TOKYO, Aug. 1.—(UP)—The Ministry of Foreign Affairs announced today that Japan had called China's attention to the serious situation existing at Changsha where so-called communists have looted and burned foreign property. However no formal protest has been lodged. The Ministry of the Navy said a Japanese landing party will arrive at Hankow Sunday in anticipation of trouble there.

## CAN'T AFFORD REVOLUTION

By GLENN FRANK  
In the alley or on the avenue; but to the degree that democracy lives up to its promise of equal opportunity for ability regardless of its social origin, democracy is herding its men of superior ability into its higher classes and leaving its lower classes, as I said yesterday, actually lower in their stock of ability than the lower classes were in aristocratic societies for the aristocratic type of society forces even able men to stay put in the class into which they are born.

This is why democracies can't afford revolutions. Revolutions were necessary and salutary in the caste system of other days, for such revolutions invariably brought hitherto unheard-of greatness to the front, greatness that the caste system had kept hermetically sealed in a before-dishered class.

But revolutions in a democracy are suicidal, because they release not men of mastery, but men of mediocrity. Democracy does not need revolutions for the occasional tapping of unused genius in its lower classes, because democracy is doing this tapping continually.

## C. OF C. SAYS HAWAII HAS GOOD CROPS

### Big Output in Coffee, Sugar, Pineapples Is Assured

HONOLULU, Aug. 1.—Insofar as it is possible to predict, the 1931 sugar crop in the islands will make a new tonnage record, according to the monthly report of the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce submitted to the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce at Washington, D. C. recently.

The current sugar crop, the report says, is 88 percent harvested and 70 percent shipped, promising 900,000 tons.

## BIG COFFEE CROP SEEN

"The present outlook indicates that the 1931 coffee crop will be the largest harvested in the history of the territory. Many hundred acres of new fields planted during the height of coffee prices will start producing this year. The crop is estimated between eight and nine million pounds. Due to climatic conditions, harvesting season will be about a month later than during the average year. The 1929-30 crops are estimated at 7,000,000 pounds.

## JAPANESE IS RING VICTOR

### Usuda Trounces His Russian Opponent in Stockton

(Special to The Japanese American News) STOCKTON, Aug. 1.—K. Usuda, welterweight champion pugilist from Japan, won a technical knockout in a 6-round boxing match held here Thursday night at the city auditorium. More than 10,000 boxing enthusiasts saw the Japanese trounce his Russian opponent, Kominsky, whose match was refereed by famous Jack Dempsey, former world champion.

During the same night, another Japanese, Kudo, fought against a Chinese, Lee, and won in a 4-round match. Kominsky seemed all in about the 4th round. He was twice knocked down by the quickfisted Japanese welterweight in the 3rd and 4th round.

## KOREAN COMMUNISTS

TOKYO, Aug. 1.—Following the example of communists in China in the Changsha region, communists of Korea and China in a boundary province between Manchuria and Korea are plotting to start riots there. Sensing the situation, the Japanese government is trying to nip the movement in the bud to avoid such a situation as now exists in Changsha.
