SEATTLE TO GREET JAPAN GIRL ENVOYS

Trade Body and Japan Society to Tender Them Reception

SEATTLE, May 6—Having crossed the American continent and back on their tour of international friendship and gratitude, the five "thank you" girls from Japan, accompanied by their chaperon and a secretary, will reach here Wednesday morning, May 7, arriving on train at 9:45 o'clock at the King Street Station.

These girls, picked from among the most accomplished of Tokyo and Yokohama's fair candidates, are here in this country to express the gratitude of their country for the aid which the United States rendered during the Japanese earthquake disasters of 1923.

Wednesday morning's schedule of the party is devoted to visits to the Mayor, Seattle Chamber of Commerce, the Red Cross headquarters, Japanese organizations and newspaper offices.

At noon they will be given a luncheon by the Rotary Club at Olympia Hotel. This will be followed by calls on the three American newspapers, Salvation Army, Y. W. C. A., and Y. M. C. A.

Consul and Mrs. Okamoto will tender them a tea at 4:30 p.m., and at 7:30 o'clock the girls will be the guests of honor at a dinner given at Olympia Hotel under the auspices of the Japan Society and the Seattle Chamber of Commerce.
