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SPRING CROP OF GRADS TO SEEK WORK

Half of 25,000 Grads Of Japan Will Be Without Job

Special To The Japanese American News TOKYO, Feb. 28—The employment question is again looming up to cast its sinister shadow over the path of the thousands of university graduates who will be leaving school for active participation in the work of the world this spring.

Twenty five thousand young men will graduate from the colleges and universities of the country in March, and at present estimation more than 50 per cent of them will be unable to find a means of living. Moreover, the overflow from last year's crop of college graduates are still in the struggle for employment.

In the face of the increasing number of men leaving institutions of higher education every year, the government offices and the various business companies and banks are annually reducing their quota of fresh employees, the situation now forming itself into a regular social problem.

TO BE REDUCED

At the Home Department, which yearly draws the most college men among the various government offices, 60 office workers and 10 engineers were employed last year. The number will be reduced to about 40 men for the office this year, and no engineers, according to the secretary.

The Railway Department employed 60 college men last year, but the number is expected to be far reduced this year. Among the leading business concerns, the Mitsui Bussan is showing the only exception in increasing this year's quota to 80 from last year's 60, but the Mitsui Bussan is confining the other side of the story by reducing the last year's 100 men by more than eighty per cent.

The Mitsubishi and Yasuda groups may take about 70 men each this year, approximately one half of their last year's number. The S. M. R. will employ about 60 men, the same as last year.

N. Y. K. HAS OPENINGS

The Nippon Yusen Kaisha seems to be in need of more men for its increased fleet, which will add several large passenger ships for California and Seattle lines during the year. The young graduates from the Mercantile Marine School may not have to fare so much for their positions.

The Nippon Ginko is the only bank at present, that seems to have any room for younger men. The Yokohama Specie, the Kwangyo and Kogyo banks may not take any new employees from the schools this year.

One surprising fact in connection with this employment turmoil is that the baseball players who will graduate from the major universities are being sought after by many business companies, each of them having half a dozen different companies after them.

ATHLETES SOUGHT

Most of athlete-graduates of this year, already have their positions guaranteed by one company or other. Mizukami of the Waseda team will enter Meiden-sha Electric Company, Takahashi, also of Waseda, will enter Yasuda Insurance Co., Captain Hama of Waseda will enter Nishin Life Insurance of Tokyo Gas Co.

Machida of Keio will enter Kirin Brewery Co., Zenimura, Nakamura and Tezuka of Meiji were invited to Kobe Marine Insurance, but it seems that they will divide themselves to S. M. R., Fujiwara Kogyo and one other yet undecided business concern who will be lucky enough to get a share of the famous trio.

CONTROVERSY SEEN OVER FILIPINO MARRIAGE EDICT

Smith of Calaveras county has stirred a new racial controversy. His ruling that Filipinos are Mongolians and hence prohibited by California law from marrying white American girls, has started a heated controversy that may reach the U. S. Supreme Court.

REED URGES 67 PCT. PLAN FOR NIPPON

But Japan Will Stand By 70 Pct. Demands Says Rumour

LONDON, Feb. 28—It was said today in circles close to the conference that Senator Reed proposed to Ambassador Matsudaira that Japan accept, as a compromise formula, 67 per cent tonnage strength of the United States in the auxiliary ship category. This formula covers all auxiliary classes of warship, including the submarines, 10,000-ton cruisers, destroyers, and smaller cruisers.

Despite this American overture, opinion prevailed here that Japan will maintain its original contention for 70 per cent ratio.

Reports were also current that the Italian delegation intended to MacDonald that it will withdraw from the conference if its demands for parity with France cannot be realized.

Belief is expressed by the Japanese quarters that the United States will eventually agree to make the Philippines a neutral zone if Japan will accept the 67 per cent ratio.

Japanese Foreign Trade Jumps 10 Pct. Over Previous Year

In contrast to the recession prevailing in Japanese domestic trade during 1929, foreign commerce of Japan has been particularly active, according to dispatches from the Orient today.

Increased foreign trade is believed due to a greater demand for Japanese products, and because of the lower exchange rate of the yen.

The actual advance in foreign commerce was 10 per cent, as compared to the previous year.

As in the past the United States was Japan's leading customer, taking 43 per cent of the total exports, much of which was raw silk.

Japan's imports from the United States were likewise larger, 40 per cent of the total being raw cotton.

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
