NATION IRED BY OSAKA'S MILL BRAWL

Minister Flays Slash In Employment At Present Time

TOKYO, April 9.—A nation-wide opposition was today expressed against the decision of the Kanagafuchi spinning mills of Osaka, the largest in the Far East, to slash the number of employees by one-third.

Junnosuke Inoue, Minister of Finance, declared today that the reduction, as announced by the board of directors, was too drastic and made at an inopportune time when the national economy was at a danger point.

Sanji Muto, former president of the Kanagafuchi mills, replied that the company's reduction in both salary and dividends as well as in the number of employees was due mainly to the inadequacies of the government's financial policy.

All proletarians, he further declared, should not confine their attacks upon the company but should go beyond the apparent realities of the case and blame the government's bungling economic administration that is responsible for the present deplorable condition.

RADICAL CHANGE
The vast Kanagafuchi mills, which had heretofore been operating under the open shop system, are expected to witness a radical change in its relation to labor.

Before the end of the present dispute, they expect to be completely organized on a trades union basis.

A nation-wide unification of the proletarians, under the stimulus of a common danger, is expected to become a reality if the present hard times continue to threaten the livelihood of the mass.

The Kanagafuchi mills at Yodogawa in Osaka, in Kobe, Kyoto, Tokyo, Tsingtao, and Kumamoto are experiencing slackening of production due to the intentional slowing up of the angered employees. The Yodogawa mill workers made three demands upon the operators:

- 1. Annulment of the statement declaring for reduction of employees.
- 2. Inclusion of the war-time special wage into the regular schedule.
- 3. Promise that wages will not be reduced in the future.

Suppehiro Nishio, a member of the Parliament from Osaka, will represent the Yodogawa mill workers at a conference with Minister Ouye. The extent of economic depression of the nation may be judged by the fact that 1200 women applied for

TOKIO TO GET CHINA ENVOY

Shansi Lord Demands Japan Neutrality in Brawl

PEIPING, April 9.—Gen. Yen Shisan, Shansi warlord, who recently established a new northern government in Peiping in alliance with General Feng Yu-hsiang of Honan, will dispatch a special envoy to Tokyo shortly for the purpose of arriving at an understanding in respect to Japan's neutrality in the impending conflict between the northern and southern governments of China.

Liu Chen-hua will be sent by Gen. Yen for this purpose. Liu will leave Peking on his boat for Shimonsaki.

Gen. Yen, through the envoy Liu, will demand that Japan assume a strictly neutral position and refrain from selling ammunition or lending money to Nanking.

ACTING ON OUR KNOWLEDGE

Educators twit theologians for their tardiness in revamping their doctrines in the light of the findings of modern science.

But I suspect that pedagogy is about as leaden-footed as theology in following the lead of new knowledge.

Educators have, it seems to me, been just as slow in adjusting their class-room techniques to the results of modern research in psychology and biology as the theologians have been in adjusting their theories of the universe to the results of modern research in geology, astronomy, physics, and correlate sciences.

The most revolutionary knowledge of the nature and needs of human beings has been unearthed by modern research in psychology and biology.

But, by and large, educators look upon modern psychology and modern biology as simply offering new materials to be taught rather than new points of view from which to teach.

Club Presents Japan Classic Play At The Temple

TOKYO, April 9.—Sessue Hayakawa, stage actor and former movie idol, will arrive in Yokohama from the United States on April 14, aboard the N. Y. K. motorship Asama Maru.

After a brief sojourn here, he expects to set out directly for Osaka, where he is scheduled to start production of genuine Japanese films with the capital subscribed by the big business interests of that city. The studio, capitalized at a million yen, will be established in Takarazuka, on the suburb of Osaka.

Production of films for foreign consumption, with Sessue Hayakawa as the feature player, is his goal. Sessue declared while in San Francisco prior to his sailing for this country that he expects to infuse in his pictures those qualities of Oriental mysticism and the subtle art of suggestion that form a characteristic of the Japanese civilization.

JAPANESE SCENERY
"I shall pay particular attention to achieving adequate and pertinent subtitles by the aid of vitaphone mechanism," he declared.

"I expect to capitalize the incomparable Japanese scenery, which shall form a living background for my romances. The picturesque customs, the vivid street scenes, and the temples, representing a culture that goes back to the dim ages, will be made a part of the attraction of our films. They should prove popular with American audiences.

"But I do not mean merely to mirror the picturesque and the odd; I intend to portray the thoughts, the ideals, the aspiration of the people. In particular, I would like to interpret in the films the Japanese philosophy that grew up from the Zen cult of Buddhism. That philosophy of self-discipline and self-sublimation is a unique contribution which Japan can make to the world.

LILLIAN GISH
"I shall undertake this with the conviction that things Japanese today may become things American tomorrow, in our irrestibly converging world civilization.

"I am extremely anxious to take Lillian Gish with me on my next trip to Japan. Being religious and an enthusiastic student of Buddhism, as well as being a born tragedienne, she is well suited to interpret the spirit of the East to the West.

"I have no doubt that the way the present day cinema is going, with its clattering and jazzy music it is bound to betray the cinema's limitation ere long. As I say, I am determined to blaze a new trail in Japan."
