Fresno Dries Retreat
As Japanese Pour
Jugful in Sink

FRESNO, Jan. 27—(UP)—The hysterical mother of a newborn baby won the momentary respite from raiding federal agents Friday night that permitted a Japanese family to frustrate seizing of evidence and caused the dries to beat a strategic retreat.

The raid took place at a noodle restaurant in Chinatown operated by T. Nosu and his son-in-law, Kubota. Mrs. Hanako Kubota became hysterical, federal dry agent Paul L. Mathias found himself in a group of arm-waving and chattering Japanese and in the excitement a jugful of something or other was dumped in a kitchen sink.

Mathias left, but not before he sent word to T. Nosu that he was charged with resisting a federal officer. No liquor charges were preferred.

THE REBEL ARISTOCRAT

It is interesting to note that the man who has done most to keep liberal humanitarianism alive on the bench of the Supreme Court of the United States for the last thirty years is an aristocrat by birth and breeding.

I speak obviously of Mr. Justice Holmes.

On an afternoon early in January I had the delight of a stroll across the bridge that spans Rock Creek in outer Washington with the gracious and gifted Chief Justice Taft of the United States. It was the afternoon before he entered the hospital for a rest, but that afternoon his mind was agile and eager and his spirit as buoyant and boyish as ever.

The next afternoon I stopped for a few moments in the Supreme Court chamber, and was fortunate to find the great Holmes reading an opinion. Later in the same afternoon I sat at tea with the lean and clairvoyant Brandeis. Three singularly satisfying experiences.

It is no reflection or favoritism to say that my mind keeps going back to the irresistible figure of Mr. Justice Holmes, for during these days I happened to be spending my spare moments reading that singularly refreshing book "The Dissenting Opinions of Mr. Justice Holmes."

His exquisite and exacting intelligence is vibrant on every page of this volume.

Here we can see his consistent refusal to think it the job of the jurist to be a mere referee between

pleas and precedents.

Here we can see his abiding conviction that the spirit of the law cannot be isolate from the spirit of the age.

Here we can see his unwavering championship of the liberty of the individual and of the rights of minorities.

Here we can see his abiding conviction that the spirit of the law cannot be isolate from the spirit of the age.

Here we can see his abiding belief that the inflexible constitutions must not be used as clubs to beat back intelligent change.

Here we can see his determination to put reason and right above the routine application of outgrown and obsolete precedents.

Here we can see his uncanny realization of the fact that power carries with it a temptation to prostitute it to narrow and selfish ends.

"The Dissenting Opinions of Mr. Justice Holmes" is a great document!

Never did a frowsy son of the submerged plead with such power for the elemental rights of man and a clear road for progress as has this rebel aristocrat.

DELEGATE IN DISARM TALK

Wakatsuki Broadcasts
Japan's Attitude
Over Air

LONDON, Jan. 27—Reliyo Wakatsuki, chief Japanese delegate to the naval conference, broadcast Japan's attitude on the problems of naval limitation, through an American national radio hook-up this evening at 6 o'clock. He reiterated Japan's willingness to cooperate, with his usual emphasis on the importance of actual reduction, rather than mere limitation, of the warships.
