PRINCES OF DENMARK TO VISIT JAPAN

Prince Frederick and Entourage Is Due in Japan on Mar. 19

TOKYO, Feb. 21—Crown Prince Frederik of Denmark, accompanied by his younger brother Prince Knud and by Prince and Princess Axel, will arrive in Japan on March 19 on an official visit lasting ten days. During their stay in Tokyo they will reside at the Kasumigaseki Palace, where the Crown Prince and Princess of Sweden and the Duke of Gloucester remained during their respective visits to Japan.

The Danish royal party will arrive in Yokohama on the steamer *Fonda* of the Danish East Asiatic Company and will be accompanied by Mr. H. Kauffmann, Danish Minister to Japan, China and Siam, who will join the party at Bangkok. The party will return home aboard the same steamer, which has been placed at their disposal by the line for the purpose of the visit.

THE NAVY

All three Danish princes are in the Navy. Crown Prince Frederik and Prince Knud have served in both the Army and Navy but are now attached to the Navy and serve regular periods aboard warships annually. Prince Axel was one of the first flyers in his home country. All reside in Copenhagen.

Princess Axel, known as Margareta, is the elder daughter of Prince Carl of Sweden and was married in 1919. Her two younger sisters Marthe and Astrid are respectively Crown Princesses of Norway and Belgium. The Danish royal party has been visiting in Europe, where they called to congratulate Crown Prince Umberto of Italy and Princess Marie Jose on the occasion of their recent wedding.

INTINERARY

The royal party took the boat at Messina and are now understood to be on their way to Japan via Porta. They will stop at Bangkok and Shanghai for several days. Although their program in Japan has not yet been definitely fixed, they are expected to come to Tokyo immediately upon their arrival and to spend several days here, then continuing on to Kyoto and Nara and other scenic spots.

Prince Axel has previously visited Japan, having come here as the Captain of an East Asiatic Company vessel on which he made a tour of the world in 1921-22. Other members in the royal party include Chamberlain W. Bach and Captain Thiele of the Danish navy.

ADM. TOGO TO ACT IN MOVIE

Film Commemorates Victory in Battle of Japan Sea

TOKYO, Feb. 21—Admiral Heihachiro Togo, the Grand Old Man of the Japanese Navy and hero of the Russo-Japanese War, has consented to appear personally in a movie which the Nikkatsu studio will produce to commemorate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the famous Japan Sea Battle of that war.

The film, to be entitled "Debacle," will be taken at Oshima or Izu, just south of Tokyo. Viscount Chozel Ogasawara will write the scenario.

Admiral Togo was the fleet admiral in charge of the Japanese forces when they met in the terrific Japan Sea Battle that virtually demolished the entire Russian Baltic Fleet, which had attempted an invasion of Japan.

STATE RESEARCH COUNCILS

Research in the living problems of politics, economics, and social relations faces many difficulties and temptations in state-supported institutions of learning.

Its course lies ever between the Scylla of trouble and the Charybdis of timidity.

A research that turns up facts and deductions that the party in power does not like may land a State University, let us say, in endless trouble. And sometimes social research tempts lest it results discourage adequate appropriations from the State Legislature.

I think much of these dangers of research and timidity might be avoided by means of a new agency that might be called the State Research Council.

Such councils could be made up of the directing minds of the university's research forces and lay representatives from all the basic social and economic groups in the state, so that the council could serve as a medium through which the people of the state could approach the university and throw its unsolved problems on the study tables of the scholars.

When it became necessary to study such problems as taxation that are loaded with the dynamite of political controversy, such councils could go far toward safeguarding against the dangers of piecemeal research and guaranteeing comprehensiveness, towards guarding against biased interpretation of facts and insuring, as far as humanly possible, scientific impartiality.

And this could be achieved, I think by the simple device of submitting the results of such research, in advance of publication, to the scrutiny of the State Research Council, letting the representatives of all the groups in the state that would be affected by the results of the research submit the results to the searching study of their own experts, and then bringing these representatives of business, labor, and so on, around a table to register their objections if they had any. If the representative of any group can win the agreement of the other groups to the soundness of his objections if the scholars concur, then the flaw that has been found will be remedied. But if a representative of a group cannot prove his point before the other group representatives or the scholars, and still thinks his protest sound, he can be given the right to print his foot-note of dissent along with the report itself.

This simple device would, I think, do two things: It would afford training in the cooperative consideration of common state problems by groups that normally stay apart and fight each other, and it would prevent the charge that a little band of isolated highbrows seeks to meddle without warrant in public affairs.

TENOY MARU OPEN NYK'S MANILA RUN

Slash of One Day in Trans-Pacific Line Is Announced

TOKYO, Feb. 21—Madame Egi, 53, who had achieved considerable popularity as a beauty and literary personality during the Meiji period, today committed suicide by hanging in the home of her brother Hayakawa in Osaka.

A student of Japanese classics, Madame Egi was the toast of Tokyo during her heyday of popularity.

Her beauty was declared to be unrivaled, and her male contemporaries even cite her as an example of the classic Japanese feminine pulchritude that vanished with the advent of jazz and the New Woman in Japan.

She is the widow of the late Dr. Eguchi, who was the toast of San Francisco and the Orient Line were announced yesterday by Takeo Yamamoto, resident manager.
