YMBA PLANS 1931 PARLEY IN SALINAS

North American Confab Installs New Cabinet in L. A.

LOS ANGELES, April 25.—Tokumatsu Takemori of Stockton heads the cabinet as chief director of the North American Federation of Young Men's Buddhist Federation, according to announcement made yesterday by the local Buddhist officials in charge of the last convention held here for three days, April 23, 24.

The new cabinet consists of: Tokumatsu Takemori (Stockton), chief director; Frank Y. Sakamoto (Los Angeles), ass't chief director; Shigeru Konakura (Berkeley), 2nd ass't chief director; Kikuo Taira (San Francisco), corresponding secretary; Masao Araki (Dinuba) recording secretary.

Masao Yamate (Sac'to), treasurer; Noboru Tsunoda (Santa Barbara) ass't treasurer; Masao Kubose (Berkeley), Research chair; Katsuchi Inouye (Oakland) ass't research chair; Solchi Sawada (Florin) social chair; John Uchida (Sacramento) ass't social chair; George Hagiwara (San Francisco) athletic chair; "Duke" Hatani (San Francisco), ass't athletic chair; Rev. J. Terakawa (Stockton), advisor.

It was decided at the convention that the 1931 parley will be held in Salinas. The Federation will send at least ten or twelve delegates to the Pan Pacific Y. M. B. A. Convention to be held in Hawaii this summer.

The Los Angeles convention was sponsored chiefly through the initiative of the Southern Chapter of the Federation, whose organization was effected some two months ago and whose territory covers the regions of Imperial Valley, San Diego, San Luis Obispo and Los Angeles. More than 70 delegates from the different parts of the state attended.

The Santa Barbara and Berkeley Otani Y. M. B. A. groups applied for admission in the Federation, and their applications were unanimously accepted.

NAVAL PACT PRAISED BY SHIDEHARA

Minseito Foes Attack Cabinet for Failure To Get 70 Pct.

Special To The Japanese American News TOKYO, April 25.—Baron Kijuro Shidehara, Minister of Foreign Affairs, today declared in his report to the Diet that the London Naval treaty is in effect a signal success from the Japanese standpoint. He buttressed this contention with facts and figures.

Premier Hamaguchi, in his message to the Diet, outlined the general policies of the Ministry. His speech, contrary to expectations, only took 12 minutes to deliver.

In the Upper House, Kihachi Kokuo scored Hamaguchi for his report on the Diet in connection with the embolism of Ichita Kohashi, former Minister of Education, in the bribe scandal. Yosaburo Takekoshi augmented the attack by severely criticizing the financial depression and the widespread unemployment in the Empire.

In the Lower House, Tsyoshi Inagaki, president of the Seiyukai party, flayed the government for its inability to obtain in principle and in fact Japan's contention for a 70 per cent. Forty-seven other deputies, all Seiyukai members, deposited requests with the speaker for the privilege of speaking in the Lower House, all bent on criticizing the government.

TOKYO OFFICIALS BREAK UP CITY TRAMWAY STRIKE

TOKYO, April 25.—The Tokyo municipal tramway workers' strike, which for a time threatened a general tram tie-up of the city's main line or rail traffic, was today disrupted completely by the initiative and force of the municipal authorities.

The remnant of a broken army of workers, divested of their leaders and at end of their resources, decided at a mass meeting last night to return to work without conditions, thus admitting a complete defeat in their fight for retention of former wage schedule.

The tramway bureau yesterday issued orders bring 1000 agitators leading the strike. At the same time, warning was given to all strikers to return to work.

The normal traffic is expected to be resumed by April 27, although most of the workers are already returning to work today.

EAST AND WEST

Eastern civilization and Western civilization to be one of conflict or of cooperation?

On the answer to this question much of the future and fortune of our children and of our children's children will depend.

Both Eastern and Western civilization can be immeasurably enriched by mutual understanding. A thousand and one influences are at work creating suspicion and hatred between East and West.

Whether by drift or by design, the United States has become the symbol of Western civilization born of science and the machine. Because of this fact, the attitude and policy of the United States towards the East may, more than any other single thing, determine whether the vast potential power of Asia shall be developed in the interests of a common humanity or as another vast aggregation of power to be thrown into another suicidal world conflict.

It will be a calamity to posterity if, in the years ahead, America is not able to breed a heavier quota of world-minded citizens and leaders.

China Actor, Mei Fan-Lang, Stresses Art in Stage Talk

An old cry of art that only through a superb mastery of technique can an artist attain real freedom—was brought from far Peking to the San Francisco Center Thursday. Bringing the message, was the great Mei Lan-Fang and his co-workers in the cause of Chinese drama. Dr. P. C. Chang and Miss So Young, Mei declared he had come to this country to study the American theater and also to present to the American theatergoers his way of doing things. Art, he named, as the best vehicle for the bringing about of world understanding.

TELLS OF TRAINING
Chang, acting head of Nankai University, and himself a playwright and producer, said: "Seven years of training is required of a Chinese actor before he can go upon the stage. He learns all the traditions and patterns of the stage, but not the reason for them. He is usually too young to learn that. And when, with this training, he has the genius to grow out of the bonds of these patterns but with them all at his fingers' tips, imagine how free he is. How many such perfect control of pattern and stylization."

Reality, but not actuality, was the characterization given by Chang of Chinese drama.

DRAMA PURIFIED EMOTION
"It's intellectual, purified emotion," he said. "It undertakes to do with it to do with it. It makes important, not the setting, but what the human beings do in that setting. It brings the audience to the appreciation of the 'howness' of things. Mr. Mei's appearance in America may help answer the question so pertinent since the talkies have come: "What can we do with real people on the stage?" The unique Chinese theater, combining as it does drama, music, dancing, pantomime and story telling, may give Occidental drama lovers one or two things to consider in the solving of that question."
