JAPAN NOTES BIG TURNOUT IN ELECTION

80 Pet. Ballot Seen
In General Diet
Contest

TOKYO, Feb. 20.—With weather exceptionally fine, more than ten million voters began to gather about the polls from early this morning to elect a new Japanese Imperial Diet.

Interest is so keen in all districts that practically 80 per cent of voters are expected to cast their ballots.

Premier Hamaguchi, the man who most ardently urged all subjects to vote today, will not himself cast ballot. Having moved twice within a year, he is debarred by residence qualifications.

Tsuyoshi Inukai, the president of the chief opposition party, likewise did not vote. He was returning from a strenuous campaign tour of his native city of Okayama last night, when he was ordered from the party headquarters to return to the same territory for another series of campaign speeches. Okayama, which has been regarded as a stronghold for the Seiyukai party, was suddenly endangered at the last moment by the invasion of three Cabinet Ministers, who took the stump for the Minseito.

Inukai found himself arraigned against the harraguing of Finance Minister Junnosuke Inouye, Colonial Minister Genji Matsuda, and Railways Minister Yoku Egi, but the doughty veteran of the Seiyukai cause fought valiantly with his usual satirical addresses for which he is noted.

MINSEITO VICTORY

TOKYO, Feb. 20.—(UPI)—"The government will win today's election by a comfortable margin," Premier Yuko Hamaguchi told newspaper men this morning as Japanese voters went to the polls to vote for members of the lower house of parliament. "I believe we will elect more than 230 candidates it may win as many as 240 seats."

Tsuyoshi Inukai, venerable leader of the Seiyukai—principal opposition party—was somewhat more cautious, forecasting the election of 220 Seiyukai candidates.

Neutral observers forecast party strength in the new Diet, which has a total of 466 members, as follows:

Minseito or government party, 220 to 230.

Selyukai, 200 to 220.

Proletarians, 10 to 12.

Meisetsukai, or progressives, 3 to 4.

Kokumin Doshikai, or national union, 2 or 3.

KOREAN VOTE

Proletarians, in a last minute statement, declared their candidates will receive unusual support from the Korean voters, enfranchised as a result of a ruling which allows ballots to be cast in the Korean language. There are about 50,000 Koreans, chiefly laborers, entitled to vote because of their residence in Japan.

Today's election was called when Emperor Hirohito dissolved the 57th session of the Diet a month ago at the request of Premier Hamaguchi, who said a special election was necessary to obtain members truly representative of the popular will. The Seiyukai party cabinet, headed by the late Gen. Gilchi Tanaka, had been overthrown on July 2, causing formation of a Minseito government despite the fact the Minseito could not muster a majority in the Diet.
