## PLEA URGES ALL CITIZENS TO REGISTER

### Two Booths Installed In Fillmore Region for Voters

"Japanese American citizens should register now if they would vote at the August primary and at the special elections for San Francisco which will be held on that day. Every citizen who has not enrolled since January 1 must do so by July 26, or he cannot vote."

This warning was given through the Japanese American News by Saburo Kido, local second generation attorney and former president of the Japanese American Citizens' Federation of America.

For voters in the uptown Japanese community two convenient registration booths are located respectively at Fillmore branches of the Bank of Italy, corner of Fillmore and Post streets, and the Anglo California Trust bank, corner of Fillmore and Geary streets.

Somewhere around 150 voters of Japanese ancestry in this city are eligible to vote, Kido declared. Some 1200 Japanese American voters in California and 1500 on the whole Pacific coast are eligible, in the estimate given by officials of the New American Citizens' League of this city.

## Tokyo Mayor Seeks Payment of Subsidy from Central Gov't

TOKYO, July 8.—(UP)—Hidajiro Nagata, newly elected mayor of Tokyo, faces a difficult problem in the adjustment of municipal finance and has asked the minister of finance, Junnosuke Inouye, for early payment of a government subsidy of ¥3,000,000 to the city to meet interest on the Tokyo Reconstruction Loan.

Inouye agreed to recommend the appropriation to the next session of the Diet provided the city carries out a promise to increase taxes and reorganize its finances.

## Norwegian Steamer Sinks in Collision With Japanese Boat

The Hosen rescued all the Dampfo's crew, twenty-five Chinese and five Europeans and was proceeding to Dairen.

## INOUEY FIRM ON ECONOMY Foresees Bankruptcy If Japan Abandons Thrift Policy

SPECIAL TO THE JAPANESE AMERICAN NEWS. TOKYO, July 8.—Minister of finance, Junnosuke Inouye, who has been standing pat on the retrenchment policy of the Minto Government has recently issued a statement of his views concerning the financial conditions of Japan.

According to the Minister, the financial status of Japan is approaching the level of international economic standards due to the gold embargo.

In the present situation of financial uncertainty, a dangerous and speculative prosperity may arise if the retrenchment policy were to be abolished. However, the next big reaction which sets in will be sure to upset the infirm foundations of such a speculative prosperity and cause national bankruptcy.

## Pear Growers Ass'n Sets Cannery Pear Prices for Season

Japanese pear orchardists will be interested in the announcement that prices to the growers for the 1930 canning pear crop of California were set Monday afternoon at a meeting of the directors of the California Pear Growers' Association.

The prices range from \$48 a ton down to \$38 for No. 1 pears and \$23 for No. 2. Growers in the coast counties—Napa, Sonoma, Marin, Alameda, Santa Clara, San Benito and Santa Cruz—will receive \$38 per ton for top grade stuff, while \$42.50 will be paid to growers in Contra Costa and Stanislaus counties and \$48 to growers in the Sacramento river counties and Lake and Mendocino counties. The prices of \$25 a ton for No. 2 pears rules in all districts.

SALINAS, July 8.—The local Taiyu club baseball nine will clash with the Alameda Taiiku kai baseball team on Sunday, July 13, here. This is the first time the local team has ever played with the Alameda invaders. The return game maybe staged in Alameda some time in August.

## KUMANOMIDO CASE NOT TO BE APPEALED IS DECISION

The recent Japanese victory in the Kumanomido case through the decision of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeal became final, it was revealed Tuesday by the office of the law firm of Elliot and Cadden, attorneys for Mrs. Kumanomido.
