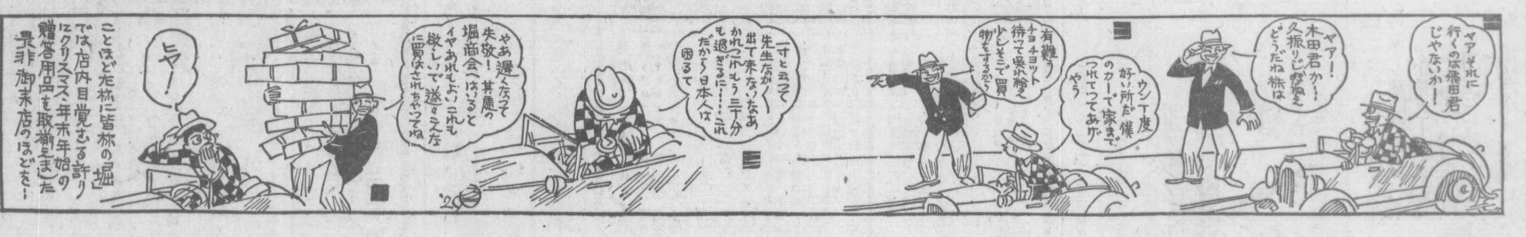

ATTRACTING TOURISTS IS JAPAN'S AIM

6,000,000 Yen Will Be Used for Improving Hotels

TOKYO, Dec. 23—The special commission appointed to investigate methods for promoting foreign trade has approved the bill proposing to induce foreign tourists to visit Japan. The commission is composed of 15 businessmen, and high government officials, including Mr. Junnosuke Inouye, Finance Minister, as chairman.

One of the outstanding features of the project calls for an appropriation of ¥6,000,000 by the government as a loan at a low rate of interest for the improvement and establishment of hotels for foreign tourists.

An appropriation of ¥500,000 by the Railway Ministry is requested for advertising as another important feature of the bill. These appropriations by the government are to be annual and to continue for a certain fixed number of years.

The bill emphasizes the importance of preserving and improving the natural beauty spots and places of historic interest.

"The amount of money spent by tourists in this country totals about ¥50,000,000 a year," said Dr. Teizyo Watanabe, director of the Japan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, who is one of the members of the commission. "But I am of the opinion that it will not be hard to double or treble the amount if the government launches a campaign in the proper way. So far the government practically has done nothing in the way of attracting foreign tourists to this country."

HOTELS
"The problem of first and foremost importance is regarding hotels. In this country it is difficult to operate a foreign style hotel on a paying basis for the time being. Nevertheless it is necessary to have a large number of hotels equipped for any foreign tourists."

"I understand that the night life in Japan is too quiet for foreign tourists. I am of the opinion that entertainments such as social dances and vaudeville shows at hotels and other public places should not be interfered with by police. The police should understand thoroughly what is meant by social dancing."

EUROPE GETS MORE
Of course there is a limit to every thing and I do not mean to say that whatever foreign visitors do should be overlooked but it certainly is not right to raise an uproar against foreigners for some slight offense."

The number of foreign visitors to Japan has been increasing yearly.
