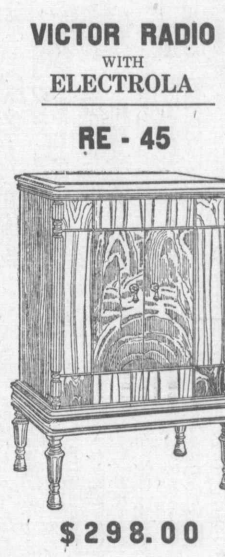

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3 ZEPS FOR U. S.-TO-ASIA LINE IS PLAN

100-Passenger Ship to Be Launched in 1932 For Jpan Service

AKRON, Ohio, Jan. 13.—Three giant dirigibles to operate between the Western coast of the United States and Japan, bringing the Orient several days nearer to the American traveler and business man who has his eye on the commercial development of Asia, is the tentative scheme of dirigible builders here. It is expected that 1932 will be the date the first ship is put into service. This will run between Honolulu and a city in California, according to Paul W. Litchfield, president of the Goodyear Zeppelin Corporation, which is the parent of the Pacific Zeppelin Transport Company. The ships will be 785 feet long. With the use of helium for inflation, the passengers may be housed with safety inside the hull of the ship itself. The builders tentatively plan accommodations for 100 passengers. Directors of the Pacific Corporation include officials of three Pacific steamship companies; the United Aircraft and Transport Corporation. The president of the Pacific Zeppelin is Jerome C. Hunsacker, former Navy commander. The trip to Honolulu will require a day and a half, while that to Manila will take six days. From Manila, Yokohama would be only a day and a half away.

JAPAN ENVOY IS HONORED

Debut Elected Head of Japan Society of New York

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Katsujirō Debuchi, Japanese Ambassador to the United States, was elected honorary president of the Japan Society and Charles McVeagh, former United States Ambassador to Japan, was chosen his vice president yesterday at the society's annual meeting at 36 West Forty-fourth Street. Alexander Tison, attorney, was re-elected president; Jerome D. Greene, vice president; and Eugene C. Worden, secretary. Honorary vice-presidents re-elected were James A. Farrell, Thomas W. Lamont and Charles E. Mitchell. George W. Davidson, president of the Central Hanover Bank and Trust Company, was made a director. The society, which has 1,300 members, seeks to maintain and improve friendly relations and trade between the United States and Japan.

THE ROAD TO REALITY

Ideas that have cost him nothing but a nod it paperizes him. It turns him into a spiritual mendicant. In a very real sense, I cannot accept the religion of another. In the matter of the spirit no truth is mine until I have lived it. That I am intellectually convinced that a creedal statement is true does not make it true for me. It becomes true for me only when, trusting my life to it and watching what happens, I find it coloring and controlling my life creatively alike in hours of meditation and in hours of action. I can see no spiritual gain when the mind accepts a creed because it has been bullied by the threat of authority, scared by the fear of damnation, or lured by the sensuous appeal of a glamorous heaven. Mere intellectual assent to the logical correctness of a doctrine is no more a spiritual act than getting the right answer to a problem in geometry. The nutritive truths of religion are not arrived at by logical thinking but by experimental living. This is the road to reality.

Japan to Dissolve Parliament Jan. 21 After Reconvening
