TOKYO BANS U. S. ACCORD ON CRUISER

70 Pct. Is Nippon's Minimum Need Says Orders to London

Special To The Japanese American News TOKYO, March 17—The Japanese Navy headquarters, after two days of intensive study, today rejected the American compromise plan for adjustment of navy, and dispatched important instructions through the Foreign office to the Japanese delegation in London.

NO CONCESSION

1. There is no room for concession on Japan's part in connection with the 70 per cent ratio. Japan advocates this ratio on the following three principles: Japan requires a ratio that is sufficient for all defensive purposes, a ratio which at the same time is not enough for offense against any nation, and a ratio that can maintain the sense of security of the Japanese people.

CIVILIAN ELEMENT

TOKYO, March 17—Differences between the naval and civilian elements of the Japanese government, it became known today, may be reconciled before Tokyo can approve the provisional Japanese-American agreement which it is now authoritatively known, the delegates at the London conference have submitted to their home governments.

DEFINITE AGREEMENT

The view prevails in authoritative quarters here that this week will witness a definite Japanese-American agreement, which, with British adhesion, insures at least a tri-partite London naval pact, which would make the conference a success as far as Japan is concerned, since she is but little interested in the French and Italian navies.

PARTY IN SUBMARINES

In the smaller cruiser category the United States would be allowed 145,000 tons and Japan 101,500 tons, or her requested 70 per cent. Japan would also receive 70 per cent in the destroyer division, the tonnages being America 150,000, Japan 105,000. The two nations would have a party in submarines in which each could build 52,000 tons.

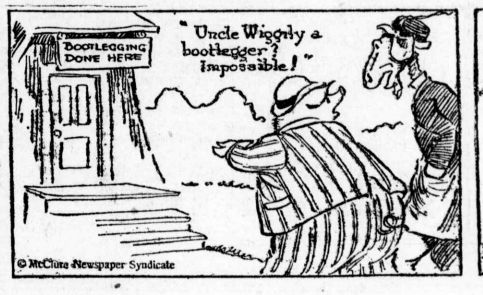
