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HUGE SUM IN GOLD FLOWS FROM JAPAN

Tokyo Worried as 75 Million Dollars Gold Leaves Country

TOKYO, April 5—(UPI)—Exports of gold since the embargo on the removal of precious metals from Japan was lifted by the Hamaguchi government on January 11, neared 150,000,000 yen (\$75,000,000) today and business men frankly were worried at the prospect.

Ordinarily the tide of commerce changes in Japan's favor around June 1, when the Empire's big export season gets under way, and its foreign purchases for the year diminish. The Bank of Japan and Finance Minister Junnosuke Inouye apparently have relied on this fact making it the basis for their continued statements that the shrinkage in the Bank of Japan's gold reserves need cause no alarm, even if gold exports pass the 200,000 yen mark, as they likely will.

JAPANESE COINS SHIPPED

Gold exports have continued steadily since the embargo was lifted. The National City Bank of New York has been particularly active. Its shipments to the United States mint in San Francisco exceeding 70,000,000 yen. All shipments, of necessity, have been in Japanese gold coin, mostly 20 yen pieces. The Bank of Japan has been unable to furnish bullion, such as is generally shipped between nations constantly exchanging gold stocks.

The difficulties attending shipments are considerable and steamship companies have reaped a harvest from the outward flow of gold. Practically all of which goes to the United States mint in San Francisco. The steamship companies carry gold cargo on an "ad valorem" basis, charging three-eighths of one per cent of the amount of the shipment for freight. Thus the cargo is immensely desirable, probably paying a higher rate than any other class of freight.

INSURED

In addition, banks must pay one tenth of one per cent of the amount of gold exported to insurance companies which protect them from possible loss by theft, ship-wreck, etc.

Despite these facts, however, exporting gold still is profitable and will be continued by the foreign exchange banks as long as the Bank of Japan adheres to its present exchange policies.
