JAPAN SEEKS EQUALITY IN SUBMARINES

Reply to U. S. Plan Is Given Stimson By Matsudaira

LONDON, Feb. 12—Ambassador Matsudaira this afternoon deposited with Secretary Stimson Japan's reply to the United States' proposal regarding limitation of the capital ships and vessels in the auxiliary category as announced last Friday.

Japan's reply may be summarized in the following:

1. Japan opposes the United States proposal as a basis of discussion.

2. Japan will demand 70 per cent ratio of the British and American navies in all the auxiliary categories, including vessels of the 10,000-ton cruiser class.

3. Japan demands maintenance of a status quo ratio in submarines.

The Japanese delegation has changed its former decision, and the Japanese reply handed to Secretary Stimson will be made public officially tomorrow morning.

MATSUDAIRA VISITS REED

Feb. 12—Ambassador Taneo Matsudaira will today visit the United States delegation headquarters and deposit with Senator Reed the Japanese response to the American proposal made public last Friday.

While the details of the Japanese response are not known, it is believed that Japan will take the following stand:

1. Japan will agree to a reduction of the capital ships in accordance with the U. S. proposal of 15 crafts each for America and Great Britain and 9 for Japan, with the following two provisos:

OPPOSES REPLACEMENT

Japan will oppose replacement, or building of new ships, to achieve this ratio (it was rumored the United States will propose to build one capital ship of the British Rodney type to bring its navy on parity in fact with Britain).

Japan advocates that each nation be given a free hand in selecting what ships it will scrap to achieve the 15-15-9 figure.

2. Japan will demand a 70 per cent ratio for big cruisers and the ships in the other auxiliary categories. This means that Japan will not agree to the United States proposal for a 60 per cent ratio.

3. Japan will propose a parity with the United States and Great Britain in submarines, taking as the basis for discussion the status quo strength of each nation in this type of war vessels.

U. S. DEMANDS

LONDON, Feb. 12—If an agreement cannot be reached for the construction of one capital ship of the British Rodney type by the United States to achieve its parity with Britain, Stimson is expected to propose that Britain scrap crafts of Queen Elizabeth type. Under the American plan, Britain would have to scrap five and the United States three battleships to attain the common numerical strength of fifteen capital ships each.

Nichi-Bei Society Newly Reorganized Under Another Name

The Nichi-Bei Club of the local Lowell high school, widely known for its work in behalf of inter-racial and international friendship, will close its brilliant record of three years, to give way to a new club under the name of "Pacific Relations Club."

This was the announcement made yesterday by F. H. Clark, principal of the school.

Organized three years ago by a group of Japanese and American students interested in the affairs of the Pacific, the Nichi-Bei Club has enjoyed a noteworthy growth in both membership and range of work. Four time during its brief career the club sponsored Oriental art exhibitions, which invariably received much praise from both the faculty and critics. It also sponsored an educational tour of Japan last year.

Since the Chinese and Filipinos who had been associated with the club originally, wish to organize a similar circle of their own, Mr. Clark suggested that the present Nichi-Bei Club reorganize itself to embrace all class of students under the general name of the Pacific Relations Club.
