JAPANESE GIRLS DESIRE PARENT-SELECTED MATES

161 Co-eds, However, Favor Choosing of Own Husbands

Special To The Japanese American News KOBE, May 17—Marriage is the problem uppermost in the mind of 2,638 girls who graduate from the 38 high schools of the Hyogo Prefecture. It was revealed in an investigation conducted by the Education Society here.

And 753 of them, being obedient daughters, declared that they would rely solely upon their parents and guardians for the selection of their husbands.

One hundred sixty-one advocated free marriage, or selection of their life partners by their own free choice.

The largest portion, or 1,480, desired to take the course of moderation and marry men selected by their parents, with their own approval.

It is also interesting to note that the majority of the 1930 crop of girl graduates in Himeji, where the Tenth Division is located, desired to choose soldiers as their husbands. The results of the questionnaire follow:

1. Will you marry?—Yes 2,479, no 36.
2. What will you do until you marry?—Housekeeping 958, higher schools 208, vocation 521, hobby 111, etc.

3. How will you choose your husbands?—Solely rely upon parents and guardians 753, free marriage 161, between the two extremes 1,480.

4. Difference of ages between the couple—Five or six and above 1,222, seven or eight and above 772, and three or four and above 158.

5. TIME-HONORED WEDDING
5. Methods of wedding—Shinto wedding 1,538, time-honored wedding 581, Buddhist wedding 78, and simple wedding 102.

6. Profession of husband—Soldier 891, teachers 207, soldiers 159, business men 231, artists 44, press men 8, laborers 6, and aviator 1.

7. What profession would you choose?—Teachers 690, clerks 437, physicians 110, typists 111, beauty parlor owners 26, announcers 2, and press men 9.

8. Until what age would you like to work?—Until unable to work 557, until wedding 127, until 30 years of age 924.

Britons Make Many Arrest in India's Disobedience Drive

BOMBAY, May 7—(UP)—Passive resistance volunteers were rounded up in wholesale lots today as the British government followed up the advantage it gained when it crushed Mrs. Sarojini Naidu's first move as Mahatma Gandhi's successor.

The volunteers, however, were not depressed by Mrs. Naidu's failure to effect a raid on the thrice-threatened Dharasana Salt Works. Another group of 50, some of them among the party which had remained with Mrs. Naidu throughout a 28-hour "seize" near the Dharasana works, left their camp at Untari again this morning intending to effect the raid.

While the police and volunteers entered their second stalemate at Dharasana, police guarding the Shiroda Salt Works took more violent action against a large group of Satyagrahis who attempted to raid the works there. Many volunteers were injured and about 200 arrested when the police rushed the raiders and dispersed them.

Another group of 24 volunteers was arrested at Dharasana by Mrs. Sano, president of the local Japanese W. O. T. U.

JAPAN GETS LARGE BELL

Vienna Returns 5 Ft. Gong to Shinagawa Tokyo Temple

Special To The Japanese American News KOBE, Japan, May 17—A historic bell of the Shinagawa Temple of Tokyo, taken to Vienna about 60 years ago and left in Europe ever since, was shipped back to Japan via this city to the Japanese capital last month.

The gong was exhibited at the world fair held at Vienna in 1871, and since then the whereabouts of the gong was unknown until last year, when a Japanese working at the League of Nations at Geneva found that it was left at the entrance of a museum there, and reported it to the Rev. Junkei Nakata of the Shinagawa Temple. The priest was very glad to learn of it, and after negotiating with the management of the museum, regained the bell, sending a stone lantern to the museum instead.

The bell was cast to ring for the repose of the soul of the Shogun Tokugawa Iyeyasu, the founder of the Tokugawa Shogunate, and it stands 5 feet high, with a diameter of about 4 feet.

Japan to Approve Plans for Relief of Unemployment

Special To The Japanese American News TOKYO, May 17—The Japanese cabinet is expected to approve today the home ministry's plan for relief of unemployment, entailing an extensive prefectural public works program. This provides for flotation of domestic bonds and federal subsidies for companies using Japanese products.

The policy marks the end of the cabinet's disastrous retrenchment program, which has magnified adverse effects of lifting of the gold embargo. The plan would continue to press industrial deflation and rationalization projects, but hopes to break the vicious cycle of decreased buying and declining output, thereby curtailing layoffs.

The government has abandoned its propaganda urging reduced spending. This policy was designed to check imports, but it was found that every dollar of imports meant the loss of the equivalent of \$5 in domestic products. The new drive urges the public to buy heavily, but of Japanese products only.

Grape Growers In Fight To Save \$350,000,000 Industry

Seek 85 Per Cent Co-operative Control 1930 Crop To Establish Federal Farm Board Grape Industry Program

FRESNO—Rallying to the Federal Farm Board's co-operative grape marketing plan proposed here last month by C. C. Teague, California member of the board, 3,000 organized workers are now in the grape districts of the state securing signed grower contracts sufficient to control 85 per cent of the 1930 grape crop tonnage.

"Growers, large and small, including the banks, loan companies and packers owning grape acreage, are now signing contracts in support of the Federal Farm Board's proposal to lead the \$350,000,000 California grape industry out of the agricultural slump," said Wylie M. Giffen, chairman of the statewide committee formed to secure a grape marketing control board.

"They are signing the contracts in recognition of the fact that they can secure adequate prices only through controlled marketing which will prevent the grape surplus from flooding the market."

"The State and many of its industrial organizations are active in the development of the state and spend millions annually to bring capital and settlers here," said Giffen. "They have opportunity in this campaign to assist in preventing the failure of an already established state industry representing many millions of investment."

"During the past few years the growers sought every possible


means to maintain a market which would return at least enough to pay for the cost of growing. Due to the changing economic conditions they have failed to secure such a market. There has been consequent loss of farms and homes and general depression throughout the communities in the grape growing districts.

"The offer of the Federal Farm Board to finance the marketing of the 1930 crop provides that 85 per cent of the grape acreage is pooled by the growers, is their best opportunity successfully to market this year's crop. To assure such a pool a state committee is now canvassing the growers for their signatures to the pool contracts."

The committee has divided the state into sub-districts in order to secure a systematic canvass of the growers. Dallas H. Gray of Hanford, vice chairman of the state committee, is chairman of the San Joaquin valley district; A. L. Faddeloff of Lodi, vice chairman of the Lodi-Sacramento Valley district; T. H. Stee of Napa, north coast district; Albert Haentze of San Jose, south coast district; Benton H. Ballou of Ontario, southern district.

As soon as the committee has secured signatures representing 85 per cent of the grape tonnage, a control board will be organized and receive demand loans from the Federal Farm Board. These loans will be in an amount sufficient to purchase the grape surplus. During the past years the industry has been threatened with ruin because of the surplus.

To support the efforts of the growers to secure federal aid, the Farm Board has placed at the disposal of the state committee two of its representatives, M. J. Newhouse and Dr. Theodore Macklin. Newhouse has had extensive experience as manager of co-operative organizations and until recently managed the prune growers co-operative of Oregon. Macklin was specialist in co-operative marketing at the University of Wisconsin before joining the Farm Board staff. Both representatives of the Farm Board are now in the field assisting in the sign-up campaign.
