In keeping with their long established policy to lend cooperation in all public movements for the civic welfare of the community, Japanese business men and residents of San Francisco are preparing at this time to assist the Community Chest in its campaign to raise \$2,200,000, with which to finance the one hundred and seven welfare and social service agencies during the coming year.

A volunteer army of six thousand workers, men and women, will make a community-wide solicitation of subscriptions from February 24 to March 7. This force will be composed of thirty-three divisions, one of which will be directed by M. Aoki, well known San Franciscan, who is to be designated as "Colonel." He has named as his Lieutenant Colonel I. Kawashima. H. Ichiharu will act as Adjutant.

Serving as Majors under Colonel Aoki will be the following: Y. Kanazawa, K. Tomizawa of the Y. M. C. A.; M. Kobayashi, of the Salvation Army; K. Shigetani and M. S. Fujita, president of the Japanese Y. W. C. A.

Daily report meetings are to be held in connection with luncheons at the Saint Francis Hotel during the period of the campaign, February 24 to March 7, with the exception of March 2. The Japanese team workers will participate in these meetings at which the daily returns of subscriptions obtained will be reported.

The Japanese Division has invariably made a fine showing in all past campaigns of the Community Chest and has obtained the quota of subscriptions assigned to it. Colonel Aoki is hopeful of making an even better showing this year than ever before. The quota assigned to the Japanese Division this year is \$3,200.

Majoni Chosen New Italian Ambassador To Japanese Capital

TOKYO, Feb. 22.—Leone Wellischott, Charge d'Affaires of the Italian Embassy announced that the Japanese Government had expressed its approval of the appointment of G. C. Majoni, former Minister to Poland, as the new Italian Ambassador to Japan.

Mr. Majoni succeeds Baron Pompeo Aloisi, who has been appointed Italian Ambassador to Turkey.

THE GREAT WASHINGTON BY GLENN FRANK

Having read most of the later biographies of Washington that have been done in the modern manner, many of them motivated by an intoxication with idol-breaking that outran an initial devotion to reality I have lately turned back to John Marshall's life of Washington, first published in 1822.

Marshall, who was later to become the great Chief Justice, was an intimate contemporary of Washington. His mind was not mired in the sugary sentimentality of a Farron Weems, whose maudlin hero-worship was enough to invoke the worst of the halo-robbers who have lately taken to biography.

From Marshall's volumes, which have lately been republished after sixty years of neglect, a picture of Washington emerges which, I suspect, is more dependable than either the picture of Weems or the picture of the muckrakers.

A robust and vital man! A happy union of strength and gracefulness!

Reserved but not repellant! Innate dignity and a high capacity for diversion!

A capacity for friendship in which intimacy and respect met and merged!

Quick sensitiveness to wrong combined with a conciliatory temper! An absence of pretense!

MINSEITO PARTY LEADS SEIYUKAI BY MORE THAN 100 IN NEXT PARLIAMENT

Near Complete Returns Show Minsaito Has 271 Seats in Diet With Seiyukai Trailing With 169; Kokumin Doshikai Gets 6

Special To The Japanese American News JAPAN, Feb. 23.—In the face of almost complete returns, the Minsaito party emerged victorious by an overwhelming majority, with about 100 seats to its credit in the Diet more than its nearest opposing party.

Returns up to four o'clock this morning showed that the Minsaito took 271 seats, while the Seiyukai trailed behind with 169. The next highest was Kokumin Doshikai, which obtained only 6 seats.

Sake, the national beverage of Japan, flows freely at the Minsaito party headquarters here in celebration of the unexpected landslide. Throughout the whole day there were much congratulations and shouts of "banzai!"

TSURUMI DEFEATED Yusuke Tsurumi, leader of the Meisei Kai party and well known in the United States for his frequent lecture tours there, failed in the election as an independent candidate running from Okayama prefecture. The chief reason for his defeat is declared to be his alleged involvement in a bribery scandal.

Kioku Kiyose, who was editor of The Japanese American News of San Francisco, some twenty-five years ago, was elected to the Diet from Oita prefecture on the Seiyukai ticket. He defeated Hajime Motoda, also of the Seiyukai party, in the second precinct.

Kiyose is former secretary to the President of the South Manchuria Railway, as well as secretary to the Minister of Agriculture. He tour the Pacific Coast of the United States in 1920 to investigate the Japanese problem there. His defeated opponent, Hajime Motoda, is a former speaker of the Lower House.

INUKAI SELECTED Tsuchihashi Inukai, the veteran Seiyukai president, received third highest vote in a precinct in which three candidates were elected. He ran from Okayama prefecture.

Yukio Ozaki, veteran politician, won his election with the highest vote in his precinct.

He ran on an independent ticket. Ryutaro Kagiya, the veteran Seiyukai minister of Foreign Affairs under the present Hamaguchi Cabinet, was elected from Ishikawa prefecture. In the same precinct Tokurogo Nakahashi, former Seiyukai Minister of Education under Tanaka's Ministry, was also victorious.

From Akita prefecture two present Cabinet Ministers were elected to the Diet. They are Chuzo Machida, Minister of Agriculture, and Ryuzo Tanaka, Minister of Education.

Esujiro Uehara, former political secretary in the Foreign Office during the late Tanaka's Ministry, succeeded in obtaining a seat in the Diet. He is a graduate of both the University of Washington and the University of Cambridge in London.

KASAI FAILS Juji Kasai, nephew of K. K. Kawakami, the Japanese publicist failed. Kasai was formerly co-editor with Kawakami, of the Pacific Press, an English magazine in San Francisco. He is a brother of Kenji Kasai, manager of the Hakushin Sha brokers in San Francisco.

Among the most interesting candidates was Hiko Shoji, former justice instructor at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. He ran from the Tottori prefecture and received only 55 votes. Due to this small number of votes, he forfeited the pledge fund of 2000 yen to the government.

Kusumemon Tayenaka, private secretary to the late Premier Glico Tanaka, was re-elected. He was formerly a resident of Seattle and Vancouver.
