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JAPAN NAVY OPPOSED TO REPLY TEXT

London Unopposed to
Reservation On 70
Pet. Demands

TOKYO, March 31—The text of instruction to London, as drafted by the Foreign Office, was today submitted to a joint conference of Foreign Office officials and the highest naval officers. If approved at this session it will then be discussed at tomorrow's Cabinet Council and then dispatched immediately thereafter to Reijo Wakatsuki, chief Japanese delegate at London.

Due to the determined opposition of high naval officers, including such powerful figures as Fleet Admiral Heihachiro Togo and Staff Admiral Kanji Kato, there is a doubt as to whether the text will be approved today without revision.

This morning high naval chiefs held a conference at the official residence of the Navy Minister, and they unanimously decided to allow no concession from their original stand as embodied in the so-called three principles. This parley was attended by Admiral Keisuke Okada, former Minister of Navy; Admiral Kanji Kato, chief of the naval general staff; Admiral Hori, Vice-Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura, and Vice-Admiral Shinsei Osumi. The last named officer is the head of the Yokosuka naval base.

POWER PACT
LONDON, Mar. 31—(UP)—Great Britain, Japan, and the United States will be ready to draft a three-power naval agreement within a week if a five power treaty can not be reached, it became known today after the five worried delegation leaders conferred at St. James Palace.

From reliable sources, it was learned that the reservations Japan was reported as desiring on the proposal submitted to Tokyo will meet no objections from the United States.

The Japanese will not be presented at the expiration of the projected three-power treaty, from re-submitting their claims to a 70 per cent ratio in cruisers carrying 8-inch guns. It is also pointed out that at the same time America may claim the right to withdraw from future negotiations any concessions made to Japan at the London conference.

Today's session of the principal delegates was brief, and concerned the subjects for discussion at next Friday's plenary session. Another session will be held Wednesday. The complete agenda was left for the secretary general to announce this afternoon.

THREE POWER PACT
LONDON, March 31—It was rumoured today that both the British and American governments communicated to Tokyo over the heads of Reijo Wakatsuki diplomatic notes containing threats to place the blame for conference failure upon Japan, should she fail to ratify the U. S. compromise proposals.

These diplomatic exchanges, it said in these rumours, also declare Japan's failure to ratify would result in warship construction between Japan and the U. S.-Great Britain joint powers.

It is said that these notes were forwarded by Great Britain and the United States through their respective ambassadors in Tokyo.

EFFECTS OF REPORT
TOKYO, March 31—Rumors emanating from London that both the United States and British governments communicated threatening diplomatic notes to Tokyo over the heads of Reijo Wakatsuki in regards to ratification of the United States compromise proposals, created some sensation in the high naval circles today. Their avowed opposition to ratification may be aggravated by these reports, it was held by observers here.

THE HAMAGUCHI MINISTRY FACES SERIOUS PROBLEMS

Will the Minseito Party Gather the Fruits Of Its Electoral Triumph?

The result of the election Japan has just gone through was a triumph for parliamentarianism, but it will be premature to conclude that the country has been made secure for parliamentarianism of the English model. Electoral verdicts like the one we have just had have not been rare but they have all failed to confirm a straight practice of parliamentarianism.

Though absolutely safe in the Lower House, the Hamaguchi Ministry stands in several knotty relations with the influences that an absolute majority can't control. The development of these relations might create a tense situation at any time. Some outstanding examples of these relations are:

First, there is the question of how to bring the prosecution of scandals to an end. The prosecutions left pending from the last year, which seemed at one time to threaten the life of the Government, may have in store some more disheartening developments. If they are left dragging on endlessly the moral prestige of the Government will be undermined. They must be brought to some conclusion. But in the effort to put an end to them the Government might find itself standing in conflict with certain influences among the procurators.

MORE COUNCILLORS

Second, there is the mooted problem of appointing two additional privy councillors. The increase has been promised by the Tanaka Ministry but has been left unsolved by the present Government. The complexion of the Privy Council is at present about evenly divided; one third consisting of men of a strong anti-Minseito tinge, another third of a rather friendly disposition toward it, and the balance strictly impartial. It is obvious that the increase promised by the Tanaka Ministry is in sight. Even General Ugaki can't dictate to other army authorities. Besides, his attitude toward the Government has often been enigmatic. Sensing it Mr. Inukai observed: how could the Government that couldn't carry out a plan of its own like the salary reduction proposal hope to prevail upon General Ugaki? And yet Mr. Inukai himself advocates the reduction of the army expenditures, his implication being that the reduction is possible but it can't be done by the Hamaguchi Ministry. We do not know if politics is really involved in this question at all, but it is obvious that the Government is pressed between its own announcement and the uncompromising attitude of the army. It is a test case for the power of the Government.

SEVENTY PER CENT

Fourth, the Government stands in a similar predicament about the demand of 70 per cent of naval ratio. Reply to the interpolation of Mr. Inukai, Premier Hamaguchi refused to mention the figure explicitly. He was wise in that. But Mr. Wakatsuki has said everywhere that 70 per cent is irreducible. He has tied his hands to it and with them the hands, and possibly the fate also, of the Government. It would be silly if the London Conference had to break because Japan couldn't give in an inch from her first bid. If
