school called him to his room and asked him what he intended to do after being graduated from the school. Young Noguchi told the principal that he had to be a farmer to help his parents earn a livelihood, but that he would like to keep on reading books. Mr. Kobayashi, the principal, pitied him and invited him to call at his home on a certain day. When the day came young Noguchi, accompanied by a few lobsters as a gift. It was on this occasion that Mr. Kobayashi offered to help him to go further with his school work.
