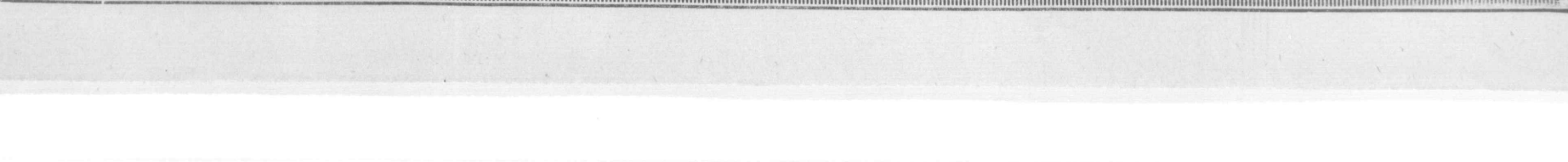

Japan Decides to Compete For Davis Cup in Europe Zone

TOKYO, Dec. 16—The executive committee of the Japan Lawn Tennis Association decided today to issue its challenge for the Davis cup in the European zone in 1930 instead of the American zone as it has done heretofore. The committee said the action was taken because the European zone offers a greater variety of competition.

CASTLE WILL LEAVE FROM S. F. DEC. 21

New Envoy to Nippon Scheduled to Stop For Hawaii Visit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16—William R. Castle Jr. recently appointed by President Hoover as a special ambassador to Tokyo during the period of International Conference on Naval Armament, is scheduled to leave San Francisco on Dec. 21.

Pending the Senate's confirmation of the appointment, Mr. Castle will remain in Washington and participate in the conferences which will be conducted between the State Department and the Japanese delegates who arrived here today.

While enroute to Tokyo, the special American envoy will spend a few days in Honolulu visiting his father and other relatives, and will stay there on the Steamship President Jefferson, which is due at Yokohama on Jan. 20, the day before the London conference is to begin.

It was made known at the White House that Mr. Castle would return to his present duties as Assistant Secretary of State when the armament conference was concluded.

WELL QUALIFIED

His selection for special ambassadorial duties is designed to place in Tokyo, while the armament conference is in session, an experienced diplomat familiar with the purposes of the administration with respect to naval armament limitation and who will be able to make representations directly to the Japanese Government concerning complications that may arise in the London negotiations.

The selection of Mr. Castle for the Japanese mission comes at a time when considerable pessimism over the outcome of the armament conference is being voiced by many. Much of this pessimism is a reflection of what appears to be a widespread opinion in France and to some extent in Italy, which has created the impression that those two countries will refuse to accept any armament reduction or limitation proposals which would insure the conclusion of a treaty by the five participants, the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan.

The recent disclosure of the claims that would be made by Japan in the conference with regard to cruisers and submarines has produced considerable uneasiness in official circles here, and the course of the President in deciding to send Mr. Castle to Tokyo has a direct bearing on that fact.

MANY DECLINE

While designated for a special mission, Mr. Castle has been nominated for full ambassadorial rank, in succession to Charles MacVeagh, who tendered his resignation last March and returned to this country soon afterward. Mr. MacVeagh is now engaged in practicing law in New York. Since his departure from Tokyo the United States has been represented by a Charge d'Affaires there.

West of Illinois, former Secretary of the Interior, and the Japanese Government was asked if Mr. West would be acceptable. Before a response was received Mr. West, for business reasons, withdrew his acceptance of the tender.

MR. CASTLE'S CAREER

Mr. Castle was born in Honolulu under the Hawaiian monarchy on June 19, 1878. His father was King Kalakaua's Minister in Washington. He was graduated from Harvard in 1900; was an instructor and assistant dean there from 1904 to 1913; was director of the Bureau of Communications of the American Cross during Hawaiian participation in the World War; entered the State Department as a special assistant in 1919, and was gradually promoted until he reached his present position of Assistant Secretary of State in February, 1927.

The task of persuading the Japanese delegation that its contentions with respect to submarines and 10,000-ton cruisers, on which Tokyo is understood to seek at least a 70 per cent ratio with respect to British and American strength, are based on apprehensions that have no substantial foundation as far as the United States and Britain are concerned, appears to have been allotted to Secretary Stimson. Meanwhile the British Government is conducting exchanges with France and Italy, and the two countries last named are engaged in controversies having to do with their own peculiar needs, especially in the Mediterranean.

HIS MISSION

In these circumstances the importance of Mr. Castle's special mission to Tokyo becomes apparent. Publication in this country of suggestions that the Japanese claims with respect to an armament limitation arrangement were designed chiefly for trading purposes have insisted that they practically constitute the minimum requirements of the Japanese Navy.

Mr. Castle has had special familiarity with the factors which will enter into the London discussions and this was stressed with the announcement of his nomination. He has attended the various meetings between officials of the government in mapping out the American program and has an intimate knowledge of the preliminary exchanges between the United States and the four other powers. With the White House statement that President Hoover wanted to have at Tokyo while the London conference was in progress someone familiar with the problems involved, a tribute was paid to Mr. Castle's fitness for the mission.

15 Autos Carry Party to Mayflower Hotel in Washington

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16—Upon its arrival here at the Union station at 10 a. m. today, the Japanese delegation to the London naval conference was greeted by a group of distinguished leaders of the National capital, including Secretary and Mrs. Henry L. Stimson, Secretary Adams, Admiral Platt, and newly-appointed Ambassador to Japan, Mr. William Castle Jr.

President Hoover was represented by Capt. Buchanan, his naval aide.

OFFICIAL VISIT

Aboard fifteen automobiles, the entire Japanese delegation and the American welcome group paraded through Pennsylvania Ave. to Hotel Mayflower.

At 3 p. m. today the two Japanese delegates, ex-Premier Reijiro Wakatsuki and Minister of Navy Admiral Takeshi Takarabe, together with their advisors Vice-Admiral Sakonji and Mr. Hiroshi Saito of the Foreign Office, will be presented to President Hoover at the White House.

WELCOME FETE

Tonight the Japanese delegation will be feted at a banquet to be given by Ambassador DeBucht. The weather in Washington is exceedingly fine.

Although the Eastern papers declare that Japan will launch a 10-10-7 ratio claim with the State Department here while the Japanese party is in Washington, the delegates thus far have never declared for any exact ratio but they simply affirmed the stand that Japan will need a minimum navy to protect her interests.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14—Assurances of American-Japanese accord on President Hoover's policy of actual naval reduction in place of mere limitation will be given the Washington Government by the two Japanese delegates arriving in the capital tomorrow en route to the London naval party.

The conversations which the delegates, former Premier Reijiro Wakatsuki and Admiral Takeshi Takarabe, Japanese Minister of Marine, will have with President Hoover, Secretary Stimson and the American delegates to the London Conference will be of a preliminary nature. Questions of major policy will be settled at the conference itself.

Upon two questions, however, the Japanese and American Governments are in complete accord. The first is that the Kellogg anti-war treaty, under which the signatory and adhering Nations agreed to renounce war as national policy, should be one of the prime considerations in shaping a naval agreement.

The second point upon which they agree is that the agreement which is reached should provide for reduction of the sea fighting strength of the interested naval powers in place of mere limitation.

OLD EDUCATION AND NEW

By GLENN FRANK

The old education was rooted in a philosophy of stuff and store. It was the teacher's business to stuff the student with knowledge.

It was the student's business to store the knowledge for later use. This older notion of education started with the assumption that the major purpose of childhood was to prepare for adulthood.

And this preparation consisted chiefly in memorizing knowledge. Childhood was to be spent storing up knowledge.

Adulthood was to be spent using this knowledge. Franklin Bobbitt, professor of school administration at the University of Chicago, recently subjected this conception of education to a drastic overhauling.

"Of course," he said, "there was a good deal of make-believe in all of this. They pretended to believe that the geography, the history, the algebra, the general science and the other studies, if hammered home to the point of mastery, would remain unchanged in storage for adult use years afterwards. And yet they knew, when they stopped to think about it, that the human mind automatically eliminates everything that is not used; that these piles of text-book information had no special immunity and that they would go the way of all other unused mental furniture. . . . They would be speedily forgotten."

"They also assumed that the text-book information stored in the year 1900, let us say, would be perfectly good information when brought forth for use in 1930. Of course, they knew that the world was rapidly changing, and that bodies of information relative to the world would have correspondingly to change, if they were to be of any use. And yet they stored it to the point of mastery, and then on to the point of overlearning, even though they knew it would be ob-

solete, or at least archaic, when the time should come for bringing it forth for use."

This older education thought its business was to promote learning for living and learning means to it mainly the mastery of information. Yet the information in school for later adult use was marked by these two things:

First, the information that was not used rather promptly after it was learned and rather continuously thereafter was forgotten.

Second, the information that was remembered was almost invariably out of date and obsolete by the time the student grew up and wanted to use it for adult purposes.

There is a new education now taking the field that has broken away from this tyranny of information. The old education was an adventure in learning for living; the new education is an adventure in learning by living.

I shall discuss this new education tomorrow.
