Formation of Bay Baseball League Is Held Likely

A Bay district Japanese baseball league will become a reality in the near future if present plans mature, it was announced yesterday by Manager Cy Towata of the Alameda Taikai Club.

Mr. Towata declared that a meeting of the baseball managers of the various Bay region clubs will be called shortly as soon as each organization has been consulted, and prospects are bright for the formation of a league.

For many years an athletic league in the Bay section was an impossibility due to clash of interest among the several organizations. However, a beginning for co-operative efforts was made last year when the J. A. U. was formed for the primary purpose of maintaining a machinery for inter-club baseball games.

The new baseball league will probably be formed among such well known teams as the Oakland Merritts, Alameda Taikai and Showa Club, with a probability that both the Berkeley team and the San Jose Asahi will join.

Japan to Establish Radio Services to South Sea Region

TOKYO, March 3—Japan is now planning to establish direct radio service to South Seas, the Straits Settlements and as far as Australia, declared Baron Yasuaki Togo of the Japan Wireless Corporation and an influential member of the House of Peers, upon his return here from a tour of Europe. Baron Togo left for Europe last June by Siberia to attend the International Parliamentary Conference held in Berlin last September. He also participated in the meetings of the International Wireless Technical Committee which met at the Hague between 280 engineers and radio experts of the world.

The sweet philosophic calm of her! The shy, gentle dignity and the way she held her head and smiled, and fixed her deep brown eyes gravely on her husband.

She is Mine. Takarabe, the wife of Admiral Takarabe and the only woman with the Japanese delegation to the Five Power Naval Conference.

She had been but a night and a morning in England when I saw her, small and slight, in a black Japanese dress with her tiny white-clad feet held to white sandals with brocade straps.

She has not ventured to wear Western clothes yet.

ONLY FOR COURT

"I have brought some with me that I bought in Tokyo," she said, "but I am afraid they may not be stylish enough for England."

We Japanese women are sensitive about what we wear, and so a friend is helping me to choose some new ones. I shall only wear them at Court functions and when I go shopping."

She does not dislike Western clothes, Western food, or Western manners, or if she did she would not for the world have said so. It was an education to watch her selecting the one point she liked and omitting all the others.

"Do you agree with the freedom of Western women?" I asked.

"What kind of freedom do you mean?"

I explained that we had freedom to go about as we wished, to enter any profession, to marry as we wished.

CHOOSING A HUSBAND

"Then does an English girl not marry the husband her parents choose?" she asked in amazement.

"No, she marries the man of her own choice."

"But not without their approval?" she asked gravely.

"If they refuse to approve she usually marries the man just the same," I explained.

She was silent, and the admiral came to her rescue.

"My wife has many English women friends in Japan," he said. "She has a great admiration for English women."

She smiled gratefully.

"But I have not spoken to any except yourself in England. From what I have seen they seem to be quieter than American women and to use less powder and make-up. We have been surprised by the quietness of the English people."
