Japan followed the example of the United States, which remitted the Chinese indemnity in the Boxer uprising, to be applied to a Chinese educational fund, Ambassador De buchi said.

WENATCHEE, Wash., Dec. 13—Premier Reliyo Wakatsuki, Japan's chief delegate to the London naval conference, was deeply touched today when he learned that Japanese families with their tiny children waited out on the snow covered ground at Skykomish to greet the delegates when the train stopped there for a few minutes. Not being able to locate the train, the Japanese residents sent presents through a member of the party.

Being tired of the strenuous program of the day, Wakatsuki retired early about 9 p. m. Mrs. Takarabe, the only woman member of the party and wife of Admiral Takarabe, refused to retire until the train reached Wenatchee about 11:30 p. m. The train passed over the beautiful Cascade mountain, which is covered with a beautiful blanket of snow.

The angered rioters, who were demonstrating against the erection of a power plant on the river bank because it will destroy their fishing trade, were finally overpowered by the police. The riot this morning is a renewal of the demonstration which started last night.

The power plant is being constructed by the city of Takaoka.
