ANGLO-JAPAN AGREEMENT HOPES HELD

Britain to Urge U. S. To Slash Cruisers to 150,000 Tons

Special to The Japanese American News LONDON, Jan. 15.—Although pessimism was expressed here even since the conclusion of negotiations between Japan and Great Britain for the establishment of a ratio on big cruisers, reports today indicate that these conversations had succeeded in clarifying the atmosphere and germinating a basis for the working out of a compromise.

Reports indicate that MacDonald had given the Japanese delegates a promise to reconsider Britain's objection to the Japanese insistence on a 70 per cent strength of the highest navy in the big cruiser category. This problem of ratio will not be discussed further among the delegates until the United States delegation arrives here, although a joint Anglo-Japanese committee of naval experts will study this matter when it meets on Jan. 16.

TOKYO, Jan. 15.—The Government today convoked a meeting of naval experts to study the results of the Anglo-Japanese conversations, which were reported from London. Important instructions were then dispatched to Vice-Admiral Sakonji, chief of naval advisers to the Japanese delegates in London.

Report from London today says that Great Britain will demand of the United States a reduction of big cruisers to the 150,000 ton limit in order that Japan's demand for a 70 per cent ratio may be conceded.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Eighty Laborites in the Lower House of the Parliament today resolved that they will jointly publish an open letter demanding the British delegates to advocate the limiting of capital ships to 10,000 tons.

MISSING LINK IS FOUND IN PEIPING MAN?

10 Skeletons Of What Are Thought To Be Dawn Men Dug

By DAVID DIETZ From S. F. News Scientists are awaiting eagerly the detailed study of the 10 headless skeletons and the one skull recently discovered in the quarries at Chou Kou Tien, 30 miles from Peiping, China.

It is hoped that the study may throw light upon the controversy of "missing links" and upon the argument precipitated by Dr. Henry Fairfield Osborn president of the American Museum of Natural History, Dr. Osborn, in an address at the Des Moines meeting of the American Ass'n for the Advancement of Science, insisted that mankind was at least 1,000,000 years old and that the immediate ancestor of man was a "dawn man" and not an "ape man."

The discoveries at Chou Kou Tien represent the greatest accomplishment to date of an international group of scientists which has been at work at the place for several years.

Previous discoveries consisted only of fragments of a jaw and some teeth.

The first trace of "Peiping Man," as scientists refer to him, was found at the Chou Kou Tien site by Dr. A. Zdanis, a Russian scientist.

FILED WITH BONES The site is a cavern filled with bones of countless animals all cemented together into a huge block of limestone. The removal of the bones is a task of great difficulty. Each fossilized bone must be chiseled carefully from the matrix of stone in which it is imbedded. Haste or carelessness would ruin the whole project.

The discovery of the first tooth was followed by the discovery of a second one by Birger Bohlin, a young Swedish scientist. This tooth was studied by Dr. Davidson Black, a young American at the Peking Medical College. Dr. Black formerly taught anthropology at Western Reserve University in Cleveland, O.

DR. BLACK recognized the age and importance of the tooth and coined the name of "Sianthropus Pekinensis" or "Peiping man," for the fossil. Peiping man, according to Dr. Black and Dr. J. G. Anderson, Swedish adviser to the Chinese Geological Survey, is as old as Java man or Pitoldown man.

Java man or Pithecanthropus, as readers of these articles know, consists of a skull, several teeth and a thigh-bone, found at Trinil, Java. Pitoldown, or Eoanthropus consists of fragments of a skull, a jaw bone, some teeth, and nasal bones, found at Pitoldown, Sussex, England.

Scientists of the world hope that the careful work started at Chou Kou Tien will be continued and that the revolution and other difficulties in China will not interfere.

WEST SHOULD BEWARE!

BY GLENN FRANK Some years ago, when I was editor of The Century Magazine, one of my most interesting contributors was Nathaniel Peffer, a brilliant young American who was wedded to the spiritual aspirations of the Orient rather than to the swift action of the Occident.

I met him again the other day in a New York Club. We spoke of the long talks we had in other years of the competition that was coming to a head between the civilization of the East and the civilization of the West. It was more than four years since we had sat down to talk of these things. In the meantime, he had spent much time in the Far East.

"Well," I asked him, "how do you feel now about the conflict between the civilizations of the East and West?"

"Since we last met," he said, "the West has won. It's only a question of time until the East will go Western."

I am, as readers of this column know, a partisan of the possibilities of the machine civilization of the West. I think this commercial civilization of the spirit of man is its greatest opportunity by freeing the body of man from the blight of drudgery.

I realize that the prosperity of the West may mean the standardization of the spirit of man, but the poverty of the East also standardizes the spirit of man.

West and East alike have a good and bad side. The problem is to unite the good of the West with the good of the East and to renounce the bad of both.

We of the West cannot afford to become the sponsors of any racial cult that defies everything Western and damns everything Eastern.

If the white man of the West is too assertive, he will yet have to pay for his aggressiveness.

For I suspect that the future will force a reevaluation of the braggadochio and bluster of the man of action. We may, as my friend Ernest Gruening once said, be facing a Cogetterdammerung—the twilight of the go-getter, of the man of action for action's sake.

The white man of the West can learn much from the colored man of the East about the spirit of life; the colored man of the East can learn much from the white man of the West about the machinery of life.

If this racial collaboration between West and East proves impossible, the East may go to slow death by superstition, the West to quick death by suicide.

RAISIN CITY PLANS JAPAN TEA EDIFICE

Project Approved By Park Commission at Recent Meeting

Special to The Japanese American News FRESNO, Jan. 15.—Plans for the construction of a Japanese tea garden in Rooding park, presented by City Forester Peter M. Rasmussen, were approved by members of the city park commission.

The plans as approved call for the garden to be placed adjacent to the state highway about halfway between Belmont and Olive Avenues.
