GIRL ENVOYS TO CALL AT WHITE HOUSE

Fair Tokyo Maids to Thank Hoover for U. S. Quake Aid

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, March 13—They are tall, slender, graceful and pretty, with an excellent command of English and ranging in age from 20 to 28. Such is the description of the four young ladies of representative Japanese families who have been chosen to be sent to the United States as envoy of gratitude taking advantage of the celebration scheduled to be observed here for three days starting March 24 commemorating the completion of the reconstruction of Tokyo.

They will take from the Japanese people a message of gratitude for the profound sympathy and generous help extended to Japan by the American Government and people at the time of dire necessity following the great earthquake and fires of September 1, 1923.

The messengers are Miss Kimiko Ashino, Miss Yoshiko Matsudaira, Miss Yoshiko Sato and Miss Sumiko Tokuda.

Miss Sumiko Tokuda is 24 years old. She was graduated from the Miwada Girl's high school also for the Tsuda English School. She was one of the winners of the Lincoln Essay Prize Contest offered by the Lincoln Association.

The senior of the four envoys is Miss Kimiko Ashino who is 28 years old. She was graduated from the Tokyo Women's Normal School and also from the English department of the Tokyo Women's College. At present she is teaching at the English department of the Tokyo Women's College.

Miss Yoshiko Sato is 22 years old and the third daughter of Baron Tatsuhiro Sato, president of the Ju-endo Hospital. She was graduated from the women's department of the Peereses School and is now studying in the post-graduate course of the same institution.

COUSIN OF PRINCESS

The other member of the mission is Miss Yoshiko Matsudaira, 20 years old, a daughter of Captain Hiroshi Matsudaira of the navy. She is cousin of Princess Chichibu who was formerly Miss Setsuko Matsudaira, daughter of Mr. Tameo Matsudaira, Japanese Ambassador to the Court of St. James. Her mother is a sister to the wife of the Ambassador. Mrs. Yoshiko Matsudaira, mother of Miss Yoshiko is expected to make a tour of America and leave Japan at the same time with the mission. All the members of the mission were graduated from their respective schools with honors. They are taller than the average Japanese women.

The young ladies will leave Yokohama on March 18, on the liner President Pierce, arriving at San Francisco on April 2. They will visit the principal cities in the United States, clad in their picturesque kimono and communicate the message of the Japanese people to the American people through newspapers, magazine and various social organizations during their stay in that country.

TO VISIT TMAVORS

The envoys of gratitude will visit San Francisco, Los Angeles, Washington, D. C., Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Seattle and Portland and probably other cities staying for a few days at each. Upon arriving at these cities they will make calls on the Mayor of each city, newspaper editors, Chambers of Commerce, radio broadcasting stations, the Japanese Association and Consulate.

When they arrive at Washington D. C., they will call on President Hoover, at the Japanese Embassy, the Chamber of Commerce and the headquarters of the American Red Cross. They are expected to make a trip to Mount Vernon to pay their respects to the memory of George Washington. The envoys will arrive at the American capital on April 14 and will stay there for four days. This is the cherry season and members of the party hope to participate in the famous annual cherry festival in that city. They will also make a visit to the Navy and War Departments while they are in Washington.

JUNIORS! VIE IN KITE TILT

Tourney to Be Staged At Funston Ground On March 22

Japanese boys are urged to compete for bronze medal awards in the third annual kite tournament of this city, which takes place on Saturday afternoon, March 22, at the Funston playground, Fillmore and Chestnut streets. The contests begin at 1:30 p. m.

Secretary Kawashima of the local Japanese Association declared yesterday that Japanese contestants will have as good a chance as any in this novel affair. The boys will be divided into two groups. The junior class will consist of contestants up to and including 13 years. The senior division will be formed by boys up to and including 17 years.

FOUR EVENTS

There will be four events. The Novel of Design contest will be judged first before flying and then while in the air.

In the Beauty of Design event, the most beautiful kite having a sustained flight will be given the first award.

Perhaps the most exciting contest will be the Kite Flying Race. Each contestant will be furnished with a reel of string (300 feet), which he is expected to fly out and wind in as quickly as possible.

SPECIAL CONTEST

The special contest will show demonstrations of messengers, humming kites, moving devices, parachutes, and all appliances and accessories. The kite showing the most ingenuity will win.

All entries must be registered at the playground before 9 p. m. of Saturday, March 15.

The winner in each event for both junior and senior classes will receive a bronze medal. Any number may enter the contest from any playground in any or all events, except the kite race. In this event there can only be one entry from each playground.

AUDITING THE NEW ERA

By GLENN FRANK

Before the stock market crash of last autumn, we heard much of the "new era" into which business had moved.

The man in the street never had a clear idea of what was meant by this "new era" and today he has a general impression that this "new era" came to an end with the market crash.

J. George Frederick has written a very sensible book on Common Stocks And The Average Man, which might very well have been called Auditing The New Era, for in it he pulls together more clearly than I have seen elsewhere the principles that underlay the "new era" and seeks to see which of the principles have stood the test and which have failed. Of the ten principles that went into the philosophy of the "new era" he thinks six stood the test and four have failed, viz:

1. That a ratio of twenty or more times earnings is almost always an inflated valuation for most stocks.
2. That the market does not act according to a law of up and down swings, and that cycles of inflation and deflation are a delusion and no longer can occur.
3. That fiduciary institutions should carry most of their investments in common stocks.
4. That high pressure selling and promotion in finance is sound, and, in particular, that investment trusts cannot be oversold.

Here, in ten sentences, is more about the business situation than can be found in many ponderous volumes.

2 SCIENTISTS DIE IN TOKIO

Discoverer of Small Pox Anti-Toxin Is Stricken by Flu

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, March 13—Two well-known Japanese physicians and scientists died today. Tokichiro Han, discoverer of small pox anti-toxin died from an attack of influenza. He was honorary professor of the Tokyo Imperial University. His funeral will be held on March 16.

Dr. Shinkichi Umeno, discoverer of the anti-toxin for rabies, also died today. He was a research worker at the Kitasato Medical Research Foundation of this city. His funeral will be held on March 15.

ington!


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
