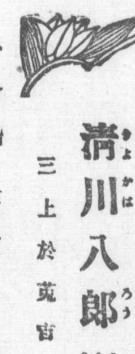

FLAMES HIT 3 BUILDINGS ON POST ST.

Two Adjoining Houses Slightly Damaged by Blaze

Considerable damages were sustained early Thursday morning when fire attacked three frame buildings at the corner of Webster and Post streets, in the uptown Japanese community of this city, threatening for a time the destruction of other surrounding structures.

Captain Thomas Hoerikson, who reported the fire to the police headquarters, states that the fire was caused by gas water heater being left burning all night at the negro barber shop.

Ozaki, Liberal Head, Declares Super-Party Gov't Necessary

Special to The Japanese American News TOKYO, June 12—Yukio Ozaki, veteran Liberal leader and a member of Parliament ever since Japan has had a Parliament has startled his followers by declaring that a super-party government is necessary in Japan. He bases his belief on the conviction that the two major parties, the Minseitō and the Seiyukai, are so riddled with graft and corruption that it is impossible for either to give the Nation a good administration. Mr. Ozaki's life has been largely devoted to the introduction and maintenance of the two-party system in Japan.

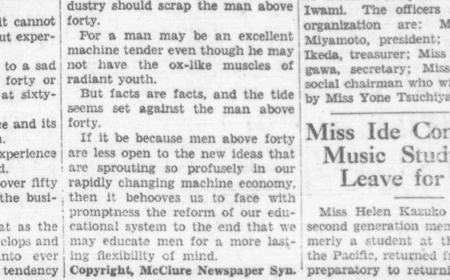
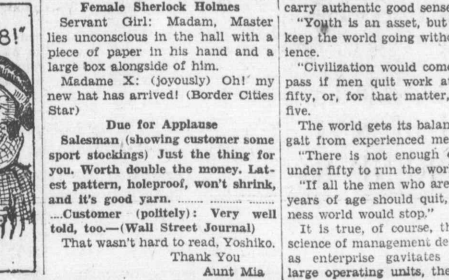
SUPER-PARTY

There has not been a super-party government in Japan since that of Count Kiyoura fell in the spring of 1924. Prior to the formation of the first true party government in Japan by Mr. Hara in 1918, super-party governments were the rule, the Premiership being traded about among the stronger of the old feudal clan groups. During the past 12 years there have been 10 governments, of which but three were formed by nonparty men.

Mr. Ozaki's stand is taken at a time when the Government has an actual majority in the Lower House for the first time since the summer of 1922. Case after case of corruption has been revealed among the Cabinet members and other high appointees of the recent Tanaka Ministry. The present Hamaguchi Ministry has come in for a share of these scandals, and Mr. Hamaguchi's first Minister of Education has been indicted for graft and will stand trial in the civil courts this autumn.

TO CHECK EVILS
"I am in favor of forming a super-party government," says Mr. Ozaki, "as the only means of rectifying the present widespread political evils. The two-party system may be constitutionally correct, but it cannot provide a decent government as long as the parties remain as corrupt as they are now."
