JAPANESE IN HAWAII GO INTO POLITICS

From Hawaii we hear that three second generation men are running for seats in the House of Representatives. To the rising second generation on the mainland, the news comes as an encouraging beacon of light. We wish them luck.

But after all, that might make the sailing all the merrier and the port of destination all the greater. It is certain that we need men and women who don't mind bucking rough waves, at any rate.

The time is almost here when our young people can take part in political activities. What will happen? PROCESS OF EDUCATION IS TO STAY AWAKE

From the welcome address of the president of the University of California, we gather that education is seeking, not accepting, thinking, not learning. To that one should like to add that the process of education is seeking to stay awake, not falling asleep mentally, as well as literally, and keeping out of a rut, not falling into it. According to this definition, one would be surprised to see how many uneducated educated people there are.

CO-OPERATION NEEDED BY RAISIN GROWERS

Word comes from the Grape Control Board that the surplus grapes will be bought on the vine for a price of from \$5 to \$9 a ton. The authorities claim that this price will insure the growers against loss. In fact, there might be a small profit. We rejoice to hear that something is being done at last to relieve the condition of grape farmers, many of whom are Japanese. However, there is one bad habit that people everywhere have, especially the farmers. That is the habit of lack of co-operation. Since the Japanese farmers have signed the government contract, we hope that they will stand pat behind the organization, uphill and downhill, until it succeeds. Much will depend on their co-operation.

The new ambassador to Japan from the United States, W. Cameron Forbes, will be feted by Consul General Kaname Wakasugi at a luncheon before his departure to Japan on the Dollar liner President Taft on Friday, August 29.

The farewell luncheon given by the Japanese consuls general will take place on noon of Thursday, August 28, at the Palace hotel. Several prominent Japanese and Americans are to be invited to the affair by the Japanese official.

Ambassador Forbes will arrive in San Francisco from the South this Wednesday evening.

2 Republicans and 1 Democrat Declare Candidacy

(Special to The Japanese American News) HONOLULU, Aug. 23.—Andy Masayoshi Yamashiro, manager of the Yamashiro hotel, N. Beretania street, recently announced his candidacy for a seat in the house of representatives from the twenty-fifth precinct of the fifth district at the coming election.

Mayor John H. Wilson and other local Bourbon leaders are said to have urged Yamashiro to enter the political race.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Exports from Japan proper to the United States during the first six months of 1930 were valued at \$108,972,000 as against \$185,294,000 for the corresponding period in 1929, the Commerce department announced.

N.Y.K. Planning to Lay Off 4 Boats in Very Near Future

TOKYO, Aug. 23.—At the present time there are 520,000 tons of idle ships lying in the dock yards of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha in Japan. Moreover, the company is planning to lay off four more ships, the Tanba, Aki, Maebashi, and Tako Maru.

FRESNO MAN OPENS CAFE

Modern Restaurant Is Begun With Seating Capacity of 124

(Special to The Japanese American News) FRESNO, Aug. 23.—Involving an investment of about \$50,000, including a 10-year lease, remodeling work and modern equipment, Frank's cafe and soda fountain, owned by a Japanese, Frank Tanaka, will be opened to the public at noon today at 1228 Fulton street.

Jack Raevitch, formerly with Mayo's grill and a veteran Fresno restaurant man, will be the head chef. It is announced by the Japanese proprietor of the new cafe.

The restaurant will seat 124 persons and is electrically equipped throughout. In addition to electric ranges and kitchen equipment, an innovation is an electric frying kettle and electric broiler.

Member of Japansy Quartet Is Given Informal Farewell

(Special to The Japanese American News) ALAMEDA, Aug. 23.—Miss Mary Takii, member of the popular Japansy quartet, and her partner were given an informal farewell party Friday night by the Alameda Japanese M. E. church and Sunday school. They are leaving here for Los Angeles next week.

As a member of the quartet which rose to radio fame in a short time, Miss Takii's absence, as pianist and soprano singer, will be keenly felt by the younger set here. She was also a Sunday school teacher of the local Japanese church.

FLAMING FINANCE OF 1920-30

By GLENN FRANK

The outstanding fact of the economic decade just ending is that in this period of amazing prosperity credit expanded faster than business expanded.

We must see clearly why this unprecedented credit expansion took place if we are to enter the next decade with wiser policies.

I commend the opening chapter of Paul M. Maurer's "America Looks Abroad" as one of the clearest pictures yet drawn of this adventure in flaming finance. The basic facts, as Mr. Maurer suggests, are these:

During the first half of 1929, there were more than 12,000,000 stockholders in the United States. Assuming one stockholder to a family, this meant that more than half the population of the United States was personally interested in the security markets.

The banks, long looked upon as agencies for lending capital, began to play the role of go-between for putting the call loans of their customers into the stock market.

Business institutions, ordinarily averse to speculation, began to let their surplus funds out for the high rates that speculative demand was willing to pay.

Security prices skyrocketed. In 1927, they ran well over ten times the current earnings. By 1929, they ran all the way from ten, twenty, thirty, forty, fifty, and in extreme cases, seventy-five times the current earnings of the stocks. The average was probably something under twenty times current earnings.

18 OF TOUR PARTY TO BE SENT BACK

U. S. Labor Department Denies Group Power to Land

The final refusal to land 18 members of the Japanese businessmen's tour party was made final last Wednesday when the head of the local immigration commission Mr. Nagel received word from the United States Labor department denying the Japanese tour party the right of appeal to higher courts.

The Japanese businessmen who were found to have come to the United States with a view of making illegal entry are now at the Angel Island awaiting orders from the immigration officials concerning the date of their deportation.

NEW RECORD IS ATTAINED

Middle School Youth Sets Mark in 1500 Meter Race

(Special to The Japanese American News) TOKYO, Aug. 23.—A national swimming tournament for middle school is being held in the Meiji Shrine swimming pool recently at which many Japan records have been broken.

The latest new record has been set by Masazo Makino, of the Kochi Commercial school, in the 1500 meter free style event. Makino set a record at 20 minutes 4.6 seconds.

Japan to Lend War Lord of Manchuria Three Scout Planes

(Special to The Japanese American News) TOKYO, Aug. 23.—Following the selection of Japanese aviation instructors to train flying units in the armies of Marshal Chang Hsueh-liang, youthful Manchurian ruler, Japan has decided to lend three scout planes to the Mukden government. The machines will be flown from the army air field at Tokorozawa, near Tokyo, to Mukden.

Honolulu Citizens to Send Delegates to Seattle Conclave

(Special to The Japanese American News) HONOLULU, Aug. 23.—As a recent meeting of the Board of governors of the Japanese Civic association of this city, it was decided to accept an invitation of the citizens' league of Seattle to send a delegate to the first convention of Japanese Americans on the mainland.

Tasuke Yamagata, vice-president of the Hawaiian Japanese Civic association, has been requested to attend the conference.

GRAPE PLAN DETAILS ARE MADE PUBLIC

375,000 Tons Surplus Grapes to Get \$9 Ton on Vine

The long-awaited offer of the California Grape Control Board Ltd. for the surplus in the 1930 grape crop was made public Friday. The board agrees to buy 375,000 tons of the raisin grape crop, consisting of Sultana, Muscat and Thompson grapes, on the vine at prices ranging from \$5 a ton for substandard quality to \$9 for standard and better.

IS JAPAN'S SCOTCHMAN

Shimbei Inui Repeats Claim to Japanese Shylock Title

(Special to The Japanese American News) TOKYO, Aug. 23.—Scotland is not the only country where Scotchmen are produced. Japan claims at least one Scotchman in the person of Shimbei Inui, one of the richest men in the Kansai district, and easily worth over ¥50,000,000.

89 PER CENT SIGNED UP

About 85 per cent of the growers, numbering 20,000, and 89 per cent of the grape acreage has been signed to the grape-control plan, according to Boegel.

As the top price of \$9 is offered the growers for their green product on the vine, this price means considerably more than that amount to the growers. The cooperative marketing agencies have offered \$4 a ton for raisin grapes. But as it requires three and three-quarters tons of grapes to make one ton of raisins, and as harvesting and shipping an additional charge, the difference between the board's offer and the cooperatives' price is not so great.

A letter was sent out by the board Friday to all growers in the state. It reads as follows:

EMPERESS OF JAPAN SETS NEW RECORD IN CROSSING PACIFIC

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 23.—Captain Samuel Robinson and officers and crew of the Empress of Japan, new holder of the record for the fastest steamship crossing the Pacific, were accorded elaborate civic receptions Friday by Mayors and official and business leaders of Victoria and Vancouver.

Although forced to slow down by fog upon reaching the coast on this side, the new \$7,500,000 Canadian Pacific liner crossed from Yokohama to the William Head quarantine station, near Victoria, in 8 days, 8 hours 27 minutes. The 26,000-ton liner lowered the record held since June, 1923, by the Empress of Canada, by 4 hours, 25 minutes.

Convicted Radicals Are Shot in China

(Special to The Japanese American News) HANKOW, Aug. 23.—Anti-Communist defense forces today executed eight convicted radicals. As they were shot down, a huge crowd watched the gruesome spectacle.
