CASTLE WILL LEAVE FROM S. F. DEC. 21

New Envoy to Nippon Scheduled to Stop for Hawaii Visit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16—William

R. Castle Jr. recently appointed by President Hoover as a special ambassador to Tokyo during the period of International Conference on Naval Armament, is scheduled to leave San Francisco on Dec. 21.

Pending the Senate's confirmation of the appointment, Mr. Castle will remain in Washington and participate in the conferences which will be conducted between the State Department and the Japanese delegates who arrived here today.

While enroute to Tokyo, the special American envoy will spend a few days in Honolulu visiting his father and other relatives, and will thenceforth on the Steamship President Jefferson, which is due at Yokohama on Jan. 20, the day before the London conference is to begin.

It was made known at the White House that Mr. Castle would return to his present duties as Assistant Secretary of State when the armament conference was concluded.

WELL QUALIFIED

His selection for special ambassadorial duties is designed to place in Tokyo, while the armament conference is in session, an experienced diplomatist familiar with the purposes of the administration with respect to naval armament limitation and who will be able to make representations directly to the Japanese Government concerning complications that may arise in the London negotiations.

The selection of Mr. Castle for the Japanese mission comes at a time when considerable pessimism over the outcome of the armament conference is being voiced by many.

Much of this pessimism is a reflection of what appears to be a widespread opinion in France and in some extent in Italy, which has created the impression that those two countries will refuse to accept any armament reduction or limitation proposals which would insure the conclusion of a treaty by the five participants, the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan.

The recent disclosure of the claims that would be made by Japan in the conference with regard to cruisers and submarines has produced considerable uneasiness in official circles here, and the course of the President in deciding to send Mr. Castle to Tokyo has a direct bearing on that factor.

MANY DECLINE

While designated for a special mission, Mr. Castle has been nominated for full Ambassadorial rank in succession to Charles MacVeagh who tendered his resignation last March and returned to this country soon afterward. Mr. MacVeagh is now engaged in practicing law in New York. Since his departure from Tokyo the United States has been represented by a Charge d'Affaires there.

The task of persuading the Japanese delegation that its contentions with respect to submarines and 10,000-ton cruisers, on which Tokyo is understood to seek at least a 70 per cent ratio with respect to British and American strength, are based on apprehensions that have no substantial foundation as far as the United States and Britain are concerned, appears to have been allotted to Secretary Stimson. Meanwhile the British Government is conducting exchanges with France and Italy, and the two countries last named are engaged in controversies having to do with their own peculiar needs, especially in the Mediterranean.

HIS MISSION

In these circumstances the importance of Mr. Castle's special mission to Tokyo becomes apparent. Publication in this country of suggestions that the Japanese claims with respect to an armament limitation arrangement were designed chiefly for trading purposes have insisted that they practically constitute the minimum requirements of the Japanese Navy.

Mr. Castle has had special familiarity with the factors which will enter into the London discussions and this was stressed with the announcement of his nomination. He has attended the various meetings between officials of the government in mapping out the American program and has an intimate knowledge of the preliminary exchanges between the United States and the four other powers. With the White House statement that President Hoover wanted to have at Tokyo while the London conference was in progress someone familiar with the problems involved, a tribute was paid to Mr. Castle's fitness for the mission.
