13,000 ISSUE DEMANDS IN LABOR FIGHT

Plea Flayed by Mayor As Tokyo Set for Big Strike

Special to The Japanese American News TOKYO, Apr. 17.—Thirteen thousand municipal rail workers and 700 electric power employees today joined with the 500 tram conductors and motormen in their demands for retention of the old wage schedule. They today deposited their demands with Mayor Horikiri.

Upon receipt of the demands, both the Mayor and Railway Bureau Chief Kakehi expressed a flat refusal to comply. Kakehi issued a statement warning the workers to refrain from calling a strike that would cause great inconveniences to the people.

Meanwhile the workers, about 1800 strong, are secretly perfecting plans for a general walk-out, which would virtually paralyze all railway traffic within the city. Due to strategic reasons the date of this strike is unannounced.

The Metropolitan Police Bureau mobilized its forces today to cope with any disorder that may crop up.

JAPAN PLANS TRACK MEET

Far Eastern Olympic To Be Held During May

Special to The Japanese American News OSAKA, April 17.—An inter-racial field and track competition between the elect champions of Japan and the Philippine Islands will be held in the Osaka Municipal stadium some time late in May through the sponsorship of the Japan Federation of Track and Field Sports.

This tournament will follow the big Ninth Far Eastern Olympic games which take place in Tokyo this year in the same month. The Chinese delegation alone to this Olympic games will be 180 athletes.

The Chinese party will leave Shanghai on May 15 aboard the Taiyo Maru and arrive at Yokohama on May 19. It will return to China aboard the Tatsuta Maru, which leaves Yokohama on June 2.

NAVAL PACT WAITS BIG 3 SIGNATURE

Original Text Being Translated Into Japanese

Special to The Japanese American News TOKYO, April 17.—Original English text of the London naval pact was received here today by the Foreign Office, and experts began immediately to translate it into Japanese to facilitate study before submitting it to the Cabinet Council convening tomorrow. They will hurry the procedure in order that the treaty may be signed on the scheduled time, or next Tuesday, April 22, at 10:30 a. m., at the St. James Palace.

The text was completed in London last night, soon after the Japanese, British and American legations had reached an agreement on the contingency clause in the tripartite agreement, safeguarding the signatory nations in the event their naval strength is threatened.

An agreement was reached also in London with Japan on cruisers. The Japanese had expressed the fear the elastic provisions regarding cruiser building by the United States and England would reduce the Japanese ratio. The cruiser provision, it was then explained, provided against any discriminations and the Japanese were satisfied.

The drafting committee now has started on the French text of the treaty.

Whether the signing of the treaty takes place as hoped, on next Tuesday, depends upon the speed of the Japanese government in giving its approval.

MASTERY OF ONE'S SELF

Fight Against Lust, Prejudice Shown In Drama

By GLENN FRANK The other evening I sat enthralled by a performance of Elmer Rice's Street Scene.

It was a drama of drab lives lived on a street of despair. Race prejudice. Jealousy. Poverty. Lust. Loneliness.

These were the invisible companions that sat on silted doorstep and in slattern rooms, making ugly the lives of at least some of the inmates who hungered for beauty.

Finally the daughter of the tragic mother around whom the drama revolved cried out: "I must live somewhere where I can breathe. And before I belong to anyone I must belong to myself first."

This means self-mastery. Little Rose was human enough to say first, "I must live somewhere where I can breathe," and trail this cry with, "And before I can belong to anyone I must belong to myself first."

The great lesson to be learned is this: When we rise above sordid passions and prejudices of our environment, we do not have to run away from our environment to achieve happiness. Flight without self-mastery can bring happiness even when flight is impossible.

S. F. GREET'S ARRIVAL OF CRACK LINER

Reception to Be Held Today Aboard New Chichibu Maru

N. Y. K.'s new \$7,000,000 Chichibu Maru, largest and greatest of the liner built in Japan for transpacific passenger service, steamed into this port Thursday on her maiden voyage and was welcomed by a large number of officials, shippers, and hotelmen.

Commr. Y. Arakida, Takeo Yamamoto, San Francisco manager of the line, and other officials were hosts to the welcoming party at a breakfast aboard the ship shortly after it docked. State, city, county and commercial leaders attended from the bay side.

Friday afternoon from 1 to 5 p. m. company officials will be hosts to Pacific coast shipping men, steamship and railroad representatives at a reception aboard the ship.

PUBLIC INVITED The general public reception aboard will be held from 1 to 5 p. m. Saturday. No passes will be required.

Regarded, according to word from Japan, as the crowning achievement of Japanese shipbuilding genius, the Chichibu Maru has a displacement of 22,200 tons and a gross tonnage of 17,300. She is 584 feet long, has a 74-foot beam, depth of 42 feet 6 inches, and loading capacity of 6500 tons.

Her cruising speed is 19 knots, and her schedule involves crossing from Yokohama to San Francisco in twelve and a half days, with a full day's stop at Honolulu.

A \$7,000,000 motor liner, Tatsuta Maru, due here May 8, will be the next of four new vessels of the N. Y. K. line in its \$40,000,000 building program to arrive here. More than half the \$40,000,000 program for 1930 is for ships in the California services. The Heiyo Maru, \$3,500,000 new motor ship for the company's South American services, will make its maiden call on May 30, en route to Chile.

While the indictment is based upon a provision of the interstate commerce act designed to protect railroads from losses through false rates, it was announced by Federal authorities that the actual purpose behind the prosecutions is to protect growers.

It was said that during the past season, railroads suffered a loss of approximately \$1,500,000, but growers were charged in an amount estimated at several times that figure.

The only fatality reported was at Karachi. Thirty-three persons were injured, seven seriously. The clash resulted when a mob, angered at the arrest of six nationalist leaders, stormed the city Magistrate's Court. After arrest of the leaders the situation quieted.

More Bloodship in Indian Civil Revolt

Special to The Japanese American News BOMBAY, India, April 17.—Civil disobedience with attendant battles, bloodshed and arrests, spread from Coast to Coast in India yesterday. One civilian was killed and nearly fifty other persons were injured in today's riot, which occurred at Karachi, Calcutta and Poona. The number of arrests was mounting hourly. Nine Europeans who were stoned by mobs, two women among them, were on the casualty list.

TWO HIGHER SCHOOLS Japan Woman's College and 25 other colleges for girls high school teachers, Tokyo Women's Medical College and three others for doctors, Japan Woman's Commercial School and 14 others for clerks, Tokyo Typist School and 15 others, Women's Pharmaceutical schools and three others, Dressmakers' schools and seven others, Japan Nurses Training school and 20 others, Tokyo Hobo Yoseisho and five others for kindergarten teachers Tokyo Josan Gakko and 15 others for midwives, Tokyo Music School and six others, Tokyo Woman Fine Arts School and two others, Training School of Communication Officials and three others, Imperial Gigei Gakko and two others for actresses, Japan Chaffeur School and two others.

It is reported that women have difficulties in securing employment. According to the investigation by a certain employment office, among the whole number of applicants, the proportions of positions secured decreased from 61 per cent to 44 per cent during the last eight years. (The end)
